Zhongguancun opens branch park in Tianjin 天津滨海—中关村科技园揭牌

The Tianjin (Binhai) Zhongguancun Science Park was inaugurated on Nov 22. At the same ceremony, 45 Beijing enterprises committed to investing in Tianjin. The Administrative Committee of Zhongguancun Science Park in Beijing selected the Beitang enterprise zone, located in the Tianjin Economic-Technological Development Area, to be the home of a Zhongguancun Science Park branch, a result of cooperation between Beijing and Tianjin.

Selected Subway Stations Now Support **Online Ticket Purchasing** 部分地铁站可网上买票

Recently, Tianjin Metro Operation Company installed two cloud ticket machines at Gu Lou Station on Line 2 and at Da Xue Cheng Station on Line 3. After a trial operation period of one month the two machines are running well and meeting travellers' demands. From December 2nd, Cao Zhuang, Binhai International Airport, Tianjin South and Hua Bei Ji Tuan Stations also received the new machines. This enables passengers to buy their tickets on the internet and then print them out at the cloud ticket machines at these stations.

Spring Airlines Begins Tianjin - Tokyo Flights 春秋航空开通天津-东京新航线

China budget airline Spring Airlines will begin flights from Tianjin-Binhai to Tokyo' s Narita airport on January 28. The Boeing 737-800 will have 189 seats and will commute between Tianjin and Narita on Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays according to a statement from the airline. The flight number will be IJ1032 and the planned departure time from Tianjin-Binhai Airport is 16:35 which will see arrival at Tokyo' s Narita at 20:50. The return flight number is IJ1031, with a planned departure time from Tokyo's Narita of 12:20 and it will arrive in Tianjin- Binhai Airport at 15:25. The opening of these new flight routes to Narita will help meet the growing demands of tourists and business people needing to travel to Japan.

China approves railway plan for Jing-Jin-Ji megacity 发改委批复京津冀城际铁路网规划

China has approved a 247 billion yuan railway plan to improve transport links between the capital Beijing, the port city of Tianjin, and the neighbouring province of Hebei, part of plans to integrate the three areas into a mega-city. The National Development and Reform Commission said that the plan will span nine projects that total 1,100 kilometers long. These projects will be built over the years to 2020, and are part of a wider plan that will stretch to 2030. The current population of the three areas is estimated at around 110 million, and by the time it's complete, the so-called Jing-Jin-Ji project will span 212,000 square kilometers, or more than twice the size of South Korea.

Tianjin to open Luban workshop in India 天津在印度建设"鲁班工坊"

Seven professional teachers from Chennai, India, have recently finished their training in Tianjin and will become the first teachers at their local Luban workshop to share their vocational education achievements. The overseas Luban workshops are intended to help local schools train certified skilled talents. In addition to providing teachers returned from China, the new Indian Luban workshop will open online courses to benefit more students. Both Tianjin and Chennai will organize China-India skills competitions and promote internationalization of the workshops and the contests. The first Tianjin Luban Workshop was established in Thailand in April, 2016 and the second one will be established in India next April, signaling that Tianjin vocational education has started to influence other countries.

Tianjin Binhai area's GDP exceed 1 trillion yuan became the first national zone 天津滨海新区成为首个GDP过万亿元的国家级新区

The gross output of Tianjin Binhai New Area, is predicted to exceed 1 trillion yuan (\$144 billion), becoming the most productive of the country's 18 national zones. In the first three quarters, the GDP of Binhai New Area hit 680 billion yuan, up 10.7 percent year-on-year, data for Binhai New Area government. The area in the northern port city of Tianjin was officially inaugurated in 2010. It covers 2,270 sq km and has a population of nearly 3 million. It also contains major parts of Tianjin Free Trade Zone. The growth of the area is closely related to its manufacturing and scientific research transformation, said Jiang Ning, vice president of Binhai Research Institute. Fixed asset investment in the area has reached 1.5 trillion yuan and foreign investment hit \$33 billion. In order to boost regional development, China has 18 national "new areas" -- seven in the east, two in the central region, three in the northeast and six in the west.

THE VARIOUS FESTIVALS OF EAST AND WEST

ome wait all year for these festivities, considering Christmas and New Years as very special times. Christmas is considered a religious holiday celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ, thus the name, "Christ Mass" and is recognized each year on December 25. There are several churches in Tianjin and all will have a Christmas Midnight Mass. Despite its continued popularity an online search about the real birthdate of Jesus will reveal a number of results. In fact there is evidence that December 25 isn't even his real birthdate, but rather was adopted around the 4th century as a means to give existing festivities a "Christian" flavor. While the exact date of Jesus birth may not be known exactly, this tradition of Christmas has spread from West to East.

