





China to Establish Pioneering Free Film Trade Zone in Tianjin 天津高新区筹建中国首个影视"自贸区"

The goal of the free trade zone in northern China is to attract foreign production teams to make films about Chinese culture and Chinese stories. As China's first centre of national culture and technology demonstration base, the area has been striving to develop a culturally creative industry. At present, the industry's GDP accounts for nearly 6 percent of the region's total, and is expected to reach 10 percent by 2020 with the film culture industrial chain achieving a total income of over 100 billion yuan (\$14.87 billion).

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an China really go cashless? Chinadaily.com.cn published a post on July 19 with the title "China Moves Closer to Cashless Society." They have also shared infographics detailing the demographics of "cashless" consumers. Observer.com on July 11 released an article entitled: "China Is One Step Closer to Becoming a Cash-Free Utopia." Npr.org had their say on the subject on June 29 via: "In China, A Cashless Trend Is Taking Hold with Mobile Payments." The Sixth Tone posted on August 08 via WeChat the article: "A Day without Cash: Are Chinese Consumers Ready?" These are but a few examples. The topic has certainly caught the media's attention of late. Which only reflects the overall trend and awareness within the general public. Yet, as with so many other things parroted by news outlets, an individual best do their own research and take time to think things through before jumping on the bandwagon. JIN is not to be left voiceless on the subject, nor shirk the responsibility to provide another angle on the issue of "cashless China."

Yesterday's China

It is hard to imagine but just a few decades ago, our monthly or weekly wages were given to us in envelopes with cash. This practice was then replaced by the issuance of checks, which had to be endorsed and deposited into bank accounts. Speaking of checks, when was the last time any of us remember writing or receiving a check? China seemed to skip the personal check phase. Other than the rich or companies with large transactions, personal checks were never widely used. Instead, China has jumped from cash to cashless.

It's amazing how quickly society is changing and this is one aspect, becoming cashless. The development and use of cell phones and the smartness of these mobile wonders probably spurs on this phenomenon. In China, where most citizens have more than one device, the use of electronic payments is expanding at a rapid rate.

Jack Ma (马云 m ǎ yún), founder and Executive Chairman of Alibaba, spoke at the first World Intelligence Conference held in Mobile payment

Tianjin at the end of June this year. In his speech, he mentioned that he intends to build Tianjin into a cashless city and the municipal government will sign an agreement with Alibaba's financial affiliate Ant Financial to push forward the building of a "cash-free city" in Tianjin, where electronic payments will be used in areas such as transportation, medical care, education, and social security.

In related news, it was no surprise when it was recently announced that the Hangzhou Airport will be one of China's first cashless airports. From parking, to food outlets and other services at the airport, these vendors will only take electronic payments, preferably Alibaba. After all, Hangzhou is the hometown of Jack Ma and headquarters of Alibaba.

Electronic Payments

In China, the top form of electronic payment is WeChat or Weixin (微信 wēixìn), owned by Tencent. For details on exactly how pervasive WeChat is in China, see the article entitled "The WeChat Takeover" published in the 06/2017 edition of JIN. A key stat is that

based on the user report shared by China-Channel recently, WeChat has surpassed 889 million users. This makes it the most widely used communication application in China. Since the initial launch, updates have included the release of extensive electronic payment services. After linking a bank account to their WeChat account, users can pay for things online, transfer money to others, and even pay bills. For example, household utilities and even cell phones can be paid using WeChat. Not to mention countless stores around town accept WeChat for purchases.

Alipay, a Jack Ma creation, is a close second. Other popular phone paying apps are Baidu (百度 bǎidù) and QuickPass(银联闪付 yín lián shǎn fù). To pay electronically, all that is needed is a local Chinese credit card or Chinese bank account. Obtaining a Chinese credit card though for expats may be difficult as banks are worried about tracking a foreigner who can easily leave China and therefore may have a hard time collecting any outstanding debt. Comparatively, a Chinese bank account is easier to obtain. A local phone number along with a form of government issued identification such as a passport are necessary when opening a bank account. Based on various online reports and user feedback, many seem to recommend using ICBC (工商银行 gōngshāng yínháng) for opening a basic checking account. However, The Bank of China (中国银行 zhōngguó yínháng) is most known for its ability to handle foreign currency. Which some expats may find useful if needing to fund their local bank account via converted foreign funds. With a local bank account and ATM card in hand, consumers can access the wonderful world of electronic payments and online shopping such as Taobao 淘宝 (táobǎo) and numerous other online vendors. The key to doing so lies in "linking" the bank card with a digital payment processor, such as Alipay or WeChat.

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However, it has reported on extensively, sometimes the process of linking a bank card can be challenging for expats. The problem largely revolves around the requirement in WeChat to enter in one's name exactly as the



issuing bank has it recorded in their system. This can be next to impossible to figure out without asking the bank directly. It all hinges on the bank representative's data entry. Namely, every rep represents a unique possibility in how they type an expats name in. It could include issues like not putting spaces between a first and last name. Or reversing the order of the names due to confusion of which should come first. Any of these variances can spell disaster for users trying to link a new bank card in WeChat.

The best solution, may be to get a print out from the bank of how the bank has the expat's name recorded in their system. Ideally, this can be done when the bank account is being opened. Otherwise, that joy of getting a new ATM card could be quickly dashed to pieces upon many unsuccessful attempts to add it to WeChat. Worst case scenario, an expat could go to the bank where their account is, and complete the WeChat'Add a Card' process onsite. When it gets to the point of entering in a name exactly as the bank has it recorded, ask the teller to confirm the name is entered correctly as per their system records. Show the phone screen to the teller as they check their system. Hopefully it doesn't get to this point, but at least it's a backup plan. Also, some expats avoid this hassle all together and ask a

close Chinese friend if they can link their card. Of course, this creates all sorts of liability and opportunity for misunderstandings between friends, not to mention concerns over spending too much or adding money.

Still, in terms of paying electronically and shopping online, the success in China is incredible. For example, on last year's "Singles Day", November 11th (11/11), Taobao realized over a trillion RMB in sales in 24 hours. Buying online in China is very efficient. It often entails placing an order today and getting the goods delivered the same day or the next. This includes even perishable goods such as food and frozen items. There are countless apps related to buying online. The caveat is, a great majority of these apps will require payment via WeChat or Alipay before being able to complete the transaction. For example these include Jingdong (京东 jīngdōng), Taobao (淘宝 táobǎo), Tianmao (天猫 tiānmāo), Meituan Waimai (美团外卖 měituán wàimài), Baidu Waimai (百度外 卖 bǎidù wàimài), Shunfeng Youxuan (顺 丰优选 shùnfēng yōuxuǎn),1 Haodian (1 号店 hào diàn), Meiri Youxian (每日优鲜 měirì yōuxiān), Mobike, and the list goes on and on. Until expats have linked a bank card with WeChat or Alipay, life in China is going to be exponentially harder.

For expats that have successfully linked a form of payment the next challenge will come in funding the account. For locals this usually

isn't a big problem because they may get paid via electronic bank transfer. That means, as soon as their paycheck is processed, they have money to spend electronically. Expats however, may face a number of issues. One, they are paid in cash RMB. This means they have to go to an ATM or bank branch to deposit the money before using it digitally. On the surface this may not seem like a big deal, except it is not uncommon to find ATM's that allow withdrawals but not deposits. The second challenge could come for expats that are not working in China, and therefore do not have a steady stream of cash RMB coming in. For them, the process usually include first needing to withdraw or covert currency into RMB. This means, either long waits at the bank and/or complicated conversion processes. For those that can directly withdraw RMB from an ATM using a foreign issued ATM card, other problems can arise. Such as daily withdrawal limits or the overseas bank freezing the ATM card because of suspected fraud due to frequent withdrawals in large amounts. Even if one does get that cash RMB withdrawn, they still need to get it deposited into their local Chinese bank account.

Nonetheless, despite these related challenges, E-shopping has become so effective in China especially for locals that many traditional shopping malls have experienced a serious loss of shoppers and downturn in sales. Some department stores have reverted to establishing their own websites and selling online. The physical store being little more than a means to try things on in person before buying online.

Other Cashless Countries

In India, the government has announced a policy for the country to implement cashless payments to counter corruption. In November of last year, India announced that its most popular paper currency notes would be null and void within 50 days. It was regarded as one of Prime Minister Modi's attack on corruption and the currency black market. By forcing the use of electronic transactions, all payments would have a record and discourage illegal payments, which were hard to trace because of the absence of a paper trail. The demonetization also helped curb the counterfeit problem with fake bills that was a

severe problem in India.

The digital trail associated with electronic payments though does have some concerned in terms of privacy. For example in the article mentioned earlier published on chinadaily.com.cn a Korean student was quoted as saying "I am quite concerned about my privacy." The same student further stated: "I am afraid my personal information might be leaked." Indeed, detailed data trails are excellent tools in terms of potentially discouraging dirty deals. However, it also creates the real possibility of infringement of privacy and even identity theft.

In Sweden, their official website www.sweden.se claims that they are the first cashless society and the majority of Swedes do not carry cash but rely on bank debit cards and credit cards. Even their children carry bank cards. However, the website also state that some merchants complain about the extra transaction charges.

In Canada and the United States, the wave of e-payments is rising but still not fully utilizing the capability of paying by phone like in China. Plastic is still mainstream with many individuals carrying numerous credit or bank cards. In fact the plethora of cards being carried in one's wallet has even been linked to some health issues. Such as back and posture problems related to an excessively thick wallet being placed in a particular back pocket. After swiping or inserting (due to chip readers) that piece of plastic, payments are often made electronically via an online bank for the purchases. A number of people have not grasped the idea of eliminating this middle step and making payments directly with the phone at the point of sale. Personal checks are still in use in some cases, while banks are trying to discourage this by inflicting high charges for printing checks and transaction charges.

A critical clue in understanding the difference in the cashless trend between east and west lies in attitude toward money itself, perhaps even the wider topic of investment. In the west, money is often thought of as a tool which can be leveraged. As in, have money work for you, instead of you working for money. This is achieved via a number of investment products such as stocks, bonds, CD's and the like. For westerners, any opportunity to buy now and pay later has the potential to be a good investment. How so? Take for example another form of cashless payments, a credit card. Instead of buying now and paying now, credit cards allow the client

to buy today and pay not just tomorrow, but The cashless tools popular in China work

usually a month later! That means, during those 30 days the cash or money itself can be used for other things. This feature of cashless spending via credit cards is both a risk and reward. For those with self-control, they may leave the money sit in the bank or other form of investment during that period of time. When the "due date" for the credit card rolls around, they use the funds to pay off the amount in full, avoiding any and all interest charges. Add to this that sometimes credit card companies and other financial institutions even offer 0% interest on purchases or transfers for a period of time, the opportunity to earn money on money even after its been spent electronically is available. on entirely different principals. They amount to little more than electronic cash. Money that is spent today, must be possessed and parted with today. Alipay and WeChat in China fundamentally rely on "cash" or liquid funds being in the user's account at the time of purchase. There is typically no element of lending or credit involved. This is a huge difference in the cashless nature of China and lands abroad. Apple Pay is clearly patterned off of western buying habits, as it allows users to link credit cards and not just ATM or debit cards. Even in cases where Alipay or WeChat may allow the linking of a credit card, it should be understood that many Chinese users, and




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virtually all expats are linking ATM/debit cards and not credit cards. That means, a user must have the funds available at the time of purchase, pretty much making it a "cash" transaction

The massive problem with all this is that the consumer must immediately part with funds at the time of transaction. For Chinese consumers, this isn't a big deal, at least not mentally. As Chinese consumers have long since accustomed themselves to spending cash, that is, the money they actually have. Expats on the other hand, may have an entirely different spending mentality. Either they don't want to part with their money at the time of transaction even though they have it to spend, because they want to use every day possible to invest that money and get a return on it. Or, they lack the money, and need the month window of time to make the money before paying the amount off when the credit card comes due. Regardless of which it is, expats simply don't like the idea of parting with their money immediately, which is a critical element of paying with Alipay and WeChat at current.

Cashless for 24 Hours

In the past, one might have wondered about going cashless for 24 hours? Nowadays, it is likely not difficult. A recent article was about a young man in India who did not touch a bank note or coin for 50 days last year.



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Think about life in Tianjin. After waking up and going to that favorite street vendor for the usual breakfast, simply pay by scanning his or her QR Code (quick response code). In fact most street vendors prefer this versus dealing with dirty notes. Plus then having to deposit that cash later by standing in line at a bank which is open only during the daytime, which is when they need to be on the streets doing business.

To get to work, scan a QR Code and ride a shared bike making payment via WeChat. Or take a taxi or private car paying again by using WeChat. Outstanding bills can be paid via online banking. Go and grab lunch at a nearby restaurant and pay by scanning yet another QR Code. Or if sharing a meal and splitting the total, transfer the amount owed via WeChat to the other party.

