Development forum on key issues to be held in Beijing

The China Development Forum will be held at the Diaoyutai State Guesthouse in Beijing from March 24 to 26 under the theme of "China in the New Era". Hosted by the Development Research Center of the State Council, this year's event will address key issues, including high-quality development, fiscal and tax system reform, supply-side structural reform and financial policies, manufacturing and innovation.

China Cup in Nanning scores with major soccer stars

Since the first tour was held in 1999, the annual event has accumulatively attracted more than 2,000 universities and institutions from 55 countries and regions.

Heritage: Snuff bottles find a new market for their beauty

In the late 17th century, European merchants and envoys introduced



the aromatic tobacco mixture known as snuff to China. It usually came in boxes, but craftsmen created airtight bottles to protect against the local climate, where snuff was prone to dry out. Artists also painted the inside of the bottles, and each container could take weeks to finish. Though snuff bottles have gradually disappeared since the early 20th century when cigarettes became available, the containers have become a collectors' item. Tianjin-born artist Wang Xinnian, 52, has dedicated more than three decades to the age-old art of painting inside of the snuff bottles. Wang tirelessly gathered donated items and set out with seven other adults and a 10-year-old child to personally deliver hope and love to 26 needy souls in four remote mountain villages.

In a truck provided so this mercy mission could navigate the unpaved roads between villages, Anne and her band of angels arrived on a particularly bitter December day with care packages that included coats, blankets, cooking oil, noodles and rice.

"It was super cold, like thousands of knives cutting your flesh. But none of us complained. When we think of them living in such a place under such conditions their whole life, we have no reason to complain."

The encounters with the lonesome villagers left a deep impression, Wang said.

"One of them was an old woman. When she saw us taking so much stuff to her home, she said thank you so much. Then she burst into tears."

When they visited a man of about 70, "we were wearing thick coats and boots, but he was in a thin, wornout coat and very thin shoes. I saw some dry rice that looked rotten in the pot. He was cooking that."

Still another was hemiple-

gic. "The first time we saw him, he could speak, though we couldn't understand him. This time he was much worse. He just lay on the bed. He hadn't eaten in days. We saw a coffin in the yard. He has no wife, no children. I thought it must be the last time we'll see him. Before leaving, I kissed his forehead, hoping he wouldn't suffer." She said the man has

since died.

The motivation for Wang, who hopes to bring help to other villages, is profoundly simple. "My mom taught me a lot about Buddhism since I was little. I just want to help people as much as I can."

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This Day, That Year



Editor's Note: This year marks the 40th anniversary of China's reform and opening-up policy.

In 1980, the country's first Special Economic Zones were set up in Shenzhen, Zhuhai and Shantou in Guangdong province and Xiamen, Fujian province, to encourage overseas investment and boost the country's economic growth.

Shenzhen attracted 14 percent of the country's total foreign investment in 1992. It is the country's major trade hub and leading manufacturing base.

Following the successful development of the Special Economic Zones, China established its first 14 national economic and technological development zones in 1984.

In 1992, a national economic and technology development zone was established in Yangpu, Hainan province.

As reform and opening-up deepens, there are 219 such zones across the country.

The economic zones and industrial clusters that

emerged after the country's reform and opening-up have made crucial contributions to the phenomenal economic growth. They successfully tested the market economy.

To further open up, the country's first Free Trade Zone was established in Shanghai in 2013, serving as an important channel for prime foreign products entering China.

A number of measures have been taken to facilitate trade by promoting the negative list for foreign investors, which removed several restrictions on foreign investment, and the single-window service for businesses, mean-

ing all necessary facilities are available in one place. So far, 11 such pilot zones

have been set up.