Old China hands, a term some use to refer to expats who have lived here for 10 years or more, likely remember a time when few if any public Christmas events where held. Holidays which were considered "Western" in nature may only have existed within small circles. It is incredible though, how much the December 25th date has been integrated into modern China life. This includes big holiday sales at the malls and as mentioned a huge Christmas feast at pretty much every major hotel in town. This is just one of the ways that living in China is nowhere near as "foreign" as it used to be.

While the main festivities around this time of the year vary based on culture and religious belief, it may be of interest to review the main activities associated with each. The food, practices and dates differ. However, there are a number of common threads. One, they seem to bring attention to the time of year, that is an end of one year and the beginning of another. Two, they stress festivity, big gatherings and lots of group activity. Three, they all are quite commercial. The seeming mandatory nature of gift giving, eating out, hosting events and attending parties ensure there is plenty of economic exchange going on. It generates a massive amount of profit for businesses. So too it can create a tremendous amount of stress on folks trying to keep up with the Jones' or simply desiring to be a part of everything. Four, they have ties to worship or veneration of some deity or sacred ritual. Below we will discuss each festivity and their popular practices.

Festive Gifts

Aside from the spiritual nature of these holidays, with each of the nationalities having their own routines, the general feeling of goodwill and a positive attitude is prevalent. The commercial and retail sectors have certainly capitalized on these festive seasons as well. Shopping malls, hotels and restaurants will have displays of Santas, Christmas trees and decorations as early as November.

Expats that celebrate Christmas will exchange wrapped gifts on the eve of the holiday, December 24th or the morning of the 25th. During Hanukkah, Jewish families will give money to their children, called Hanukkah Gelt. The Chinese will celebrate the New Year or Spring Festival by handing out "Red Envelopes" (红包hóngbāo) to the almost everyone, including children, colleagues, friends and parents. These envelopes will contain cash usually in an even count and not odd numbers.

If expats are visiting local Chinese friends during the Chinese New Year, giving red packages to their children will be custom. The rule of thumb is as long as the child is not married; they are entitled to a gift. The amount will depend upon the relationship. If they are very close friends probably two 100 RMB notes will do. If not so close and the children are younger, two 10 RMB notes are fine. If visiting Chinese friend's at their home, it is understood that one will not go empty handed. In addition to the "Hong Bao" guests are expected to bring gifts of fruit, wine or flowers. However traditionally flowers are colorful and not white. Despite the overseas acceptance of white lilies, be aware white flowers are linked with death in Chinese culture, thus are only suitable for funerals.

Every year tends to have its "hot" gifts. Especially during Christmas time this results in no small amount of drama. For example the Hatchimals have made the news not just for their popularity as gifts but for their being horded and then exploited. Time.com reported on a number of different Hatchimal "resell" cases. Some stories are fairly straightforward, being nothing more than the usual buy low and sell high. The one person everyone seems to have taken the biggest issue with is Sara Gruen. Previously known for literary exploits, now she has found herself on the front page because of her Hatchimal exploits! Based on Time.com's report she did so not with selfish motives, but an altruistic one, allegedly looking to use the profit from Hatchimal resales for freeing a supposed wrongly accused individual. This holiday gift-giving related scandal is nothing new though. It brings back memories of the Tickle Me Elmo incident. Really, it is guite tragic that a tradition claiming to be all about giving has a history of fostering greed in some.

Even if stuff isn't being given, passing around cash stuffed envelopes doesn't get any

less dramatic. For one it creates a level of responsibility, even inescapable pressure to prepare a huge amount of money just for the holiday season. Going to a holiday dinner at a friend's or family's home is more like going to a top concert. Don't expect to get in without spending some cash! It would be unthinkable for guests to show up simply to "share a meal". From young to old, from East to West, there would be disappointment, even anger over failing to give the obligatory monetary gift. Not only must one give, but giving the correct amount is critical in the East. It can be as simple as avoiding the wrong "number" of bills or include the more complex challenge of discerning how much money is considered respectful.

While movies and media love to play up the festive nature of giving gifts during these times, on a personal level many people feel a real stress. In talking with locals about Spring Festival, especially some of the older folks, they explain that it has become far more commercial these days when compared with the past. Before, a decent meal shared with family was the big event. Now, the amount of red-backs in that envelope is the main issue. This is disappointing to some. Being fed up with gifting pressure and perceived hypocrisy surrounding these events has even motivated some in the West to pass on Christmas all together.