Going to a movie or shopping after work is no problem either without cash. Even from the comfort of home, if not wanting to bother with cooking or going out to eat, there are several apps related to Waimai (外卖 wàimài) that enable ordering meals online. A nominable delivery fee may apply. Food is usually delivered hot and fast. Payment is made electronically when the order is placed.

Cashless Exceptions

Having listed all these options for living cashless, there are a few exceptions. A number being related to a car. Many parking lots still require payment in cash. If one is really stuck

and completely cashless, try convincing the lot attendant to take a personal payment to his or her WeChat account. But this will be irritating for them and any delay in the payment process will cause the cars in back to start beeping away to move along. The other alternative would be to convince one of the other drivers in line to provide the needed cash and then digitally transfer the amount to their phone. Talk about losing face and frustrating a lot of people though.

The same holds true at the highway toll stations, of course there are the ETC (Electronic Toll Collection) stations. But they are usually fewer than the cash booths, an indicator that cash is still more commonly used in this situation. An ETC card requires registration and maintaining a balance. Plus for those on an expense account, a receipt for the toll payment is needed in order to get reimbursed.

Some gas stations will not take credit cards or mobile payments, especially those on the out of town highways. Better not chance this by preparing some cash on hand when travelling, or else an ATM run may be necessary.

The other exception that expats need to realize in their cashless China adventure is that many local restaurants will not accept foreign cards, even if it is a Visa or MasterCard. Be sure to carry some spare cash or be ready with a hefty available balance in WeChat. Foreign cards are usually ok at international hotels. But likely it will be refused at small, local venues.

Wechat wallet savings

Besides this, foreign cards may not be a good idea because it may result in an exchange fee and/or a transaction service charge.

Cashless Conclusion

At the top of the list of countries presently making payments done in a non-cash method are Singapore, Sweden and Canada with about 60% of the transactions made without cash. China is rapidly exceeding the pack and although it was the first country to adopt paper money, it may also be the first country to abandon it.

Michael, a USA senior citizen living in China, indicated that he has finally downloaded WeChat and has 200 RMB in his account but has yet to use it. He says: "It's hard to teach an old dog new tricks, and I still am used to paying for my small purchases by cash." Michael makes a good point, older people will likely be more comfortable carrying cash and paying cash. Some simply find it awkward to use a phone to pay for a quick Jianbing (煎饼jiānbǐng) and would rather toss a 5 RMB bill in the cash pail on the cart, as they've done for ages.

Nathan, a Canadian expat has lived in China for 3 years and frequently travels on his own throughout the country and sometimes to remote areas. He has found that his WeChat and Alibaba accounts are sufficient in most circumstances but still carries about 1-2000 RMB cash just in case. He also states that things have changed a lot since he arrived in

2014 but then so has his Mandarin speaking ability, which probably allows him to communicate and understand the payment options more clearly. Another Canadian expat still slips 100 RMB and 100 USD cash in their wallet's secret compartment for an emergency or as the Chinese call it "救命钱" (jiù mìng gián). Which literally means "save life money". This in itself may prove the point. Cashless living may work in some cases. However, when the powers out and/or there's no internet service, that smartphone gets real dumb real fast. In an instant all the marvel of "modern technology" disappears and cash continues to reign as king.

中国的"无现金"生活

关于中国向"无现金"社会发展的文章经常见 诸媒体,这说明"无现金"的生活方式已经被大众 所接受并习以为常。"无现金生活"是怎样一种生 活方式?外国人是否也能接受并享受其中的便利 呢?

在中国, 电子支付的主要平台是微信支付和支 付宝,其他的支付平台还有百度钱包、银联闪付 等。实现移动支付首先要在这些平台上关联一张银 行卡,既可以是信用卡也可以是储蓄卡。对外国人 来说,申请信用卡几乎不可能,但很多人都有储蓄 卡。需要注意的是,关联银行卡必须使用在银行开 户时使用的姓名,所以你必须知道你在银行的开户 名是什么,字母的大小写、空格和姓名的顺序都必 须完全一致才能设置成功。如果你不确定,最好亲 自到银行查一下。

关联好信用卡以后,你还要经常查询一下卡内 余额。很多外国人的工资都是以现金形式发放的, 所以他们每个月都要多跑一次银行把钱存进去。使 用国外银行卡的外国人还需要注意取现和转账的限 制。当你战胜了所有这些挑战,你在中国就会开始 买买买的生活了。除了淘宝和京东,还有很多分类 产品独有的APP,下单快捷,运输迅速,让你很快 就爱上这种购物方式。商场里买东西的人少了很 多,于是各大卖场也建立了自己的网上商城,开始 两条腿走路

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在西方,人们对"无现金支付"的理解是使用 信用卡,这和东西方人消费观念的差异有关。西方 人虽然出门带的现金不多,但带的卡足以把钱包撑 爆。他们习惯于"寅吃卯粮",今天花明天的钱。 信用卡的还款期有30天,所以他们可以把手头的钱 拿去做别的投资,下个月发了工资再把卡帐还上。

而中国的"无现金支付"是实时到账,无论你 使用微信还是支付宝,你必须关联一张储蓄卡,而 不能使用信用卡付款。只有Apple Pay相对符合西方 人的消费习惯,允许绑定信用卡。所以,你要清 楚,微信和支付宝支付都是看不见现金的"现金交 易"。所以这样的支付方式在国外推行没有中国那 么好也是和消费习惯和意识有关

中国的"无现金化"程度发展到什么阶段了 呢?能否实现24小时无现金生活?似乎没什么不可 能。从早上出门开始,卖煎饼的小贩在餐车外面贴 着付款二维码, 扫一扫骑上共享单车或用叫车软件 打一辆车也可以直接从微信付款。午饭依然可以扫 码支付,下了班可以在APP上买一张电影票去放松 一下,如果不愿意自己做饭可以在手机上叫个外 卖,这就是"无现金生活"的一天。

early a decade of blood, sweat and tears by Phil Barkley proves the truth in a simple Chinese expression: 贵在坚持 (guì zài jiānchí), meaning: "perseverance is precious." Hailing from northern Ireland, and having earned a Bachelors degree in 2009 at the University of Leeds in England, Phil set sail for Tianjin that same year. Over the years, he didn't just study this Chinese phrase. He lived it.

Why and When China?

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The first visit was in 2008 to serve as a volunteer after the massive earthquake in Wenchuan (汶川 wènchuān). At the time, Phil had been studying Chinese for several years at university. He was working on a joint

degree in German and Chinese. He described his Chinese at that time as "awful." Still, the main reason to come to Sichuan wasn't linguistics. Rather, as a lover of mountains and being willing to lend a helping hand where needed, he jumped at the opportunity to visit the place he had only read about. After arrival, there was no time for touristy stuff. The aid work left him virtually zero opportunity to study Chinese. Not to mention the local language was completely different than the Mandarin he'd been studying abroad. He did though have the opportunity to visit Songpan (松潘 sōngpān), a county in northern Sichuan. There he saw true local living along with original city walls and always. Everything up until this point was so


different than the China he knew from books. Phil doesn't see these literary works as inaccurate. Rather, as having a different focus. Beijing, Shanghai, Guangzhou and similar big cities represent where most expats end up if they come to China, so naturally they are frequently reported on. Rarely, do foreigners find themselves off the beaten path in the outskirts of the land. The month trip whetted Phil's appetite. He realized, the real Chinese that real people speak could hardly be learned via textbooks. Therefore after graduating from Leeds in 2009 and facing a nationwide economic crisis, coming to China for further study seemed like an excellent choice.

Wisdom in Advisers

With many advisers comes wisdom, so Phil sought the advice of a trusted friend before choosing which city to live in. His goal was to study one year of Chinese in China. As it turns out, that classmate had himself studied a year in Tianjin as part of a Leeds' language program. His friend stated Tianiin would offer the lowest cost of living when compared with Beijing, Shanghai and Taipei. Plus Tianjin was a small enough city that it could be learned to navigate "in about a week." Whereas Beijing and Shanghai were much more expensive and massive. Then came the real game changer, a point of insight which Phil recalls clearly to this day. His friend stated, if the goal was to learn the language, the ranking of the university is not important. A bit taken back, Phil asked why? He was told the key to learning is how easily one can immerse themselves in the local language. Beijing and Shanghai had extensive expat communities and many cliques. The kind that are easy to get into and hard to break free from, resulting in stunted language learning. The icing on the cake was Tianjin being close enough to Beijing that all the tourist spots could still be easily visited. Plus, the local dialect spoken in Tianjin is so similar to standard Mandarin that daily living would provide plenty of opportunities to learn. Being a cash constrained student and loving the idea of total immersion, Tianjin was the choice. After arrival. Phil found his friends advice to be spot on. He would often walk the streets for hours without seeing another foreign face.

Academics

Phil self-paid for one year of Chinese

study at Tianjin's Normal University (天津师 范大学 tiānjīn shīfan dàxué). As though it was yesterday, he remembers his arrival on August 21, 2009. "It was so hot and humid my jeans stuck to my legs." As the tale goes, he arrived at night and was supposed to be picked up at the airport by someone arranged for by the school. That never happened. So came a night sleeping at the airport. The next day and still on his own, he managed to get a bus to the city. Those first memories of Tianiin are still fresh in mind:" got off the bus and had no idea where I was. I saw a dead dog, a young boy urinating nearby, and a group of men noisily playing chess." He managed to figure out a rough estimate of how to get to Normal University which at the time was near Balitai (八里台 bālĭ tái) and started walking. After a long trek, he finally arrived at the dorms. Where he was welcomed with demands for payment. The housing was in disrepair ready to be demolished which meant living guarters were less than luxurious. Exhausted from the journey, sleep was a top priority. The rest and relaxation didn't last for long though. At 6:00 AM the next morning he was awoken by military training taking place nearby. So the point is proven, perseverance is precious when it comes to living abroad.

One Year becomes Eight

Like so many expats, Phil's original plan was for only one year of study. What

happened? Well, also like so many expats, after studying Chinese for one year, he realized it was hardly enough time to master the language. So he forked over another year of tuition and kept studying. It was at this time, he decided as per a teacher's recommendation to try his hand at the HSK (汉语水平考试 hànyǔ shuǐ píng kǎoshì). After taking some HSK specific prep-courses, it was test time. The old HSK used to be divided into three levels. Phil took the highest and scored a 10. He was pleasantly surprised to say the least.

Having seen some gains for all the pain, it was no time to guit. He began studying at Nankai University (南开大学 nánkāi dàxué) to obtain a Masters in Linguistics. What should have taken two years took three. Before starting the second year of study Phil's apartment was broken into. His tuition money, laptop, and passport were all stolen which resulted in missing class registration and an eight month ordeal to get everything replaced. Yet, perseverance proved precious. Though delayed a year, in time he graduated from Nankai. Finally, after five years, it was time to come up for some air and take a trip home. That said, he was in a serious relationship with a local Tianjin lady, and was definitely going to return. It was during this moment outside the box he realized his Chinese was competent. Upon returning his focus became working in the fields of translation and interpretation. Later on Phil added a few more notches to his academic belt by obtaining a level 3 CATTI (China Accreditation Test for Translators and Interpreters) certification. Plus four Les Mills' instructor certificates, which is an entirely different story in itself.

When asked about fluency in Chinese, Phil chuckled and replied: "That depends on how fluent you want to be. If you want to be fluent enough to go to the market and shop, that will probably take about 3 months. But if you want to be able to speak on any topic at any time, you are in for the long haul, and it can be really long." So it was for Phil. One year turned into eight in Tianjin with countless

Phil believes if someone only studies textbooks, they will be held back. To really learn a language, living in the country is mandatory. That means, not just until it gets hard to be here. Problems will come and they must be dealt with in Chinese. That's when progress is really made. Phil distills over a decade of learning Chinese into the following words. Don't underestimate the importance of pronunciation, tones, and characters. And most important of all, get out of your comfort zone. Spend as much time as possible with locals, as you can learn something from everyone.

