Bus plunges into Yangtze after crash

Authorities say more than 10 were on board; 2 bodies are recovered

At least two people died after a bus collided with an oncoming car on a Chongqing bridge and plunged into the Yangtze River on Sunday morning

Based on inquires and footage from surveillance cameras along the route, it was estimated that the bus was carrying more than 10 passengers at the time of the crash, local authorities said in a statement. Two bodies had been recov-

ered from the water as of press time

initial investigation An found that the bus abruptly swerved while on the Second Yangtze River Bridge in Chongqing's Wanzhou district, crossing the center of the road into oncoming traffic and slamming into a red sedar

Facial recognition gets a thumbs-up

65 scenic spots and will be extended to more than 300 by the end of this year, according to China Central Television. Xie Jiayan, general manag-

er of Kanas Altay Wisdom Travel Co, who is actively engaged in the modernization of the Xinjiang Uygur autonomous region's Kanas National Geopark, said facial recognition has brought great convenience both to travelers and park employees

"We once used a fingerprint identification system but with poor results because fingerprints, especially those of the elderly, can't be recognized in cold winter temperatures," she said.

Xie said the new system, however, can identify a traveler even under strong light or in darkness, and is not affected by weather. The system has been used since August.

The system is open only to travelers with multi-entry permits, while travelers with single-entry tickets can get into the park by swiping an ID card, she said.

"Cameras at park entry points will take a snapshot of travelers with a multi-entry ticket, with which they can get into park again after their faces are initially captured," she said

Xie said that travelers used to wait at entries for ticket checks for at least 30 minutes during peak season, but the time is greatly reduced now.

"Illegal ticket scalping is also eradicated," she said. "We have more time to offer services to travelers rather than spending time checking tickets."

The facial recognition system has also received a positive response from travelers.

Xiao Zhenlin, 54, who visited the geopark over the National Day holiday, said: "The system makes my trip easier. I hope more attractions will adopt this technology.

The technology will be used for hotel check-ins and restaurant reservations, Xie said.

It was developed jointly by Beijing-based Aibee, a high-tech company in artificial intelligence research, and Send Intelligent based in

Hangzhou, Zhejiang prov-

ince. Facial recognition technology has been promoted as part of "smart tourism", in which travelers can enjoy saf er and easier trips based on data analysis and AI.

Longmen Grottoes in Luoyang, Henan province, introduced facial recognition to help simplify entry procedures in September 2017.

Supported by Tencent Youtu Lab, the system used at the grottoes allows travelers to get into the attraction by matching their face with a snapshot taken at the entrance.

Smart tourism - initiated in Zhenjiang, Jiangsu prov-ince, in 2010 — is recommended both by authorities and tourist attractions. National tourism authorities released a guideline to help promote smart tourism in 2015

BEIJING New schools' air to be inspected

Education authorities have ordered a nationwide inspection of indoor air quality at newly built schools and student dormitories, especially for levels of formaldehyde. The move comes after some students across the country experienced dizziness and nosebleeds. Excessive levels of formaldehvde were blamed. according to a statement from the State Council's Education Supervision Committee. Local authorities should conduct thorough inspections, it said.

Alliance to study rare diseases

A Chinese medical research alliance has been set up to accelerate the study of rare diseases. The Alliance for Rare Diseases comprises more than 50 entities ranging from medical institutes, universities, academic institutions to companies. The alliance will be instrumental in concentrating resources and will improve the treatment of rare diseases in China, said Ma Xiaowei, head of the National Health Commission. At its launch on Wednesday, the alliance released its first explanatory catalog of China's rare diseases.

SHANDONG **Death toll at coal** mine rises to 13

Two more miners were confirmed dead on Sunday after a rock burst at a coal mine in Shandong province, local authorities said. The death toll stands now at 13. Another eight miners remain trapped in a 74-meter-deep tunnel that is blocked by collapsed coal seam at both ends. The burst occurred at Longyun Coal Mining Co in Yuncheng county on Oct 20, trapping 22 people. One miner has been rescued.

GUANGDONG 17 fugitives return from Thailand

Seventeen fugitives suspected of fraudulent fundraising via online platforms were taken to Guangzhou from Thailand on Friday. In the past three months, the Ministry of Public Security has worked with police and immigration departments overseas to detain more than 40 people suspected of online fraud. Since June, a number of senior managers running illegal online peer-to-peer lending platforms have fled

JILIN **Dig discovers** ancient ruins

Archaeologists said on Sunday they have unearthed the remains of ancient houses and ash pits, together with animal bones, bronze ware and stone tools in Jilin province. The Bronze Age finds were discovered on a sand dune near Dajinshan village in the city of Shuangliao, according to the School of Archaeology affiliated with Jilin University. The ruins are around 150 meters long and 100 meters wide. Jointly launched by researchers from countries including China, France and the United States, the ongoing excavation started in July and has covered about 1,000 square meters.

Couple save hungry dog; police call it theft

The adoption of an emaciated, crippled police dog in Jinhua, Zhejiang province, has stirred heated online debate, generating calls for clarification about what can be done with stray animals and about the proper care of dogs working for police and firefighters, or as guide dogs. A woman identified as Ying,

been "mistakenly interrogated" by the police after the couple adopted a homeless dog on the street in June.

"We picked up the dog, a slightly crippled, emaciated German shepherd, when it was searching for food in the garbage near the Duohu police station," Ying said. "Feeling

sorry for the dog, we brought it home and found no information on the collar on its neck' After several days, local

police officers summoned and interrogated the couple on suspicion of theft, as the animal is a police dog from the station, valued at 15.000 vuan (\$2.160).

They were released on a 5,000 yuan bail, pending further investigation. In response, the police

issued a statement saying the dog was used for daily security patrols, and that the couple is suspected of "stealing the valuable dog on the street". Ying called on the police to

release the surveillance video to clarify whether what they did should be defined as theft.

Yang Wenzhan, a lawyer at Beijing Zhongdun Law Office, said he is inclined to define the couple's action as salvation, rather than theft.

"The dog was found outside the control area of the police station. It was free ranging, with nobody looking after it. So the couple's action should not be classified as theft," Yang said.