Festive Food

For the Christmas crowd, turkey and

hams are the traditional fare during this period. It is not likely this food tradition will ever catch on in China. Turkey is considered a very low-end type of food and unless turkeys are imported, the local ones are quite skinny and old. The imported ones are very expensive and the Chinese generally do not like white meat. A roasted turkey is not as flavorful as many Chinese dishes. A traditional Jewish festive food is potato pancakes called "Latkes" and doughnut pastries filled with sweet fillings called "Pontshkes". Hotels will feature turkey and ham dinners with Christmas trimmings such as stuffing, cranberry sauce and mint jelly. In order to attract more customers, special gifts and prize drawings are usually offered.

Chinese cuisine is the cornerstone of culture and life, represented by so many different regional dishes and varieties. During Spring Festival, there is no holding back, this is a period of abundance and a Chinese dinner during this time will feature fish. In Chinese fish is "Yu" $\underline{\alpha}$, the homonym for abundance or surplus Yú $\underline{\alpha}$. Chicken is also a must because it is a custom that no matter how poor a family is they have to have at least chicken to eat

during the New Year. "Nian Gao" 年糕 "New Year Cake" is another homonym for a surplus year and is a sweet pudding made of glutinous rice. On the last day, families will eat "Yuan Xiao 元宵or Tang Yuan" 汤圆 sweet glutinous rice balls served in a soup.

The list of foods and significance is endless and will depend upon regional customs and tastes. Don't expect to finish all the food, as there will definitely be leftovers, especially during this festive time. In general, Chinese hosts do not like to leave a table with no food remaining when the dinner is finished because it may mean a loss of face that there was not enough to eat. At least recently, they

have accepted the idea of taking home leftovers, in the past even this was frowned upon.

Most restaurants and supermarkets will close early on New Years Eve and all day New Years day so stock up and prepare to cook at home those two days but after this, all eating places except for your favorite food stands probably will be back in business. The food stand operators are probably from other cities and will be away at home for at least two weeks during this time of the year.

Food is unquestionably one of the top traditions associated with holiday festivity. There are countless tales of endless spreads and never ending liquor. Especially around these times of the year, driving under the influence gets monitored. It is usual in the West for there to be more Police action in terms of catching drunk drivers. In recent years, China is likewise stepping up the effort to stop inebriated partiers from taking to the road. In fact, now more than ever the penalty for driving drunk in China is not to be taken lightly. Some expats do have their Chinese driver's license, therefore be warned. Regardless of legal consequence, as a responsible member of society there is zero place for driving under the influence.

There are number of apps now that provide "designated driver" services specifically targeted at intoxicated individuals. Didi Chuxing (滴滴出行 dīdī chūxíng) has such a service called: 代驾 dàijià. These services are quite interesting in that guys hang around on scooters with cell phones waiting for a customer request. When a driver request comes in they take off, going to where the drunk person is at. There they fold up their mini-scooter putting it in the customer's vehicle and then driving the client and their car to their desired location. Upon arrival, they hop back on their scooter, waiting for their next request. This is significantly different than a taxi driver who comes and picks up the rider leaving behind the person's car. Still, the best solution is simply not to get drunk. Controlled drinking provides joy without heartache.

Festive Fun

Since most International Schools observe the Christmas holidays and have a school break of at least two weeks. This is when some expats will either go home to see their families or choose to take a trip to some other Asian location. This helps to reduce travel time and avoid the chance of winter conditions which can disrupt flights when flying overseas. A winter retreat to places like Thailand, Singapore or Malaysia will mean fun in the sun but it since it is considered peak season, expect correspondingly higher prices. For the Chinese, Spring Festival is the major holiday for the family and schools will be closed for almost a month. K to 12 schools will likely be off starting January 21 to February 19th, universities will even have a longer break, some as early as January 9 to March 6th.

This is the time that most Chinese will make their trek back to their hometowns for family reunions. Air, train, bus and highways will see the highest volumes of the year. An estimated 2 billion trips will be made, another good reason for most expats to leave China during this period. Although if you decide to stay put in Tianjin, local traffic will be quite pleasant, except for the tourist spots. If visiting local temples be prepared for crowds. For example Tianjin's Dabeiyuan (大悲院 dàbēiyuàn) is the largest and oldest Buddhist temple in town. Historically during the holiday season a staggering number of people visit.

Vacation time for Spring Festival goes as follows. There are three official days off. People also work the weekend prior. This is so they can take two more days of the following workweek off. Finally, there are the two days off for the upcoming weekend. This adds up to a total of seven consecutive days off. The actual period of celebration is 15 days starting with the New Year's Eve and ending on the 15th day which is February 11th. That is called the Lantern Festival or "Yuan Xiao Jie" 元宵节. Don't plan to do any big business or have meetings a few days before or after this holiday period as it takes Chinese time to get back into a business frame of mind.

Fireworks will be a main activity during this period. The setting off will start with New Years Eve and continue each evening coming to a crescendo on the final evening of February 11th. Some of these firecrackers are quite significant such as rockets which can easily go astray. Children are easily susceptible to injury and have sensitive skin. Each year, several people are injured or sustain burns. If the pollution levels are high, the government will implement bans on setting off fireworks.