贵在坚持

中国有句成语"贵在坚持",很多人以此为座 右铭,但能做到的人却不多。Phil Barkley这个英国人 不但弄懂了这个成语,而且亲身实践了它。

Phil第一次来中国是作为汶川大地震的志愿者, 那时候他已经在大学学了几年中文了,但他说那时 的中文水平实在是"糟糕"。来到四川后,他没有 时间游山玩水也没有机会锻炼中文,而是马上投入 到救援工作中。

他有机会去到了四川北部的松潘县,那里还保 持着非常原始的生活状态,和他以前在书中看到的 中国完全不一样。于是他意识到,大部分老外都会 选择北上广这样让他们感到熟悉和舒适的大城市, 但真实的中国不在那,也不在教科书里。

2009年Phil从利兹大学毕业以后选择来中国继续 学习。他听从了一个朋友的忠告,选择来天津上 学。一方面,天津的生活成本比较低,另一方面也 是最重要的一点是学习语言与院校排名无关,关键 是把自己完全融入当地的语言环境中去。北上广这 样的城市有固定的外国人圈子和各自的小团体,容 易让你对其产生依赖而无法抽身,对学习语言毫无 帮助。所以天津就成了Phil当时的不二选择。

来天津报道的第一天,Phil仍然记忆犹新。那是 2009年8月21日,当时的天气潮湿闷热。在机场, Phil没有等来学校接他的人,所以只能睡在机场。第 二天他费了一番功夫找到一辆通往市区的公交车, 下车之后不知身在何处,凭着粗略的感觉他走了很 长的路终于找到了天津师范大学当时设立在八里台 的校区。筋疲力尽的Phil顾不得还没有整修好的宿 舍,一头倒在床上睡了过去,第二天早上6点钟,他 就被楼下军训的口号声吵醒了。这是Phil在"贵在坚 持"这条路上走出的第一步。

Phil最初只想在天津学习一年,但是一年真的学不到什么,于是他把学习的计划不断延长,在这段时间里他通过了HSK最高级的考试,然后转到南开大学继续语言学的硕士学位学习。这中间还发生了 寓所被盗事件,他的学费、笔记本电脑、护照全被 偷走了,耽误了入学注册,不得不休学一年。但他还是凭着自身的毅力坚持了下来,顺利从南开大学 毕业。从那时起,他对自己的中文水平有了信心, 于是考下了三级翻译证书,决心从事口译和笔译方 面的工作。

从一年到八年,这中间Phil经历了无数次的挣 扎,能走到今天靠的就是坚持。照本宣科学不会语 言,只有生活在这个国家,每天遇到各种问题、解 决问题,在这个过程中你才能真正的进步。



n real estate it is often said location is everything. In fact some claim Mc Donald's may be more a real estate empire than a fast food fortune. After all in many cases that Mickey D's is located on some prime property. Still, in general why is the golden arches known more for burgers than buildings? No doubt it has a lot to do with marketing.

Marketing is big business. Especially in western countries, such as America a business is nothing without a brand. In the east, especially in China, things can be a totally different ballgame. In fact, many expats may be challenged by how different the marketing game is here. It isn't to say marketing isn't happening. Of course it is. The question is how, when and where.

A site called chairmainmigo.com was founded by Miguel Roberg, an American expat who according to the bio listed on his site, has been "working here [China] for over 5 years now." His site actually does a fairly decent job of documenting some of the major marketing issues faced in China. A top problem is the tactics are totally different. Chinese consumers simply consume content for different reasons and in different ways.

China Marketing

Expats who are going to try to launch a brand in China, or even re-brand a brand in China are going to need to play catch up in terms of understanding how local buyers buy and why. The marketing process is complete with certain rhetoric being repeated often

mindlessly and endlessly until, bingo, one day everyone everywhere can't forget it. The Chinese government is actually a master marketer. In fact, any expat wanting to understand Chinese marketing should actually take time to read up on the tactics used by the powers in charge. Why?

Simply put, there has been an amazing conveyance of standardized information conveyed to an incredibly large crowd in China. Think about it, few countries face marketing challenges that amount to communicating a message to over one billion humans. Yet, that is exactly what a marketer must do in China. Another case to be studied by marketers is Tencent and their product WeChat. Outside of the Chinese government, perhaps one of the next best marketers in China is Tencent under the guise of WeChat. As JIN reported recently as per the user stats released via China-Channel, WeChat users have neared the 900 million mark in recent times! It is simply mind-boggling to imagine the type of data storage infrastructure necessary to store and maintain nearly 1 billion users related information. Not to mention these users are not simply sending text, but multimedia content including pictures and videos.

For marketers to understand how marketing works in China, let's briefly examine how the Chinese government and WeChat works. The government definitely has a huge advantage, namely the law is on their side. It could be said, understanding, or being aware of the government's messaging and programs

is a legal requirement. For example, if a company wants to be incorporated in China, they must understand the legal procedure for doing so. Expats will probably be shocked that a lot of such information is primarily being disseminated person to person and not online. That is, entrepreneurs actually need to visit in person a government building and talk to a live person in order to obtain specific information necessary to incorporate a business. In such a scenario, the Chinese government, was and still is to a large extent relying on people, that is physical human-to-human communication to market their message.

Tencent via WeChat at first glance may seem to have taken a totally different road. In reality though, they didn't. Here's why, WeChat users grew generally speaking organically. There was no massive, all-encompassing, country-wide marketing effort that in short order caused everyone everywhere to download WeChat and start using it. Instead, in many cases, it was the individual user that carried the message to the next consumer. In fact, it could be said that WeChat users promoted the product themselves! That's right, unpaid, uncompensated marketing labor entirely free for WeChat. A marketers dream come true.

Traditional Marketing

Here's the point, traditional marketing means for information dissemination definitely exist in China. This includes the most obvious one of online advertising. Businesses can pay

the top search engine provider Baidu to ensure their company is found when key words are searched. This is nothing new and models itself exactly after the internet pioneer Google. As with its overseas counterpart, Baidu advertising is not cheap. Big companies spend big money to advertise via Baidu. The issue is, small and medium size companies with limited budgets can only buy so much Baidu advertising before it becomes cost-prohibitive.

Other mainstream marketing mediums exist. For example, perhaps nowhere could more consumer "eyes" see a message than via public transportation advertising. Sure, millions, even hundreds of millions of people may become aware of a particular product or service in a very short interval via subway or public bus advertising. However, that advertising bill is not going to be small. In fact, it may just turn the lights off before sales are ever even realized. Next comes the time-tested methods of television, radio and billboards. Yet again, all options in China. Marketers are not left without options. In fact, most marketing options available overseas are available in China.

Chinese Consumers

The point lies in how Chinese consumers differ from those abroad. For the sake of discussion, two differences will herein be proposed. Each is based on the success of two marketing juggernauts in China, the government and Tencent. The first difference is Chinese consumers respond to requirements not suggestions. The government requires consumers to be in the know, or else face some legal consequence. A huge motivator for sure. This means, no matter how challenging or inconvenient the obtainment of information may be, it must be obtained. In fact, Chinese consumers are incredibly resourceful and resilient when it comes to obtaining necessary information. A second difference is Chinese consumers rely on and trust highly individuals, most especially, those they know well. This is where the ever dominate concept of "relationships" or "guanxi" (关系 quānxi) yet again comes into play. Notice where the connection exists between these two consumer characteristics and both marketing success stories? It lies in a powerful, but basic Chinese character that is also one of the earliest to be learned by natives: 人 (rén), meaning: person.

The government relies on people, actual living, breathing humans stationed at countless government offices through the country to disseminate information. So too, WeChat relied on living breathing people to pass on the word, slowly but surely, one by one inviting their friends, family and colleagues to add them on WeChat. In fact expats who were in China pre-WeChat can attest to the slow, steady and absolutely undeniable WeChat takeover. To the point, that as our "cashless" cover article highlighted, forget about chatting and communication, if one wants to simply survive in China financially, such as buy daily necessities they must have WeChat!

Conclusion

Expats need to seriously consider these factors when devising a marketing plan. No amount of money is sufficient to market to over one billion China residents. Especially



when many of such residents live in rural areas where mass marketing may be virtually useless. Instead, do not, in any way overlook or underestimate the power of each and every individual consumer and their somewhat incomprehensible power of persuasion over their close associates. Look to market to everyone via someone. Win the vote of the personal consumer and they will market that message for you. As they have been trained by the marketing strategies of the government, namely to motivate the end-user to obtain information that is necessary no matter what, so too businesses must make their information, product, service or message become "necessary" in the minds of the individual. As they do, that person will be far more effective in transmitting the message to the next person than any ad could ever hope to.

你真的懂营销吗?

外国朋友若想在中国创建品牌,他需要特别清 楚了解本地买家的购物心理。任何人,他想进入中 国市场,都需要花费大量时间和精力去仔细研究掌 权者们所工于心计的策略和方针。对营销人员来讲, 他们最清楚打通中国市场该是怎样的流程。一场营 销战役中,占据有利位置的永远是权力的一方,法 律的秤杆也会倾向于官方一边。因此,了解政府的 程序就是一个必要环节。也就是说,企业家必须面 对面的和权威人员交谈, 方才能获得创业的相关信 息和资讯。无论是过去还是现在,再大的权力也需 要靠人与人之间的交流来传播它们的信息。

传统的营销手段指的是让信息在中国被广泛传 播开来,比如网络广告、公共交通广告、电台电视 公路牌广告等。中国之大,市场之广,营销者们的 选择不胜枚举。事实上,那些在海外所能行得通的 营销洗择在中国也一样受用

中国消费者和外国消费者最大的区别在于,中 国消费者对自己的需求做出反应而不是建议,其次 中国的消费者非常信赖和信赖于周围朋友的推销。 如此,我们也再一次印证了"关系"在中国人心中 的地位和影响。

综上所述,外国朋友在指定营销计划的时候需 要格外认真考虑这些因素。对于这个有着十几亿人 口的国家来说,投入一定要量力而行。过分的大规 模营销也许往往并不适用。务必记住个人的力量, 在推广宣传的道路上,很多时候口口相传的影响要 远远大于任何形式的推销。

The Second Beijing-Tianjin-Hebei Labor Dispute Seminar and Sino-Credit Labor Law Forum Were Completed Successfully in Tianjin

n August 3, 2017, The Second Beijing-Tianjin-Hebei Labor Dispute Mediation and Arbitration Seminar and Sino-Credit Labor Law Forum were held in Four Seasons Hotel successfully. Leaders of the Ministry of Human Resources and Social Security, Liu Huashan, deputy director of Tianjin Human Resources and Social Security Bureau, leaders of Meditation and Arbitration Office in Human Resources and Social Security Bureau in Beijing, Tianijn and Hebei, leading officials of arbitration in Tongzhou, Langfang and 16 districts and counties in Tianiin, leaders of Professional Committee on Labor Law in National Lawyers Association, 100 member enterprises of HRCLUB and all lawyers and clients of Sino-Credit Law Office gathered together to discuss the problems which arose in the implementation of the regulations for handling cases of labor dispute arbitration.







At the opening ceremony of this forum, Liu Huashan, deputy director of Tianjin Human Resources and Social Security, made a speech. Director of Tianjin Human Resources Labor and Personnel Dispute Meditation Center and senior partner of Tianjin

Sino-Credit Law Office, Xu Yongge was the quest speaker at the forum whose sharing topic was The Positive Role Played by Social Organizations in Resolving Labor Disputes. What followed was" the discussion of implementing Regulations for Handling Cases of Labor and Personnel Dispute Arbitration in Beijing, Tianjin and Hebei regions". Discussion guests included principals of Labor and Personnel Arbitration Office of Human Resources and Social Security Bureau in Beijing, Tianiin and Hebei, chairman of China Labor Relation Institute and professor in Capital University of Economics and Business, Chang Kai, dean of the School of Economics in Capital University of Economics and Business, Feng Xiliang and director of Professional Committee on Labor Law in National Lawyers Association, Wang Jianping.

In the afternoon, this forum focused on specific problems on labor law often faced by enterprises. Interactive guests who would answer difficult questions in labor dispute cases on the spot included Xu Yongge and Huafeng, partners of Sino-Credit Law Office, Su Wenwei, secretary general of Professional Committee on Labor Law in National Lawyers Association, Qiu Wenwu, former presiding judge of civil court in Tianjin Bihai New Area Court and Meng Quan, doctor of the School of Economics in Capital University of Economics and Business. And four partner lawyers in Sino-Credit Law Office operated on-site training, explaining many intractable problems on labor law through many practical cases like practices and thoughts in labor dispatching and outsourcing, how to view the birth and death of labor relation from taxation perspective, how to break the deadlock in the change of labor contracts from big data perspective and how to solve the problem that employees take advantage of sick leave to earn extra money.

The successful opening of this forum concretely reflects the spirit of implementing "Beijing-Tianiin-Hebei integrated development" in the field of labor and social security. BECOMING AN ATTORNEY IN CHINA by Carmen King

n terms of American culture the law is a big part. From the old days until today, some of the top T.V. shows and movies in the west have legal connections. There was Perry Mason, Matlock and Murder, She Wrote back in the day to name a few. In more recent times Law and Order, Boston Legal, and The Good Wife all were hits. On the big screen there are so many movies based on attorneys battling it out in the courtroom it would be nearly impossible to even begin to list them all. There seems to be a definite infatuation and mesmerization with the law in the west. When it comes to China, the law is becoming increasingly important. Some expats may have had the idea that coming to China meant an opportunity to color outside the lines and operate a business with far less legal responsibility. Especially in recent years, this simply isn't the case. A possible indicator of how the law is growing in prominence in China is the big business surrounding what is known as the: 国家司法考试 (guójiā sīfǎ kăoshì).

The Sikao

Known colloquially as "Sikao" (司考 sīkǎo) amongst locals, it has many common characteristics to another major test, the infamous "Gaokao" (高考 gāokǎo). Essentially, what Gaokao is to getting into college, so Sikao is to getting into anything related to the law. Sikao accordingly to Baidu Baike is the countrywide, standardized test which essentially marks the starting point for anyone whose dream is to be an attorney (律师 lǜshi), judge (法 官 fǎguān), prosecutor (检察官 jiǎncháguān), or notary (公证员 gōngzhèngyuán). Of course for those passing the Sikao, the next steps vary according to the end goal.

An investigation of Sikao reveals as with Gaokao, students taking the test are numerous, but those doing well on it are relatively few. In fact, one attorney personally proposed the pass rate for the Sikao may be as low as ten percent or less. His estimate was consistent with Baidu Baike which also quotes a passing percentage of only around ten. Sikao is an annual test historically taking place on the third weekend of September. Registration is limited to a specific time period, such as June 15-July 4. Applicants must register according to the requirements set forth by the local office of the Ministry of Justice (可 法部 sīfǎbù).

Should a student successfully pass the Sikao, the next step is to find a legal firm to intern at. China requires all potential

attorney's to intern for at least one year before being able to interview with the China Lawyers Association (律师协会 lǜshī xiéhuì), which is essentially the "bar association." Reports seem to indicate that the pass rate for these interviews are fairly high when compared with the percentage of successful Sikao testers.

Sikao Prep

As with about everything else in China, there are countless prep-classes available for potential Sikao students. Since Sikao is an annual test, there are two main types of classes. Those that can be started earlier in the year, and those which are designed specifically to cram before the test. Prices seem to range from a few thousand to several tens of thousands of RMB. Interestingly though, in chatting with a few attorney's currently practicing law, they actually spoke fairly well of these types of class, not entirely dismissing their value. Self-study for the Sikao is definitely an option, however, as with other tests in China, it appears that tapping into the wisdom of those professionals dedicated to training others on how to take the test isn't a bad idea. The key is, ask around before paying tuition, particularly seeking the advice of active attorneys in terms of which class is more cost-effective. It should be noted though, there are talks of the Sikao



being reformed next year in 2018. These changes have yet to be revealed. Registration for the 2017 Sikao is already closed. So attorney hopefuls can only wait until early next year when hopefully more information on the changes will be released.

For expats, it should be noted, as of current there appears to be no provision for taking the Sikao. That means, no opportunity to become an attorney in China, at least not for now. As to the changes coming in 2018, as to if they will include any opportunities for expats, that is hard to say. Sikao up to now, has only been available for mainland Chinese nationals, and citizens of Hong Kong, Macau, and Taiwan. Even expats who have practiced law outside of China, such as in America can not practice law within China. The caveat to this is setting up a practice for consulting on foreign law. For example, a fairly well known American expat by the name of Gary Chodorow who offers legal services in Beijing, Shenyang, Shanghai, and Los Angeles apparently focuses mainly on matters relating to American immigration. In such a scenario, he is relying on his expertise and knowledge of American law. According to his website www.lawandborder.com Gary is admitted to the State Bar of California. However, when a representative for his firm was asked if he advises on Chinese law, the response was a candid and concise: "no." Any requests for Chinese legal advice would be referred to an affiliate law office in China.

Conclusion

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China is changing. This is reflected in almost every area of life. The law is but one area. As is typical with things in China, testing is a step to success. In terms of becoming an attorney, judge, prosecutor or notary, the RMB starts at Sikao. Sikao is no joke. With current pass rates at a paltry average of around ten percent annually, that means a lot of folks are going home crying not cheering after trying their hand at it. Expats at this point, have zero opportunity to be an official attorney in China, not even being able to take the Sikao. There are talks of Sikao changes coming in 2018, however as one Chinese attorney mentioned, the law in China as is true with other countries, falls within the scope of politics. Thus, it probably won't be tomorrow that changes so significant as allowing expats to take the Sikao will be comina

In the interim, there may still exist several big opportunities for expats in China related to the law. One, they could like Gary start a firm that specializes in advising on foreign law for Chinese nationals. No doubt a key to Gary's success is that speaks Chinese. There are countless reasons why locals need solid legal advice on matters overseas. An expat attorney being located locally and ready to communicate in Chinese is quite appealing. Two, co-operation with a local Chinese firm. Since expats can't practice law independently in China, the next best thing may be to align with an established

local firm. In doing so, the Chinese firm possesses the legal right to advise and represent in matters of law within China, yet the expat attorney could be an invaluable liaison in the acquisition and retention of international clients, particularly those of a corporate nature. Still, it doesn't look like the Dashan (大山 dàshān) of the courtrooms will be debuting anytime too soon.



如何走上司法之路

众所周知,在中国升大学的考试叫"高考", 而想进入法律系统的考试,就被称为"司考"。国家 司法考试是担任律师、法官、检察官和公证员所必 须通过的一项考试。司法考试一般确定在每年9月 的第三个周末举行,考试分为两天进行,分别考查 四个试卷,而每年的通过率也只在全国考生人数的 10% 左右。顺利通过司考的学生,下一步是找到一 个可以实习的律师事务所。根据有关规定,所有预 备律师均要有至少一年的实习经验才可以进入到中 国律师协会。

和中国绝大多数的考试一样,司法考试之前也 有很多补习班可供选择。鉴于该考试是一年一举行, 因此补习班大致分为两类,一类是持久战型,还有 一类是突击型。在和一些实习律师交谈的过程中, 我也发现他们并非全部否认补习班存在的意义。自 学考试诚然重要,但向有经验的人吸取一些考试门 道也似乎总是不错的主意。当然,如果你有想法选 择一些补习班,不妨问问前人的意见,以此来做出 正确的选择。截至目前为止,中国的司法考试还尚 未对外国人开放。感兴趣的朋友也只能等到未来再 做计划和打算。

中国正在发生改变,这体现在生活的方方面面, 法律也不过只是其中一项。中国向来推崇考试,而 考试似乎是通往成功的必要途径。想要成为律师、 法官、检察官、公证员,你就得先为司考做做付出。 遗憾的是,外国人还没有机会进入中国的法律系统, 当然也就不能考取司考。有人说 2018 年司考将会 有大的变动,但法律毕竟属于政治范畴,因此外国 人考取还是机会渺茫的事。



Il kids are cute and smar

ARE FOREIGN KIDS REALLY CUTER AND SMARTER? by Charlotte Edwards

 oday's topic comes from two sentences that I've heard more times than I could ever keep track of: "Foreign kids are so cute!" and "Foreign kids are so smart!" Even before my almost nine-year-old was born I heard these comments from well-meaning Chinese family, friends, acquaintances, and even strangers. I still hear them quite often and if I had a dollar for every time I heard such comment, my kids' college funds would be off to a great start!

Of course I have always disagreed with these statements as best I could in a foreign-to-me language because I didn't believe them at all. "Bu yi ding," I say. It's not certain. Of course, as any parent does, early I hoped my kids would have some degree of good looks and of course we wanted them to become intelligent humans. But that wasn't the only thing we focused on. And certainly not when they were babies. Being healthy and happy were our main goals.

As they've gotten older, and started school, we hear the comments about how foreign, and especially mixed (half-Chinese, half-other race), kids are smarter. People assumed my son would be like his father. He started school early, skipped a grade, got the highest score on the gao kao in his city, and went on to get a master's degree during a time when most kids went to work after middle school. But Nathaniel is average. He enjoys studying, works diligently on his assignments and gets

acceptable-to-his-American-mother grades. But that's not okay to his Chinese teachers, peers and their parents (and yes, grades get posted publicly for everyone to see). They have this false belief that he should be smarter, and because he rarely gets full marks on exams, they see him as a failure. So it's well-known that he doesn't take after his dad. He must take after his mom. Ahem. Not guite so. I didn't skip a grade but I did finish college a term early while still getting on the honor roll. People don't consider that our child's intelligence comes from many factors, including how much time parents spend interacting with the child on both educational and non-educational tasks.

Then there's beauty. The most disheartening time this came up was when a mom was commenting on my daughter's curly auburn hair and asked her daughter, "Who is more beautiful, the foreign girl or you?" By the way she asked the question, it was clear that the daughter was supposed to say that my daughter was prettier. And she did. And then the mother told the three year old that she wished the girl was as beautiful as mine. My heart hurt for that little girl. I thought she was adorable. She was petite with striking jet black hair and beautifully tanned skin. I complemented her on her hair and outfit so that she'd hear something positive about her.

Luckily my daughter won't hear many comments like this during the coming months. After six weeks of daily outdoor

swimming lessons and many hours spent playing on their grandparents' farm, my kids are tanner than ever. Among the first things they'll hear when we set foot in our city is how ugly they've gotten, especially Catherine. Her light skin is gone. No one understands how envious my sister is about my daughter's easy-to-tan skin.

Two weeks shy of starting my ninth year as a mother, I insist that there's no one race or gender that's cuter or smarter than another. 
A new teacher's feelings about special education

Time has passed quickly, as I have been working in Jian Hua Autism Rehabilitation center nearly 10 months. Recalling the first time I met a special education teacher, I had so many guestions in my mind and my curiosity became my first motivation to become a teacher. My head was full of doubts as I came to the Center and started the first day of work.

It was on a tense and busy day, that I had the first contact with this group of special children. I didn't know how to face them or how to start to interact with them. While watching the experienced teachers organizing the children to do activities, my admiration spontaneously arose. Being a special education teacher is not as easy as I first thought. In order to teach the children a simple action, it may needs thousands of times to repeat and train. Normal children, don't need to learn deliberately different kinds of life skills such as eating or tolieting. With these special children, we may have to teach them for a year or more. There are a lot of unexpected situations so we need to be flexible. All of which makes me feel I am a fledgling to the special education industry. Thank you to my predecessors who were patient, helping me and giving me guidance. They let me feel the warmth of the team and a supportive force behind me, but also let me have the confidence to stand. The longer I am a special education teacher, the more I know what it takes to be a gualified special education teacher. He or she must have unusual love and patience. But it is not enough, it also need to have a solid professional knowledge and rich teaching experience to support.

Thinking about myself, I had no special educational background and knew very little about autism. So after the induction, it was very important to supplement professional knowledge in this field. I started borrowing books about autism, and started to browse related websites. At the same time, I read some study about children's education. In daily work, I paid more observation, reflections, consulted experienced predecessors modestly and that made up my deficiency continuously.



GOOD MORNING BABY ------ TIANJIN SPECIAL CHILD **REHABILITATION CARE CENTER** by David Wong

his month, Jin Magazine's "The Helping Hand" is identifying a volunteer service in Tianjin that is giving back to our community. We hope to help shed light on their efforts, let people know what they are providing and why and how you can participate and also lend a helping hand. This will be the last article in this series; we hope that you have a better understanding of the many special services being provided by special people in our community.

Good Morning Baby - Tianjin Special Child Rehabilitation Care Center, was initiated by the Chinese Children's Charity Relief Foundation Western Children's Fund in Tianjin. This project, through the integration of social resources, built a public platform for children 14 years old and younger who have congenital diseases.

The organization arranges medical care, keeping the child well and getting good preoperative and postoperative care, while providing professional rehabilitation. This results in an improvement in the quality of life, the establishment of temporary warm home and ultimately hope that the baby return to normal family life. In addition, the volunteers will be what the child can kindly called her family.

The current facility has 10 orphan/patients with different diseases and the need for surgical treatment and postoperative rehabilitation. All daily expenses and treatment costs are covered solely by public donations.

Since its inception, the Morning Baby volunteer team members have assisted a total of 27 orphans and disabled children, and presently care for 10 babies. They are also in need of long-term volunteers that are willing to share their love to help the children.

The founder is Ms. Gao Peizhe高培哲 女士, a lecturer, who was exposed to poor children with poor relief and as a result of her frequent contact with children's welfare institutions and other similar

organizations, realized that orphans and disabled children needed help. In 2013, developed the concept of orphans foster care center and founded Good Morning Baby. So they have been successful at rescuing 27 orphans and disabled children since 2013.

We asked about the meaning of the name: "Good Morning Baby" and it was explained that "It is hoped that every child can open their eyes in the morning for the first time, can see the sunny smile in front of them and will always be able to experience the world's most beautiful scenery. In their world, there will be no abandonment and betrayal, no more loneliness and anxiety. All of our volunteers are willing to work for this, helping all the children to create a paradise that will be their own "

It can be seen by taking any form of public transportation or simply by being on the look out for zombie like humans who almost walk right into you, others or even some objects because they are head down, entranced by a mobile phone video game. What are the games that are memorizing the masses in China?