In North America and Europe, the day after Christmas is also a holiday and is called Boxing Day. This is a special shopping day when everything goes on sale. But here, it seems that there is not such a frenzy of sales. Promotions tend to just continue until the Chinese New Year which is in February.

The Christmas break in the East and the Spring Festival break in the West represent the two longest official vacation periods respectively. Yet the Chinese festivities can easily extend for what seems to be a month or so. As noted above, especially for collegiate students, they virtually "move home" during the break. Colleges can become like ghost towns and even big cities like Tianjin feel noticeably different during that time of the year. It could be said that the time around "Chunjie" is when Tianjin is at its purest. Namely, many foreigners and non-Tianjin Chinese leave town. The people remaining for the majority are Tianjin born and raised residents. This is their home town, and they don't leave during the long holiday break. For expats wanting to get a full dose of Tianjin, sticking around during this time is a great way to see what the city would be like without all the non-locals.

As to what activities each culture finds festive, there is a gap. Particularly when it

comes to the firecrackers and staying up all night, some expats struggle to keep up. It can be very noisy and even a bit alarming as firecrackers randomly start going off anytime, anywhere. For the Chinese this is a big culture point. Firecrackers are thought to ward off evil spirits and represent the excitement associated with the Spring Festival. While firecracker activity has seemed to lessen somewhat in recent years, at least at current it is improbable they will completely go away. Learning how to cope with the noise is something some expats find challenging.

When it comes to the extra time off though, usually this is hardly difficult to accept. In fact, expats that work as teachers look forward to and plan for the extended break. Though planning where to go and how to go is extremely important.

Festive Sports

With all the eating and special foods during these festivals, it is hard not to gain weight. Hopefully the weather is not too cold,

because there are many outdoor activities to be done. A simple walk around the park or along the Hai He River is very nice. If you are looking for something more active, tennis and badminton are other alternatives and if the weather is too cold for playing outdoors, there are some indoor facilities. A simple retreat to a facility that has a ping pong table will get your sweat dripping. Then you can finish with a quiet game of snooker. These are just a few ways to burn off those extra calories. Hotels do offer some of these services, but at a price. Speaking of hotels, why not spend a weekend at a hotel that has these facilities or a spa and swimming pool. Just make sure to book in advance and look for some special seasonal promotions.

Though it should be noted, be careful if one is usually inactive. Suddenly starting up intense exercise can spell trouble. It would be advisable to be moderate in all things. This means, try not to overeat. Plus, keep a good exercise routine going all the time, not just at certain times of the year. This is the best way to stay healthy and avoid trouble related to



random high intensity exercise. Instead of using time off to eat to death, try to think of ways to stay active.

Festive Wrap-up

With so many days off in the near future, there are many options, if you are up to the crowded tourist areas in China, to book a tour of the famous spots. Booking a tour in a warm Southeast Asian resort is another option or going back home to North America or Europe if you book well enough in advance is an option. Or just doing nothing and staying in Tianjin to take a break and enjoy the down time with your partner is always an option. Reading a book that you always wanted to finish is another good choice. Whatever you decide, take the time to reflect on what is important to you and recharge yourself for the forthcoming year.

Living in one country with one set of festivals to contend with can be challenging. Living in China where there tends to be a mix of two different festival schedules simultaneously going on can be even more overwhelming. Often expats find that when family back home has time off, they don't and vice versa. Not to mention like everything else in China, when there are official holidays, it means an incredible number of people will simultaneously attempt to be active. Expats need to plan in advance how they will manage this phenomenon. For those that have a number of friends that are not local Tianjiner's, plan to miss seeing them during these vacation periods. In some cases it is as if they disappear, returning to their home town with little to no contact during the entire time away. Expats may also find fellow foreign friends are either taking a trip home or off seeing the sights. While some people look forward to all the festivities, others may find them a very lonely time of the year. This loneliness can be coped with by filling one's time with meaningful activities and expanding one's network of friends. As with many things in life, this time of year tends to be a double edge sword.

过年了,你能做什么?

最近两个月,人们沉浸在各种节日的欢乐气氛中,有些人每年就是盼着这两个月的到来。12 月我

们刚刚大张旗鼓地庆祝了圣诞节,一些在中国生活 了十多年的老外们还记得当年几乎没有圣诞庆祝活 动,但看看现在,每到圣诞季商场都会打折促销, 餐厅酒吧也早早打出了圣诞大餐的广告,已与西方 无异。圣诞节过后,紧接着是全世界人民都要庆祝 的元旦,和28天后的中国传统新年。

在这个多文化的国际社区里,不同文化和信仰 的人都有自己的节日,日期和庆祝习惯不同,但你 也会找到一些共同之处,比如重大节日都在年初或 年尾,会和家人团聚或和朋友一起庆祝,都起源于 神仙崇拜,而且已经发展得非常商业化。

不论是哪种节日,人们都会互相祝福,表达美 好心愿,其中一个方式就是互送礼物。圣诞节的习 俗是把礼物借圣诞老人之手放到袜子里,让孩子们 一觉醒来能够看到。中国人会把钱放在红色的信封 (红包)里送出去,象征着压岁或者祝福。

如果你的中国朋友邀请你春节期间去家里做客,千万不要空着手上门,提前了解一下主家有几 个孩子,除了红包,你也要带上点水果或礼品作为 上门礼。

这样的习俗让出席节日宴席变成一种财政负 担,去"吃白食"无论在哪个国家都会遭人白眼。 你不仅要给钱,还要注意钱数一定是偶数且寓意吉 利!很多中国的老人们回忆,小时候过年很简单, 就是一家人聚在一起吃顿饭,但现在人们更关注红 包的薄厚,这是不对的,有些人因为这些压力干脆 不再过节了。

说到节日大餐, 圣诞节的传统食品是火鸡和火腿, 但是中国人吃不惯味道清淡的火鸡肉。而中国 人在过春节的时候, 也会准备丰盛的佳肴, 这些菜 肴不但味道可口, 而且还要讨个好彩头。比如, 除 夕家宴上必须有一道鱼, 因为"鱼"谐音"余", 象征着年年有余, 而南方人爱吃年糕, 象征步步高 升。

节日期间宴席、酒席增多,按照中国人的传统, 亲朋好友聚在一起不喝几杯就不能算过节。这个时候,很多人会放松警惕,酒驾的现象会有所上升。 警察叔叔也在节日期间异常忙碌,加大对酒驾的处 罚力度。既想出行方便,又不能违反交规,你可以 通过手机 APP 叫代驾,代驾司机会把你和爱车都安 全地送到家。

大部分国际学校在圣诞节前后就已经放假了, 学生们要么回国,要么会出国旅游,东南亚国家比 如新加坡和泰国是他们的首选,因为可以躲避冬天 的寒冷。春节期间,中国的学校也放假了,外地大 学生们刚一放假就忙着往家赶,成为春运大军中的 一员。如果你在春节期间待在天津,你能享受到 7 天安静的时光,因为马路上的交通要顺畅很多。但 是如果你在大年初一想要游览大悲院的话,你会看 到另一番景象,因为很多天津人要在初一一早到庙 宇祈福。

按照中国人的传统,过年要放炮。但是近几年 严重的雾霾让政府不得不下令限制烟花炮竹的燃 放,即使在最重要的春节期间,放炮也有时间和地 点限制。首先你要注意安全,不论是自己放炮还是 路过放炮的人,都要当心别被炸到或烧到。其次, 你要做好早上被鞭炮吵醒的准备。

每逢佳节胖三斤,吃得太多的你肯定想要运动 运动。如果天气已经开始转暖,你可以沿着海河散 步,不但能锻炼身体还可以欣赏美景。如果你想要 更激烈一些的运动,可以考虑羽毛球和网球这些室 内运动,天津这样的场地很多,价格也不是很高。 不过你若想继续享受度假的感觉,不妨找一家高档 酒店度个周末,酒店的健身房有更加私密的环境, 运动过后还可以做个 SPA 放松一下。很多酒店都会 有节日和周末的特价,别错过好机会!

如果你平时不经常运动的话,在开始运动之前 一定要做好热身,而且注意不要运动过猛对身体造 成伤害。与心血来潮的运动相比,养成健身的习惯 才是最重要的。

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SWINDING TO SUCCES

ot many doctors find fame outside the operating room. For a young doctor to be though, it looks like her success will come from swimming, at least for now that is. Herein we share the story of swimming superstar Yuanhui Fu. She was born January 7, 1996 in Hangzhou of Zhejiang Province. She is a member of the Chinese Female Swim Team and has enjoyed guite a bit of swimming success. In 2011 she won a silver medal at the World Youth Swimming Championship. Following that she won a gold at the China National Championship. Also in 2011 at the Seven City Meet she won a gold medal as part of the 4x100 meter women's freestyle relay team.

Fast forward a few years to January 31, 2014 where in Australia at the Five Country Women's Swimming Divisional she took top place in the 50 meter backstroke. At the 2014 Incheon Asian Games she placed first in the 100 meter backstroke. On August 6, 2015 at the FINA World Championship in Kazan she finished first in the 50 meter female backstroke with a time of 27.11 seconds. At the Rio Olympics on August 9, 2016 in the 100 meter female backstroke she placed third, winning a bronze medal with a time of 58.76 seconds. Immediately after the win, during a poolside interview an extremely excited Yuanhui Fu said "I've been utilizing prehistorical powers!"This quote vent viral online making her an overnight sensation.