《王者荣耀》(wángzhě róngyào) accordingly to Baidu Baike features one on one, three on three or five on five battle modes. Onscreen players are controlled by real people linked up via the internet. Users can choose from different personas and then do battle as this character. It is a free download.

《天龙八部手游》(tiānlóng bābù shǒuyóu) is based on an ancient story which also was made into a T.V. series in 2003 as stated by Baidu Baike. Players experience similar things as in the game just mentioned. They can choose their character and fight alone or as a team. They go around in different virtual worlds killing enemies. It is also available for free.

«阴阳师» (yīnyáng shī) is a 3D Japanese themed RPG. It allows players to battle different characters within ancient Japanese virtual environments. It is a free app.

《斗地主》(dòu dìzhǔ) is a poker like video game. Though no real money is required to be spent, it is a digital card match where players gamble to win big. It is a free download.

《三国杀》(sānguó shā) is also a card game. Its name and virtual themes are based on the era of the well-known "Romance of the Three Kingdoms" novel. Players can choose different roles as they attempt to kill the opponent. It is free to download.

The various games mentioned above may be seen being played by gamers out and about. Talking to these folks reveals they play them throughout the day at different times to pass the time spent waiting or traveling. These games and many others are free downloads, however that doesn't mean the companies aren't looking to make money. On the contrary, users are presented with a number of in-app purchases. These usually result in their onscreen character looking better, being more powerful or obtaining some other sort of advantage. By the shear

Damaged vision, disturbed sleep, addictive behavior and increased aggression are other possible problems tied to video games. So it is a case of gamer beware.



The four great inventions

THE FOUR GREAT INVENTIONS

he Chinese are big on culture, especially that which relates to China. Last month we discussed the "The Four Great Novels" (四大 名著 sìdà míngzhù). This month let's tackle "The Four Great Inventions" (四大发 明 sìdà fāmíng). According to Pleco's PLC and CC dictionary along with Baidu Baike these are: paper making (造纸术 zàozhǐ shù), printing (印刷术 yìnshuāshù), the magnetic compass (指南针 zhǐ nánzhēn) and gunpowder (火药 huŏyào). Yet, Baidu Baiku presents an interesting detail about these "four great inventions," namely, they used to be only three! That's right, China's "great invention" count was set at three for sometime. The three originals were printing, the compass, and gunpowder. The article goes on to note in the mid 1800's a missionary from England named Joseph Edkins came to Shanghai to preach and later established a church in Beijing. It is said that Joseph was the first to add a forth item to the list of great inventions, that of "paper making."

So as history had it, the three great inventions of China became four.

Compass (指南针 zhǐnánzhēn)

An expat knows the pain of getting lost in China. It can bring with it a blend of fear and frustration. A handy tool in avoiding and/or alleviating such geographic confusion is the modern day mobile phone equipped with GPS. When using a map app it will display a digital compass with visual indication of any change in direction and position. The psychology behind such high-tech features may well be the tried and trusted compass.

Unlike its current counterpart a compass does not require a battery or carry with it the danger of needing recharged at some critical moment after a long period of use. Instead, though simple in design, the compass is powered by what seems to be a never ending natural energy source. The compact, handy and reliable compass is one of China's so-titled four great inventions. Based on Baidu, the

invention of the compass is largely related to China's early mining of magnetite. This mining experience led individuals at that time to discover the magnetic properties of magnetite and its subsequent ability to indicate direction. The report continues by mentioning despite this awareness, for some years including those around the mid-11th century a complete understanding of why exactly the compass functioned as it did was still lacking. One of such inaccurate ideas which delayed clarity was the reported belief that the earth was flat. It wasn't until the 15-16th centuries that missionaries came to China and began introducing western theories related to how the compass functioned. Of the two theories which influenced the Chinese, one originated with English physician and physicist William Gilbert while the other came from the Belgium born missionary representing the "The Society of Jesus" known as Ferdinand Verbiest. The latter about whom Baidu describes as being: "One of the most influential missionaries to

come to China during the early Qing dynasty and having made important contributions in the transmission of modern western scientific knowledge in China."

Gunpowder (火药 huǒyào).

Baidu Baike places the invention of gunpowder over one-thousand years ago during the Sui and Tang dynasties by an alchemist of that time. Yet as with many inventions, it seems the efforts that led up to the discovery of gunpowder were made for an entirely different purpose. The work of those alchemists of long along reveal humankind's everlasting desire for everlasting life, as they were working on an elixir which would enable endless life without aging. That miracle drug never came to be. Instead of creating something that would prolong and protect life, it seems an invention with capabilities completely to the contrary resulted. The article wraps up by explaining it wasn't until around the 13th century that Europeans started to understand the effects of gunpowder and several more centuries passed before it developed into more advanced forms which included pellet shaped gunpowder. Accordingly, black gunpowder progressively replaced "cold steel" weaponry.

Paper making (造纸术 zàozhǐshù)

The beginning of Chinese paper making according to Baidu Baike was somewhere around the 1st century BCE and is credited to a man named Cailun (蔡伦 càilún). Wikipedia mentions that paper had existed in China back in the 2nd century BCE, but Cailun was responsible for the first major "improvement and standardization" of the process. Both references indicate the key to Cailun's paper making success was the utilization of natural fibers, such as "bark, hemp, silk, and fishing net" instead of using silk which was cost-prohibitive or bamboo because it was too heavy. Wikipedia makes mention of "a legend that says Cai received inspiration for making paper from watching paper wasps make their nests." Still, the fame and glory associated with inventing paper making techniques wasn't enough to give Cailun a pleasant passing. It is reported he died by suicide so as to avoid prison due to a change in political power. He has been revered as the "paper god" (纸神) despite being unable to save himself. The "Cailun Memorial"(蔡伦纪念馆 càilún jiniànguǎn) is located in Hunan Province (湖南 省 húnán shěng). Baidu goes on to chronicle the global impact Cailun's paper making had. For example, it notes: "Word has it during the middle ages in Europe it took over 300 pieces of lambskin to copy a Bible. The transmission of culture was prohibited due to material costs." This barrier was broken thanks to the great invention of paper making.

Printing (印刷术 yìnshuāshù)

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With the economization of paper products people's demand for written works would eventually be satisfied on a level perhaps previously unimaginable. Another piece in the puzzle is China's invention of printing. Baidu Baike puts the earliest of block-printing productions to be between the years of 650-670; a single page of an incantation printed in Indian Sanskrit which is said to have been unearthed in 1974 from a Tang dynasty tomb near Xian. It further reports that historian Deng Guangming has confirmed that block-printing was invented during the Tang dynasty and during the later years of it, such techniques began to be widely utilized. Baidu Baike places the invention of movable-type printing during the Song dynasty and notes eventually this invention spread to Japan, North Korea, the Middle-East

and Europe. In the 15th century the Germans learned how to use alloy-cast characters which marked the beginning of this great invention being promoted throughout Europe.

Conclusion

What started as three great inventions came to be four. The compass, gunpowder, paper making and printing are currently credited as Chinese inventions. These results however may not have been the original intent of the people involved. It demonstrates the value of enduring effort, even if the outcome is different than initially planned. The early stages of globalization can be seen as each of these inventions didn't stay in China but spread worldwide. In addition, humans from other lands contributed to the process of progression either by thought or deed. That said, with knowledge certainly comes consequence as each of China's four great inventions created ripples in the stream of time which extend all the way down until today.

四大发明

在上个月的栏目中,我们介绍了中国的"四大 名著",在文章中我们提到了中国人喜欢用"四"来 归纳总结,那么本期我们就来说说中国的"四大发 明"。

最初,中国其实只有三大发明:印刷术、指南 针和火药。19世纪的时候,英国传教士 Joseph Edkins 把造纸术列入第四个重大发明,于是"四大 发明"的说法就从此流传开了。

指南针就是如今 GPS 的雏形,而且无需担心充 电问题。古代人们在开采矿产的时候,发现了磁铁 的磁力属性,而且这种磁性可以指示方向。但在之 后的很多年里,人们都没有理解指南针工作的原理, 因为当时的人们还错误地认为地球是扁平的。直到 15、16 世纪有西方传教士到中国传播西方现代科学 知识,人们才纠正了以往的错误观念,弄清了指南 针的原理。

火药是 1000 多年前隋唐时期的炼金师发明的。 炼金师的工作是炼成长生不老的丹药,和火药的作 用完全相反。这样的丹药从未炼成过,但却意外地 诞生了这个伟大的发明。13 世纪的时候,欧洲人开 始认识火药,几个世纪后才把火药制造成炸药。

在所有百科书上,造纸术的发明者都是蔡伦, 但在他之前,中国已经开始使用纸张了,只不过蔡 伦对纸张进行了改良并实现标准化生产。蔡伦用树 皮、大麻和渔网这些天然纤维代替造价高昂的丝绸 和质地坚硬的竹子。蔡伦被誉为纸神,在湖南省还 建有蔡伦纪念馆。纸张的发明使得思想、文明和知 识得到更广泛的传播。

在纸张能够批量生产并走进寻常人家之后,人 们对手写资料的需求空前上升,于是另外一个伟大 发明"印刷术"应运而生。木板印刷最早出现在公 元 650-670年的唐代,之后在宋代才出现了活字印刷, 这项技术随后传入日本、朝鲜、中东和欧洲。



have just come back to London from visiting China, my first visit since I left in 2014. Some things had changed and some things hadn't. What were the things that hadn't changed – well the mosquitoes welcomed me with open fangs. Honestly I was driven crazy by them. When I lived in China I slept under a mosquito net, at least I could sleep without worrying, as before I used a net, whilst I was asleep and completely unaware, I apparently was a restaurant made in mosquito heaven a restaurant where the most discerning of mosquitoes dined every night. Unfortunately the critters bit me during the day too. This time I stayed with a friend and I kept pointing out the mosquitoes in her house – however they didn't trouble her as long as I was there. I took a maximum strength repellent with me but the mosquitoes did not understand that they could not and should not bite me.

The second thing that hadn't changed was the heat! Oh my goodness how do people survive in those temperatures. In England at the moment our lovely summer temperature is 12 degrees which I think is perfect, so you can see why the 40 degree heat nearly killed me. I don't think I will be able to go to China in summer again.

This time round I was down south in Hangzhou and Shanghai and it was very different. China has really advanced in the three years that I have been away, and these changes are astounding. As you know Hangzhou is the home of Alibaba. It is an almost cashless city and people do everything by phone. One man said to me "I can leave home without my wallet, but I cannot leave home without my phone as I will not be able to survive".

No phone – no life

My friends produced their phones at every opportunity to pay for everything that needed to be paid for, book restaurants and everything else that needed to be booked, order food etc., in fact their phones could seemingly get anything done. My friends came from Tianjin to see me and before I could tell them about this phenomenon, they produced their phones to book and pay for taxis. We went to a clothes shop and they bought me some presents - they used their phones to pay. How about me? Well for those few weeks life was not convenient at all. Almost everywhere has free Wi-Fi but I was hardly able to take advantage of it. Of course my phone is from England, I do not have a Chinese phone number and all the establishments require that you input a local number to be able to access the internet. I arrived at the train station not knowing this and desperately needed to contact my friends. I went into the KFC to take advantage of their Wi-fi and found out that I could not use it and so could not let my friends know where I was. I asked one of the workers in there what to do, she shrugged her shoulders and said "Mei banfa" but then a supervisor obviously sensing my desperation used her phone to get the code and then gave it to me.

I wanted to buy an ice cream in a well-known international ice cream parlour but when I tried to give them M.O.N.E.Y the waitress apologised and said that she could not open the till as there was no change in it. And you won't believe this but at a supermarket my shopping came to 30.5rmb. The .5 is obviously wu jiao or 50 cents. The young lady on the till said she had never seen one of those notes before and wanted to call someone over to clarify it. I didn't believe that she really didn't know what that particular note was, but at the time I was accompanied



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by a 16 year old girl and she told me that young people in that city hadn't really seen those notes before, although they had seen coins

I took a taxi and gave the driver a 100 yuan note – the taxi fare was 60 yuan. He looked at me in consternation as if he didn't know what to do, then after holding the note aloft for some time and rummaging around in his car, he finally took his wallet out and gave me the change from that.

The cashless city meant more cash in my pocket

I felt like a cheapskate because every time I offered to treat my friends to dinner, me producing my filthy lucre would result in a bewildered stare from the waitresses, ending up with one of my friends saying "Oh don't worry, I will pay, I have my phone". Perhaps they thought I was doing it deliberately, a new spin on someone pretending to have left their wallet at home when in reality they just did not want to pay. In fact everywhere I went, C.A.S.H. was a dirty word.