Most recently in November, 2016 at the Asian Swimming Championship in Japan she won two gold medals. Apart from all her swimming success, Yuanhui Fu started studying Rehabilitation Medicine at Tianjin Medical University since 2011. On November 22, 2016 she took time amidst her busy training schedule to visit her alma mater. There she conducted an hour interview with reporters. Below are some excerpts from the conversation.

Q: Why did you choose Tianjin Medical University?

A: I'd say it was fate really.

Q: Online you've been given a lot of nicknames. Which do you like best?

A: I don't like any of them actually. The last time I was Japan I ran into some older Chinese tourists. They recognized me saying: "Isn't she that "I've been utilizing prehistorical powers" swimmer from the Olympics?" Personally, I don't want to be labeled by something I just happened to say. I'm perfectly happy being Swimming star Fu Yuanhui in a white gown gifted by TMU.

Q: Why before competition do you scratch yourself twice?

A: It isn't self-mutilation or anything like that. It's just a thing I do when I'm not in the zone. It's a tactic I use to get myself to snap out of a funk. I have a do or die attitude. I'm willing to die in the swimming pool. I think you need this type of mindset to place well. To me the pain of scratching fires me up. The extra pain makes me more alert when I'm in the water in comparison to others.

Q: Do you consider yourself a nerd?

A: No, I'm a loser really when it comes to study. Unless it's something I'm really interested, than it's easy for me to remember things. It depends. Sometimes I find studying really tough while other times I'm really into it.

Q: What was it like to attend all the post-Olympic events?

A: We are athletes, not celebrities. So when it comes to training, we isolate ourselves from the outside world. When I do get a break though, I'll pick a few events to attend. Still, my priority is training. It's about being yourself and not getting off track.

Q: There's talk you will attend this year's Spring Festival Gala. Is it true?

A: That's up to the people in charge. As far as I'm concerned, I don't think I will. Today I'm here because I wanted to be. When it comes to events, I like to pick upbeat positive ones that don't interfere with training. There aren't any more big competitions this year, so the coaches said I can rest a bit.

Q: What do you think about your major of Rehabilitation Medicine?

A: I think there are a lot of similarities between medicine and sports. In both you have to be the best. Every time a doctor goes to work it's like going to war, they've got to perform at the top of their game, yet at the same time find a way to continuously surpass what they've done before. Doctors also have to protect their own health too. I really appreciate what doctors do.

Q: You've done some online broadcasting. Lots of fans liked you. Do you plan on doing more?

A: I'm not sure. If it was up to me, I would.

I really like it. I've got some serious training coming up though and more competitions, so I will probably have next to zero free time.

Q: You already aren't just an athlete you feel about. How do you feel about this multi-faceted persona?

A: As far as this big persona goes, it really was something the outside world created. If you ask me, I'm just an athlete. I've always been like this, it's just who I am. It isn't done for entertainment or to be funny. My primary identity is an athlete. All those big titles, I don't buy into. At the Olympics I only got third, but I was thrilled as it was a new best for me. Trving to wear too many hats will affect training. Trying to get big or be famous is huge pressure. I'm doing my best to avoid all that. Still, no matter how hard I try, there is a lot of pressure. After getting famous, everyone is analyzing you. I really feel the pressure. Before my goal was just to do my best at every event. Now ever since the Asian Championship, there's just a ton of pressure.

My view on life is pretty extreme. I've dealt with a lot devastating things. The kind of things that just make someone want to die. I live every day like I'm going to die tomorrow. I live every day to the full as if it were the last and I want to die with my boots on. I'll never give up on my dreams. From the time I was little, I've always been my own idol.

The above is only a portion of the interview. Due to space, we can only share so much. However from what we've read so far, no doubt it is obvious Yuanhui is as she puts it

"pretty extreme". It proves the point that behind all the fame is usually a lot of pain. She could have never imagined getting famous overnight because of something she blurted out poolside. Yet that's how these tales usually go. It is some random thing, some random moment that gets broadcast to the world and then the rest is history. Yuanhui's story also proves the point that being famous isn't all it's cracked up to be. Fame means pressure and getting lots of labels slapped on you. It also means facing many a demon and knocking on deaths door. For us watching from the sidelines let us not forget that the girl swimming to success name Yuanhui Fu isn't much different than you and I, so give her a break and think of something nice to say.

Apps become trends today.