I wonder how the elderly get on with this development. My mother would have been completely unable to function. We bought her a mobile phone thinking it would be easy to contact her when she was off doing her voluntary work at all hours, but after several failed attempts to reach her, she admitted that she did not take the phone with her when she went out, in fact she hadn't ever even switched it on, in fact she didn't even know where it was. She could not survive in Hangzhou. The older people that I have seen with phones do not use smart phones, they use the most simple type. Also what about buying things in the street from the impromptu sellers that pop up everywhere? They certainly do not accept payment by mobile phone, nor do the markets.

The Mobile Revolution

Incidentally in England there is an option to pay by phone when needing to use a car park space, but in a survey carried out in order to ascertain the popularity of this method, most people confessed that when confronted with the fact that the only option to pay was by phone, they drove away and found another car park. The major reason given for this was mistrust, they thought that there was more chance of them being conned by this method and they would rather talk to a human, hence paying by phone would have limited success here.

Yes China is definitely at the forefront of the mobile revolution and whether or not this method of paying will become as popular in other countries remains to be seen. All I can say is that during my trip to Hangzhou I saved a lot of money, why, because nobody wanted to accept it, so I feel a little apologetic to my friends who had to keep sponsoring me. Oh well what can you do I was willing to spend spend spend – honestly I was. I think that Jack Ma, the founder of Alibaba has achieved

something very great with his vision for a cashless city, my problem was that in Hangzhou I was phoneless.

一座无现金城市

我刚刚从中国回到伦敦,这是我 2014 年离开天 津之后第一次重返中国的土地。阔别几年,有些事情 仍然没有变,比如恼人的蚊子和夏天的酷热,但有些 事情变得让我不知所措了。

这次我的目的地是杭州, 听说这里是阿里帝国的 大本营, 所以你会发现这是一座没有现金流动的城 市, 一切支付仅靠一部手机就能完成。有人跟我说: "我出门可以不带钱包,但忘带手机我就活不了。"

我朋友的手机似乎什么都能做,付款、定餐厅、定 外卖、买衣服,好像全中国的人都有这项技能。对于他 们来说这样的生活很便利,但对于我这个短期旅游的 外国人来说可是大大地不方便了。

虽然我也有智能手机,但是我没有中国电话卡。 智能生活的第一要素就是网络,而我连公共 wifi 都上 不去,因为很多 wifi 都要求输入手机号注册,我却只 能干瞪眼。在火车站,我急需联络到我的朋友,但是火 车站的公共 wifi 需要注册,于是我来到一家快餐店, 虽然这里也有 wifi,但也需要手机号注册。看着我焦急 和绝望的目光,一位好心的店长让我用她的手机号注 册,这才解了我的燃眉之急。

我口袋里揣着很多现金,但就是花不出去,很多 摊贩都没有零钱找给我,出租车司机也是翻边全身才 凑够找我的零钱,这样一来我的确省了不少钱。

尴尬的是和朋友一起吃饭,明明说好是我请的, 可是看到我拿着一叠子现金,服务员露出一副不可思 议的表情,好像我攥着的是不义之财!于是我朋友只 好来解围,说:"没事,没事,我来吧,我用手机付。"于 是我变成了一个不愿意结账而使用下作伎俩的小人。 从什么时候开始人们连钱都不想要了?

我好奇那些用不惯高科技的老人该怎么办。我妈妈就是一个对新事物很迟钝的人,当年我们为了方便 联络她而给她买了一部手机,但从来没有打通过,因 为她从来想不起来用它,甚至都没有开机。生活在杭 州的每个老人都可以熟练使用手机支付吗?

这样"便捷"的生活能在英国实现吗?之前在英国有过一次调查,如果停车场只能通过手机付费,你是否能接受?很多人选择直接开走。可见手机支付在英国的接受度还远远不足,人们对它表现出很强的不信任感。

世界上其他国家的无现金普及程度是否能达到 中国的水平尚不明确,但在中国的这段时间我感觉很 对不起朋友,因为他们总是在资助我。马云打造无现 金城市的构想真的很伟大,但首先你要有一部带中国 号码的手机!

kily, most of your time meeting new Chinese friends will be over drinks, setting a casual atmosphere.

etworking while abroad is an absolute must, not only for finding business connections but for building up a nuanced perspective of the culture which we're engaging with on a daily basis. Many people rush to seek out other foreigners and English speakers when they first arrive in Tianjin which can help alleviate homesickness as you have solidarity amongst people with a similar background. Quite a few foreigners are apprehensive about making friends with locals though. Perhaps in Tianjin, unlike more "international" cities, there's a heightened issue with the language barrier or many people feel that Chinese culture is alien to them. What do Chinese people even like to do? It kind of seems like a nonsensical question but the pastimes of Chinese people and foreigners is somewhat different. As I've been making new friends for myself lately, I've been confronted by the contrast between how foreigner friends enjoy spending their time together versus Chinese friends.

For those in China, especially within the cities, the lifestyles can be drastically different than smaller U.S. cities. Some of the main activities which might amuse Chinese friends is either nonexistent or in short quantity in the U.S. When making new friends it's good to just have an open mind to new activities that you

may not have tried before, for myself KTV was one of those new activities that I had to acquaint myself with after moving to China. For some with anxieties, making Chinese friends can be a harrowing experience as you not only have to deal with language barriers but also an entirely new culture.

Luckily, most of your time meeting new Chinese friends will be over drinks, setting a casual atmosphere. Some of the most common nights out involve simply grabbing drinks and engaging with a few bar games or going out to venues. While concerts and live performances aren't common many people choose to spend evenings packed together in a KTV room, singing songs with friends in a more private atmosphere. Unlike the stereotypical karaoke in the West, KTV in China offers up large private rooms that can accommodate for guite a large group of people. If you're someone who's worried about embarrassing yourself with your signing, the fear is mitigated as you're only embarrassing yourself to a room full of drunken friends, rather than with a room full of strangers. KTVs tend to be a go-to function for a drunken night out and even team building exercises with colleagues.

When venturing out to KTV or bars it's pretty common to have games on hand for customers. Normally in an environment like

KTV, only one person sings a song at a time so having small games on hand can help keep others preoccupied. A common game on hand is usually Liar's Dice, which is also pretty common in the U.S.

Besides table games like Liar's Dice, a well known pastime in China is mahjong, a game played on a table with many different tiles. The game may only be played with three-four players so larger parties may gather around the table and take turns at the end of a match. The game dating back to the Qing dynasty can be tricky for foreigners to get the hang of, especially since the characters and winds tiles rely on a basic understanding of the characters for 1-9 as well as the cardinal directions. Looking up instructions online before you play can give you a decent understanding but usually Chinese friends are excited to teach foreigners how to play the famous game. It's common to see older Chinese men huddles along the sidewalks during temperate days, overseeing a game of mahjong and bantering but the game still holds interest for younger people.

You are not entirely forced into table games with Chinese friends though. Escape rooms are becoming a bit popular in the cities and can be a nice alternative to tabletop games or a laid-back visit to a movie theater. These games put players into a room under



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certain conditions. A story is fed to the participants and they have to work together to solve puzzles within the room or complex to escape and finish the match. These types of games can actually be great with Chinese friends as the puzzles and story are presented in Chinese and offer and opportunity for your new friends to practice quickly translating or give you the opportunity to practice your Chinese.

KTV and escape rooms always build up an appetite and if you are with a group of Chinese friends at night, it's pretty predictable that you will end up at a BBQ, hotpot, or prawn restaurant. All these locations offer a lively nighttime atmosphere for having a large meal with friends. These types of locations are usually open either 24 hours or till early in the morning, allowing parties to stop by for food and more drinks in their packed dining halls. Many of these BBQ locations are not the typical Western BBQ that you may find in the States but rather just a variety of grilled vegetables and meats with spices more suited to Chinese tastes. Hot pot restaurants are always entertaining with a group and feels more like a communal meal. A little bit cheaper but absolutely worth checking out are the ChuanChuanXiang 串串香 locations. Normally you will find these locations in pop up tents along the roads at night. Inside, many people huddle around a giant metal table with a massive boiler in the middle, cooking up hundreds of skewers with a variety of tofus, meats, and vegetables. You pick from the middle boiler at your own volition and save the skewers on the side to be counted up

after your meal. ChuanChuanXiang is not only a great way to stave off the coming cooler season but an excellent way to make new Chinese friends.

Many Chinese men are fans of basketball and football. Finding common ground on this is usually guite easy. While China does have it's own basketball and soccer associations (CBA and CSL respectively) the majority of sports fans follow the NBA and foreigner soccer teams. Some simple games to bond with friends over could be a game of basketball, ping pong, or badminton. If you and your Chinese friends are not amused by sports, video games are also extremely popular here. Games like LoL and CS still dominate the net-cafes but Honor of Kings (王者荣耀) is currently one of the newest MOBA games capturing the market.

While these are only a few stereotypical activities to engage in with your Chinese friends, it is impossible to generalize an entire population. Find common ground in your own interests and hobbies that can be used to build the basis for a more authentic

relationship. Whether it's a shared view on the world or a shared interest in hobbies or media, Chinese people are always open to sharing their own interests as well as learning about the personal interests of foreigners. Most Chinese people just want opportunities to engage with a new culture while also sharing theirs to foreigners. While it can be more comfortable to make friends with other foreigners in Tianiin, it's imperative to make friends with local people as they can give you a greater glimpse into the Chinese lifestyle than the superficial glimpse that most foreigners receive.

如果你不想局限在桌面游戏上,你还可以和朋友 去影院,或者选择密室逃脱。密室逃脱是一个很好的 锻炼中文水平的机会。在经过了一系列的消耗之后, 该是时候找个地方觅食晚餐。火锅、烧烤、虾锅都是 不错的选择。这些餐馆大多24小时营业并且都能提供 氛围不错的小聚空间。

很多中国朋友都是足球和篮球的爱好者,这也是 我们可以找到的共同点之一。三五好友聚在一起,切 磋体育项目也是很好的沟通途径。当然,如果你的朋 友对运动不感冒,那么电子游戏在这里也非常受欢 迎。

WHAT DO YOU HAVE FOR LUNCH by David Wong

f you have spent any amount of time in China, you should know that eating is probably one of the most important activities in the Chinese culture. Lunch is no exception and is usually at noon and is referred to as "Zhong Wu Can" 中午餐 or shortened to "Wu Can" 午餐 or "Wu Fan" 午饭,

Prior to the 1900's or modern industrialization, there was only two meals in the day, the morning meal of breakfast and the evening meal of supper or dinner. During the day, the men were usually outside of the home, returning in the evening to have their meal with the family. With industrialization, workers were given an hour to have something to eat in order to re-energize themselves for the rest of the shift.

In China, its amazing, starting at 11:45 the elevators of the high rise building will be jammed with people trying to rush out for lunch. The same at 1:00, the rush of the hordes returning from lunch, if you are situated on the higher floors, try to avoid these peak hours. Many will finish their

midday meal in record time and have sufficient time for a nice nap after eating. So what to do for lunch?

Pack your own

To avoid the hassle of fighting the elevator traffic and finding a suitable diner, the obvious choice is pack your own lunch. Western choices are very simple, the most common, is likely the "sandwich", named after John Montagu the 4th Earl of Sandwich a British statesman in the 1700's. The sandwich became known as any combination of meats or foods served between two slices of bread, and there are endless types of sandwiches.

Do you know what is an "Elvis sandwich"? Attributed to the King of Rock and Roll, it is made with peanut butter, sliced bananas and bacon. More typical varieties are "BLT" Bacon, Lettuce and Tomatoes or a "Club" which is adding turkey or chicken meat and bacon to the BLT. The advantage of packing a sandwich, is it is guick and no need for utensils, in fact, that was why it was invented, so the Earl could

eat it without interrupting his game of cards.

However, most native Chinese are not keen on cold sandwiches and if you have access to a microwave oven, you can try many of the instant meals such as microwavable noodles, reheated dumplings or Baozi 包子. First make sure you also have access to a refrigerator as most of the food that can be zapped, need to be refrigerated.

Also make sure what is the company policy on eating at your desk; in speaking with Victor from Canada, he indicated that because his company receives many visitors during the day, eating lunch at the desk is forbidden. Having said this, if you are allowed to eat lunch at your desk, try to pick items that won't smell up the office, you may like Stinky Tofu 臭豆腐 Chou Tofu or the West equivalent of Roquefort Cheese, but be considerate of your neighboring colleagues.

No matter how attractive the packed lunch or reheated items are, most times it is good to have a break from the workplace.