THE INS AND OUTS OF APPS

t seems like there is an app for everything these days. That said, it doesn't look like that is slowing anyone down from creating the next app! Apps today are much like websites of yesterday. There was a time when "no one" had a website and well, they seemed to do just fine. Then came the trend. Like usual having a website was seen as "new", "fresh", and "innovative". Little by little the train picked up steam, and soon it was as if having a website, especially a corporate website was mandatory.

Fast forward to today. The website buzz has cooled. Yet understanding the website trend is helpful in the context of considering the app trend. Apps are like the new website. It seems everyone is in a hurry to put one out or else be seen as "left behind". The problem though is that many apps are like many websites of old. Little more than a digital placeholder. The app itself is ridiculously simple, providing few if any "can't live without" features. It was poorly produced and sorely lacks creativity. Of course, like websites of old, the reason is cost. Apps like websites in their heyday can cost a pretty penny. In addition, even if someone has the cash to develop an app, there is the problem of intellectual property (IP). Again, history repeats itself as companies with a "good idea" want to put out an app (like launching a great new website years ago) but they lack the technical know how to do it themselves. In such a scenario

they often face outsourcing the development.

The Risks

This is where the risk of app development may become a bigger barrier than cost. Risk of "losing" that idea via the development process is guite real. Especially for entrepreneurs in Tianjin where digital copyright laws are still maturing. There is a huge risk to lose control of the content, that is, the Intellectual Property (IP) itself and watch as the folks who were paid to develop that amazing app run off with the idea and profit themselves. Of course this doesn't happen in every case. However, it cannot be overlooked. The risk of losing IP is a huge consideration when thinking about outsourcing. In addition to having an ironclad Non-Disclosure Agreement (NDA) be sure the contract for services specifically states who owns the IP. If not careful, in some cases, by default the developer has some claim to the IP. After all, while the "idea" was someone else's, they "created" the code. Therefore, get the developer to sign off on any and all claims to the IP, including future revenue generated by the app.

Let's say though, a savvy entrepreneur either has the tech skills personally, in-house, or via a trusted third party vendor to proceed with app development. Next to IP risk the biggest barrier arguably could be cost. What are some ranges for app development costs? Well, it seems virtually impossible to get an app out there for less than a few thousand USD. This would be a very basic app at that. On the high side, apps can range in the tens of thousands, even hit six figures. Apps can be a bit of a black hole. Those looking to turn that "idea" into profit via an app need to go in with their eyes wide open. Sadly, a lot of apps are little more than a modern "website", doing little to nothing in actually generating income. Yet, because of the current trend, the company feels obligated to "put out an app".

Overseas vs. Local Development

For expats hiring an overseas developer, meaning they are in Tianjin and the developer isn't, could create a few challenges. First, costs may be higher if contracting with someone in the States per say. Some may choose this option despite increased costs because it gives the app owner a greater feeling of legal security in terms of not getting the IP stolen. Regardless of location signing a NDA with any potential app developer, even if it is just to "get a quote". That said, especially in Tianjin, contracts need to be based on solid relationships. In Chinese culture, it is best to have someone feel committed to not stealing your "idea" both legally and emotionally. This may come as a surprise to expats who trust more in the "letter of the law" to get legal justice. Of course having things in writing should be "standard protocol" no matter what. However, when doing app development in Tianjin, don't simply rely on what's in print. Rather, make it an aim to sign contracts with "trusted" partners. That is, vendors who have passed the test of time. They need to prove over a period of time they are reasonably reliable and trustworthy in terms of providing a service. Of course, this is where app development may get tricky for Tianjin based entrepreneurs as their existing "relationship network" may not include any app developers.

Second, be aware of payment issues. If running a Wholly Owned Foreign Entity

(WFOE) in Tianjin the currency problem is likely to rear its ugly head. Imagine hiring a trusted overseas app developer whereby services are provided based on payment in USD. The question becomes, how will the company in Tianjin pay that overseas developer in USD, or perhaps even in some other foreign currency, from their corporate account? The answer, not easily, Ideally, both parties will have a Chinese entity. This makes payment, receipts for services, and accounting for both parties a whole lot simpler. The caveat though, is it will take time and effort to find a trusted intra-China resource for app development. In some cases, it may actually be worth considering arranging for a foreign resource to come to Tianjin for the project. Whereby, the Tianjin WFOE would issue a letter of invitation, employment contract and make payment to them via RMB. This not only relieves accounting issues due to overseas payment, but also brings the developer on to home turf in Tianjin. Theoretically making it easier to account for their time and possibly even lowering the risk of losing the IP.