Staying in the same place for the whole day can become very stressful and a change of scenery can refresh the brain and recharge vourself for new ideas.

For those of you that are fortunate enough that your company has a canteen or cafeteria, these problems will not have to be considered. For example, Victoria is also from Canada and she is lucky to have an administrative job at the new Nankai University campus, which has a large cafeteria and also many on campus food outlets, at very reasonable cost.

Daily Specials

Just as the first factories spawned chophouses nearby, there are likely a variety of restaurants near your work place. If you are in a high-rise shopping center, no doubt there will be many choices in the B1 or B2 levels. They will be very competitive and western outlets usually have daily specials that have a set menu offering soup, main course, dessert and a drink, all at a reasonable price, between 50-90rmb.

No problem if you are dining alone, but in a group, it gets complicated and delivery of meals may be haphazard with one person waiting if they have ordered something different. It really becomes awkward, when you insist that the person with the delivered food start without you, but he or she feels it is rude to do so.

You don't need to face this problem with Chinese meals, but you need to come to a general agreement of what dishes the group will order. There is usually a "take charge" person that will do the ordering and used to obtaining consensus from the group. In the past, it was customary for someone to fight for the bill and people will take turns with hosting, but the new trend is going "AA" or going "Dutch" and splitting the bill.

Some restaurants will have a membership card to encourage repeat customers and offer a discount or free item after a number of visits – Starbucks and some of the burger outlets are examples, where you will be given a free drink or burger after earning sufficient points. Most restaurants will give you an on-the-spot discount if you scan their OR code and follow their wechat.

Ouick and convenient

Convenient stores are places where

you can buy any daily necessity at any moment. Among the big chains brands such as Lawson, Family Mart, there is only 711 that can be found in Tianjin. They have a very good selection of the three meals of the day. At lunch hours, the hot Hefan (fried dishes plus rice) is always popular as you can choose from at least ten dishes including meats and vegetables. Sandwiches and salads are for those who only want a light lunch and they can go with bottled juices or fresh coffees. Although these convenient stores are far from being everywhere, you can always find one nearby an office building in CBD.

Delivery

Another alternative is to order your meal from your favorite restaurant. There are dozens of apps that provide this service and cost is usually 5-7 rmb depending upon the distance to be traveled and if it is during peak hours of dining. A few of the most popular services are: Elema 饿了么 which literally means: "Are you hungry?" another app is Dianping Waimai 点评外卖 literally means "Takeout Sales" is part of the DianPing user-driven restaurant service. Baidu also uses the Waimai term for their delivery service. The familiar kangaroo logo seen on the delivery scooters belongs to Meituan Waimai 美团外卖 meaning " Great Team Takeout Sales"

Scrolling down the restaurants list can take an hour if you don't guite know Chinese or don't really know what you want. You can mark the restaurants you like and next time directly order from previous orders. Pizzas, burgers and kebabs of trustable brands are available on delivery apps but you have to be no farther than 3k from them. Order as early as possible because the delivery takes very long time during peak hours. And when weather is bad, the delivery fee rises and your meal would come much later. Please be sympathetic to the delivery guy and be patient!

services, you will find that most restaurants will be willing to delivery for free if you are close and many restaurants will have their own service.

THE DEEPER MEANING **OF DEODORANT** by Kate King and Carmen King

eodorant is an interesting topic here in China. It is not something you think about very often, but when it does come up, it's a real head scratcher. Growing up in the States, the topic of deodorant is pretty common. Do I want natural or traditional. Do I want a spray, roll-on or a stick? There is also the never ending trial and error of finding a deodorant that doesn't leave your clothes caked with white chalk. Other than these thoughts, whether or not someone will use deodorant is, for the large part, a given. Which one to use is the question? So, other than some random moments of thinking about it while you're in the store, it's kind of a non-thought. Until you come to China.

It wasn't until arriving in China and walking through the grocery store over and over, that one day it dawned on me that I had never seen deodorant anywhere! In the states there are whole aisles dedicated to deodorant, but here, oddly, nothing. I found it almost incomprehensible, so I went on a specific search. After some scouring, I finally found a tiny area with some items that looked like deodorant. One was from Adidas. I had no idea Adidas made deodorant! Even still, the bottle was tiny! So there were maybe one or two choices in a very obscure location and that was the extent of the selection.

Do Chinese people wear deodorant? I've come to find that deodorant is not widely

used in China. Just within the past few years have people started becoming somewhat aware of it and starting to use it.

What is deodorant? Where did it come from?

Deodorant is a substance that is applied to the under arm area to prevent body odor. It does not stop sweat, but it is intended to kill the bacteria that interacts with our sweat. This interaction is what causes body odor. So, no bacteria, no odor. There are also types of deodorant that are called antiperspirants. These, like deodorant, kill the bacteria but then go a step further to actually prevent sweating, keeping the under arms nice and dry. Well, at least more dry than if you weren't using it. One of the issues that many people have with antiperspirants is that they use aluminum as one of the ingredients. There are possible links between aluminum and certain diseases, so some choose to use more natural products, but, as is often the case, the natural product don't always provide the same result. So, when it comes to deodorant, do your own research and choose what works best for you.

Where did it come from?

According to my research, it seems that the first deodorant was invented in the States near the end of the 19th century, with the first antiperspirant coming along somewhere

When all is said and done, deodorant certainly has its usefulness. Particularly noticeable when everyone is smashed together on the subway. So, remember to think of others and do what you can to control your body odor especially when in confined spaces and rather formal circumstances. This can include venues like attending class, going to work and associating at a friend's house. Bad body odor reflects badly on oneself. BUYING FRUITS AND VEGETABLES by Carmen King

s our cashless cover detailed, shopping online and paying digitally via Alipay or WeChat is quite popular these days. Items being purchased include fruits and vegetables.

The two biggest differences in buying methods for fruits and vegetables are in-person or online. In person options mainly include going to a market or store. However there are also those purveyors of produce via carts, tarps and trucks. Buyers should be aware though, such sellers may not be licensed vendors. Therefore, the quality of their goods could be highly guestionable. Water injected watermelons and unregulated chemical use are but a few issues. Generally speaking, these are probably illegal sellers subject to fine and/or being run off at any moment. That's why their location and availability is anything but reliable.

Buying at local produce markets (菜市 场 cài shìchǎng) offers buyers a slightly more standardized environment. Yet, again it is buyer beware. While these vendors at least have gone so far as to legitimize their business by renting a stall or booth in a designated building for selling food, where exactly they are sourcing their goods is still subject to question. After all, there are no "real brands" being made available. Do not trust those stickers or labels. Anyone can

obtain those "Dole,""Sunkist," or "Washington Grown" stickers and stick them on whatever they want to. I'm sorry but do not be so naive as to believe things are what they seem to be. Unregulated pesticide use is also a real concern. But again, its possibly better than buying street side from that person who is about to flee at any moment.

Stores or supermarkets theoretically go one step further in ensuring fruits and vegetables are fit for human consumption and are as advertised. Usually by size, shape, color and taste the authenticity of "imported" products can be confirmed. However, it is still no guarantee. The issues with stores is that the fruit or vegetables often are not the freshest, over priced, and hard to lug home. This is due to many expats not having their own cars. Online vendors such as Jingdong

(京东 jīngdong), Taobao (淘宝 táobǎo), Tianmao (天猫 tiānmāo), Meituan Waimai (美团外卖 měituán wàimài), Baidu Waimai (百度外卖 bǎidù wàimài), Shunfeng Youxuan (顺丰优选 shùnfēng yōuxuǎn),1 Haodian (1号店 hàodiàn), Meiri Youxian (每日优鲜 měirì yōuxiān), and our local Tianjin expat Daniel from Fresh Farm Plus (www.freshfarmplus.com) featured recently in JIN, offer fruits and vegetables. The biggest advantage is they all deliver. The

caveat is like the "Tips" article this month details, receiving packages has its own challenges. That said, overall these days buying online trumps in-person. Mainly due to convenience and avoiding death marches with heavy goods. Of course, buying online means inability to hand pick each edible item. Some rotten fruits or vegetables may be received. Though this usually is the exception and not the rule. Plus customer service of the vendor can be contacted for compensation. Based on current conditions, the top priority when purchasing fruit and produce is safety not price. Paying more for imports (进口 jìnkǒu), certified organic (有机 yǒujī), or at least "green food" (绿色食品 lǚsè shípǐn) is definitely worth considering.

He will arrive in two minutes. After the ride is finished, we can pay him directly through Wechat. Hope we don't need that wallet today!

11:30am

Getting hungry again, we look outside and see the pollution is particularly heavy today. We choose not to go out for lunch. Thankfully, we can use the Food Delivery option in our Wechat to order almost anything we feel like. Let's do dumplings. Boom. Paid for and will be delivered hot and fresh in 30 minutes or less.

3:59pm

We get the dreaded text message that our phone will lose service in a half an hour. Having no time at all to go down to the mobile storefront, we can quickly tap over to Wechat Wallet's Mobile Top-up function to pay our bill. Our phone service is safe once again.

7:12pm

We've got a hot date planned tonight and she mentioned she loves hot pot. Now to find one that will accept Wechat as payment. Luckily, almost every restaurant

in the city now has the easy function in their cash registers or walls. We enjoy a lovely dinner and conveniently show our phone's payment QR to cover the cost of delicious meal. Our date is obviously impressed.

10:33pm

There we are watching a movie with our new girlfriend and the power suddenly goes off! Looks like we forgot to add credits to our electricity this month. It's kind of late and we would rather not bother our landlord about it. Wechat saves the day again! We can add a couple red rambos of credit and the TV comes back on.

Thanks to the ubiquity of Wechat's QR code scanner and reader, anyone from a street food stall manager to an elderly taxi driver to even our utility bills can be paid digitally with this wonderful all-in-one app. We can go days without needing cash and if you forget your wallet as you walk out the door, you need not worry. Just don't forget your charger at the same time.

RECEIVING PACKAGES

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ased on experience, the absolute best case scenario for receiving packages is to use an easily identifiable, locatable, and accessible address which has someone stationed there during usual business hours every day. An example of this would be an office or store that has a worker there daily from say 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM. Granted, sometimes delivery attempts happen outside these hours, but the fact that the majority of the time, someone is there to receive the package is a huge step in the right direction. In addition, the person there needs to speak and understand Chinese very well. This is because the delivery agent often calls to confirm, who you are, where you live, and when you will be home, etc. Seems unnecessary but all too common. Sadly, they don't also have the best communication skills, can be from other areas and may not even speak standard Mandarin. This can make for a frustrating and unclear call for the novice. Be aware, if you don't pick up your phone after several attempts to be reached it could result in the package not even being delivered and instead left somewhere else. That location may be inconvenient and difficult to find.

When entering a delivery address, make sure the address is accurate. Double

check it by asking multiple people, such as the apartment manager or going to the nearest post office and talking to an agent. If the package is being sent from abroad, email the sender a document with the address in both English and Chinese. When filling out the packing slip they can fill in English. Then tape the address in Chinese to the outside of the box and use packing tape to cover the paper entirely so that it won't get damaged or become unreadable.

Another tactic is talk to your school, employer, or trusted local friend and see if you can use their name, address and phone number for the local contact. However be sure your name is also included on the shipping label so you can make claim to the package. Be sure to get the tracking number from the sender. You can take this number to any post office and check on its progress. However, it may not be in their system until after the package has entered China. Another odd detail is sometimes the overseas tracking system will show "attempted delivery" when in fact the local receiver has never even been contacted. Should you see this, it's a good time to go to the nearest post office from the delivery address and check on the package. In some cases, the package will be there and can be taken after showing a

government issued identification for the receiver. They often want to see the original I.D., so be sure to bring it. If someone is trying to pick up the package for another person, both the receiver and designated pickup person's I.D. likely will be needed. Be aware, if the package has sat at the post office for a few days, a storage fee may be charged. If it came from overseas, tax may be due. All packages are subject to being opened and investigated. Note, some post offices rent post office boxes which could help those without a reliable address.

收快递的注意事项

快递虽然快捷,但接收快递有时又很麻烦。首 先,你要选择一个在工作时间有人接收的地址,通常 是办公室或小区旁边的小商店。快递员在上门之前都 会给收件人打电话确认信息以及是否在家,但是很多 快递员都有浓重的口音,对中文不好的外国人来说是 个挑战,常常会鸡同鸭讲。如果电话总是联络不到 人,快递员只能把包裹放在别处,通常会很难找。

你自己的邮寄地址一定要用中文填写准确,不确 定就去问问物业管理员或邮局。如果包裹是从国外寄 来的,你可以把中文地址通过电子邮件发给寄件人, 让他打印出来贴到包裹外面,再用透明胶带封好以免 字迹被污染损坏。

如果你实在搞不定,就去求求周围同事或可靠的 朋友,是否能用他们的名字和电话收快递。另外还要 保存好运单号以便查询快递状态。从邮局提取包裹需 要身份证或护照,所以去之前一定带好了你的证件, 以兔白跑一趟。

here is no greater symbol of China than its Great Wall. It snakes physically across the north as a visceral reminder of this ancient power, a long penetrating presence reaching across Asia. It exemplifies China's flair for grand projects and for its people, as numerous and their customs as established, as the stones. A barrier that still embodies suspicions of protectionism, motifs of control and the trope of inscrutability.

Its name 'The Great Wall' is, however, a bit of a misnomer; the name suggests it is one long structure. In reality, it comprises sections of varying styles and designs, with numerous branches, of trenches and natural barriers. Parts built centuries ago have tumbled to ruin, others have been rebuilt, maintained and enhanced, so that no two sections are the same. Thinking of The Great Wall as a single entity ignores its complex reality, like its use as a metaphor, it's a sweeping generalisation.

Badaling

Probably you've been to Badaling. It's the most popular tourist site for seeing and

walking on the wall. Part of its popularity is its closeness to Beijing and ease of transport, it's also where Mao Zedong famously remarked You're not a real man if you haven't climbed the Great Wall. Badaling was the first section of the wall to be restored and it looks new. It's wide and solid, surrounded by large car parks and souvenir stalls. During the national holidays it's rammed with families clambering to get a selfie on its ramparts. Despite all this, it's still impressive; the scale of reconstruction itself a huge achievement. It stretches away into the distance and it's easy to imagine you could walk east to the sea or west to the edge of the empire. Despite the huge numbers of people present at Badaling, a half hour walk in either direction and you are likely to be almost alone to enjoy 4kms of rugged countryside before the walk ends.

Mutianyu

Mutianyu is another popular site for the wall. It's more out of the way, but can be reached by bus from downtown Beijing. Many people start, or end their hikes at this point and the area is dotted with farmhouses converted

into hotels. Although nowhere near as popular as Badaling it still has the trappings of tourism, but on a smaller scale. Although there is a Subway and a Burger King there are many Chinese restaurants serving reasonable (if slightly pricy) food, some with pleasant outdoor seating areas where you can watch people. You can reach the wall by walking through the woods or take a shuttle bus then a chair lift up to the top.

For the purist traveller, the installation of a modern chairlift may feel like a desecration of a UNESCO heritage site and that using it encourages more unsympathetic development. But to be fair, the walk up to the wall is not particularly interesting, and unless you're very keen on hiking, the time and energy is better spent enjoying the wall, rather than the approach. The chairlift is surprisingly pleasant, swaying over the canopy of trees, silent except for the constant chirp of the cicadas

This section of the wall has been restored too, but more sympathetically than at Badaling. It is the section most likely depicted in pictures and on leaflets. The watch towers



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and steep pathways against the background bands of inky mountain peaks make great photographs. This is how I always imagined the wall to look.

Walking east from Mutianyu the wall rises in a series of quick and very steep stairs before ending at one of the watchtowers. From the windows you can see how the unrestored wall would look, but sadly can't continue. East the hike is longer, it's possible to walk to Jiankou.

If you hike to Mutianyu from the East or return the same way you can get a toboggan ride down. Again, hardly in keeping with the character or setting of the wall, but really good fun.

Jiankou

Jiankou is the section titled 'The wild wall'. A segment of wall in the Beijing area that has gone relatively undisturbed since it was built. This is partly due to its remote location, away from the city sprawl and main roads. Getting there is more difficult and requires a car or a couple of bus changes and a local taxi, then some moderate hiking. But it is the most dramatic and original section remaining. It's higher, steeper and more winding than the other sections and at 20kms long is the area for the serious hiker. Despite its remoteness, it is popular with hikers and therefore not immune from drink and food vendors. Unlike

Badaling and Mutianyu, the sellers here are more likely to be old women from a nearby village, who somehow manage to haul bottles of drinks up what is quite a difficult, but enjoyable climb through a steaming jungle, culminating with a makeshift ladder to the top. The most popular hike is South to Mutianyu, which takes about 4 hours. There are steep rises and descents, trees and bushes to get around and loose stones underfoot. The North route to Huanghuacheng is the most dangerous length of the Wall. Sky Ladder, The Eagles Flies Facing Upward and Beijing Knot give some clues as to the incredible features on the way. Some parts are so decrepit and steep that it can only be completed on hands and knees, painstaingly picking a route across the loose rubble. If you complete this hike you will be among the few. I turned back at the first steep section. In consolation, there is a trout farm nearby where you can catch a fish and have it bar-b-queued or prepared for eating

raw with wasabi - delicious.

The seasons change. The summer green turns to autumn hues, the bleak greys of winter then the cherry blossoms of spring. Each offers another view, just as these three sections of the wall offer very different experiences. And this is just one small area of its entire length. To truly know The Great Wall is, perhaps like knowing China, impossible in one lifetime.



慕田峪长城同样很有名,但是游客人数要比八 达岭长城少一些。缆车的设置让人感到是对长城的 亵渎,但如果你坚持靠双腿攀爬的话,会发现其实 也很乏味,除非你是个徒步爱好者。慕田峪长城就 是我想象中长城的样子, 蜿蜒陡峭的石梯和错落修 建的瞭望台非常入画。除了缆车,在下长城的时 候,你还可以体验一下超级滑梯,坐在一个单人滑 板上,顺着金属滑道一路下滑,你不像是在游览长 城, 倒像是在游乐园里玩耍。

箭扣长城被称为"野长城",保持着原始的风 貌,这是因为它的地理位置更加远离城区,而且交 通不便利,如果不是自驾,你要在多种交通工具之 间来回切换才能到达。总长20公里的箭扣长城是徒 步爱好者的乐园,和其他长城比起来,它更高、更 陡峭、更蜿蜒,你能体验到丛林中攀登的乐趣。

很多徒步者选择慕田峪长城的南端,全程大概4 个小时。这段路程有很多起伏的陡坡,被茂密的树 丛和灌木包围,路上布满松动的石块。慕田峪北面 是最危险的一段路,有些路段只能徒手攀登,恐怕 很少有人能走完这段路程,反正我是知难而退了。

ou and most of our readers probably have no idea where is WuHu. Located in Anhui province it is about a 2-hour flight or a 4-hour train ride from Tianjin and neither being a direct route, it is surely not a well-known tourist destination. However, this sleepy hideaway has much to offer and worth the trip if you are planning to be in the area, in nearby locations such as Nanjing 南 京in neighboring Jiangsu province or the famous Yellow Mountain黄山"HuangShan" also in Anhui; take an extra few days and you will be surprised.

WuHu is the second largest city in Anhui province following its capital, Hefei. Wuhu has a population of about 5 million people and speak a local dialect but almost everyone will also speak Mandarin. The name WuHu literally means "Reed Lake" and sits on the Yangtze River also better known in China as "Chang Jiang"长江or Long River. In fact, it is the longest river in Asia and third longest in the world, after the Amazon in South America and the Nile in Africa.

WuHu became known as a major inland port as early as the Three Kingdom period in 200BC and remains the fifth largest port along the Yangtze River. It was occupied by Japanese forces in December 1937 and was the staging point for the battle of Nanjing, during this time, Chinese resistance fighters hid in the lakes surrounding WuHu by submerging themselves and breathing

through reeds, which makes its Chinese name, quite appropriate

What to eat

WuHu Cuisine and nearby Anging city make up YanJiang Cuisine which is part of the Anhui or Hui Cai 徽菜, one of China's Eight Culinary Traditions. This type of cooking is known for dishes prepared with aquatic products and fowls, featuring clear, refreshing, crisp, tender, delicious and mellow tastes compared to the heavier northern flavors that we are used to in Tianjin.

Egg Dumplings 农家蛋饺"Nong Jia Dan Jiao" are dumplings, usually associated with rural cooking, using thin sheets of egg instead of flour for the wrapping, traditionally use pork as a filling. In preparation, a ladle is lightly coated with oil and heated, well-beaten eggs are spooned into the ladle and cooked until the mixture forms a dumpling wrapper. The pork filling is then spooned into the egg wrapping and the entire dumpling steamed. It is often served with soy sauce.

Noodles such as Beef Noodles 牛肉面 "Niu Rou Mian" and Shrimp Noodles虾籽面" Xia Zi Mian. Many local dishes feature noodles and pasta rather than rice, which is more predominate in Southern Chinese cooking.

There are some other dishes that most foreigners would steer clear of such as the infamous Stinky Toufu 八公山臭豆腐"Ba Gong Shan Chou Dou Fu" which is from a specific district in Anhui and Steamed Stone Frog 清蒸石蛙"Qing Zheng Shi Wa" which is probably ok if you were not told what kind of meat and it was stir fried and not recognized, there's just something too cute about a frog that forbids most foreigners from partaking it in a meal. For many of these dishes and local snacks, try the Fenghuang Food Street 凤凰 美食街between Yinhu South Road 银湖南 路 and Zhongshan North Road 中山北路.

What to see

Top of the list is the Yangtze River or Chang Jiang. This magnificent river flows thru the center of WuHu or probably the city grew around the river. There are many vantage points

The WuHu Yangtze River Bridge is a combined rail and automobile, double-decker Cable Bridge that has an incredible total of approach lanes stretching over 10,000 meters. The bridge is very high to allow for the heavy cargo traffic on the river.

Another excellent viewing point for the river is from the Executive Lounge of the Hilton hotel which is in the WuHu central business district and along the Yangtze and the view is unobstructed and no matter during the day or at sunset, the scene is unforgettable and give you a good idea of the majesty of the mighty river. Right across the street from the Hilton is the Saint Joseph's Cathedral, a beautiful church that was built about 100 years ago and is well preserved and still open for service and mass.

Where to stay

The Fantawild Adventure Park is one of China's largest theme parks with 125 million square meters and 15 different zones at an investment of 1.5 billion rmb. For a more tranguil stop, try the Tianmen Mountain Park 天门公园 which is by the Yangtze river in Jiujiang District. It has a wonderful Buddhist temple with beautiful mountain and scenic views. For those not so athletic, there is a cable car and minibus to the top. In the evening, there is a local performance, so you spend a full day at this venue.

Ascott Passes 100 Property Milestone in China and Begins Service in Harbin

CapitaLand's wholly owned serviced residence business unit. The Ascott Limited (Ascott), recently announced that its serviced apartment numbers have passed the 100 property milestone in China. home to the next occurs when suddenly a person has pushed through all the pain, achieved pretty much everything they came to accomplish, and not longer feels any overwhelming urge or necessity to leave. It is at this point, that leaving may no longer represent giving up and going home, but rather leaving what has in actuality become home.

Where is home Where is home Where is home Where is home HOME ISN'T HOME ANYMORE by Carmen King

t's been said home is where the heart is. Ask a Chinese person and the answer may different. Some might say home is where they were born. Others might say home is where they have a house. For expats living in China, the issue of where "home" is can be complicated. In flight, there is a point where either you are going to fly or possibly die trying. Living abroad can sometimes feel similar. At a certain point, the speed is far too fast to stop, the plane is rattling, and the runway is about to run out.

The runway often comes in terms of cash, or more commonly the lack there of. The cover article discussed at length one form of cashless-ness. Sadly, for the average expat trying to make it in China, the meaning of cashless is far too literal for comfort. It is one thing to be broke and know worst case scenario one can go sleep on their parent's couch. It's whole different thing to be walking around a place which is a million miles from what was formerly known as home and be nearly bankrupt. It is uncomfortable and unsettling to say the least. Then comes that moment of realization, like with taking flight, it's either going to all come together and make for a lovely adventure or end in disaster. The point is, the outcome is no longer entirely up to the person. We are in many ways, simply along for the ride.

Such experiences may in themselves be where the line starts to get crossed, and the transformation starts to occur and "home" is no longer "home." As Phil Barkley's comments reveal in his interview this month, living abroad really starts when major bumps in the road are hit and instead of running away, one faces them head on, and in Chinese. This is intimidating to say the least even eerie for expats. Yet, as a few of these major incidents pass by and end up in the rear view mirror, it can lead to a day when one realizes they are "homeless" or if further along in the process, no longer visiting but actually "home" despite being far from Kansas.

The feeling of homelessness can come when realizing one has lived too long away from their place of birth to actually go back and simply pick up where they left off, however still do not feel entirely comfortable in their new location of habitation. It could be said, the person is neither this nor that, neither here nor there. It isn't exactly pleasant. This is definitely a point of critical mass. If an expat slams on the brakes, closes up shop, and guickly returns to their country of origin, than perhaps within a relatively reasonable period of time they can re-assimilate into their native habitat. If though, they step on the gas and make every effort to take flight, it is not without risk of failure. The full move from one