The Bottom Line

Having a corporate app could be the next step in unlocking new market opportunities. Yet, like developing websites of old, don't develop an app simply to "jump on the bandwagon". Be careful not to damage a brand by releasing a sub-par, copy-cat app that simply says: "I tried to save money on development." Weigh the risks associated with losing the IP during the development process

along with the cost of writing the code. Understand in-house resources may be the most ideal scenario, but also requires more work from the company in terms of arranging local employment, especially if they are coming from overseas, however could reduce headaches associated with overseas payment. Do sign an NDA with any party who the idea is disclosed to. Yet, know what it means to do business in Tianjin. Don't just rely on a piece of paper for protection. Partner exclusively with relatively trustworthy vendors who have proven themselves loyal over a period of time. Don't forget to get a written release on IP so as to avoid any future claims to ownership or profit.

了解应用程序的来龙去脉

现在看来,好像有应用程序就万事足一样。今日的应用程序就如同昨日的网站,人们从无到有, 从不知道到渐渐了解,最后演变成企业存在所不可 或缺的一部分,植根于人们心中。

不过几年光景,如今的网站早已不是人们热衷的话题。我们不妨借由网站的兴衰来探索新型媒介一应用程序的发展与未来。应用程序如雨后春笋不断涌现,于是越来越多的人想要借此分得一碗羹。问题的关键是大多数的应用程序都像过去的网站,它没有一个伟大到让人们觉得可以"不得不去使用"的功能,它简单而单调,缺乏新意,究其根本原因大致离不开成本的因素。对于那些有钱却没技术能力的企业来讲,他们若想开发自己的应用软件,很多时候只有选择产品外包。

当我们考虑开发程序时,外包可能会比成本带 来更大障碍。在这个如此注重知识产权的时代,你 的付出和思想很可能会被别人窃取走。因此,一旦 你选择外包服务,务必确保合同中有保密协议的条 款,以此来保证自己的合法利益。

我们再来看成本。究竟研发一个程序的成本可 以是多少?事实证明,没有个几千美元我们是不可 能造就一个程序的,而这也只是程序的最基本阶 段。应用程序形如黑洞,每一个对此有想法的投资 商都需要睁大眼睛。应用程序不过是一个现代化的 网站,它在创收方面实则没有任何作用。

对于外国朋友而言,他若想开发一个应用程序 挑战也许会更大。成本上升、支付难关,他都需要 考虑清楚。一个外商独资企业若想聘请一个值得信 赖的海外应用开发人员就需要向对方支付美元薪 资。天津公司向海外开发商支付美元或外币不是一 件容易的事,理想情况下,企业会考虑将海外技术 人才引进到中国,但诚然这又需要一系列繁琐的手 续和程序。

拥有企业应用程序可能是开启全新市场的一个 途径。然而,应用程序的开发不能像淘汰的网站一 样"一哄而上",欲速则不达。我们应时刻提醒自 己不要因为急于求成而让自己的现有品牌产生任何 负面影响。积极了解企业内部资源,合理安排人员 配比,选择靠谱的合作伙伴,签署有效证件文书, 为自己和企业的利益争取最大限度的保障。

MARRIAGE IS UNDER ATTACK

successful marriage is hardly an accident. It is the result of hard work and skillful direction. The skillful direction however at times can be hard to come by. As the old saying goes, the numbers don't lie. The American Psychological Association at www.apa.org states: "In Western cultures, more than 90 percent of people marry by age 50." From this statistic, we can see the popularity of marriage. Yet, they follow up with this additional piece of information: "However, about 40-50 percent of married couples in the United States divorce." Marriages aren't without their challenges in China either. According to Wikipedia the divorce rate in China was 30% in 2015. From East to West it appears marriage is under attack. Why?

Legal and Social Acceptability

From a legal standpoint, it wasn't always so simple to get a divorce. Wikipedia reports: "Before the latter decades of the 20th century, a spouse seeking divorce had to show cause and even then might not be able to obtain a divorce." Psychologytoday.com timelines China's legalization of divorce with the key date being in 1950 for allowing a divorce, but only if certain conditions were met. In more recent years additional policy changes appear to be making it even easier to get a "legal" divorce.

From a social standpoint, things are following a similar trend going from "never divorce" in the old days to "divorce at whim" these days. Manmade laws at some level reflect the current state of humanity, in essence, legalizing what the "people" are often already doing. Thereby making an attempt to govern the activity and prevent utter lawlessness. In terms of divorce, it certainly seems that society has given folks the green light. Legally speaking, the barrier essentially no longer exists.

With the legal and social barriers to divorce removed, perhaps now we are seeing what's really in the hearts of people. Namely, they want the right to self-determination in the sense of being able to marry or divorce when and if they want to. This "freedom" is

certainly not without its consequences. Complex social issues are certainly not lacking. Things like child custody and asset allocation top the list. When it comes to deciding which parent gets legal custody of the child or children, it can turn ugly fast. Even without offspring, money is fought over by the splitting couple.

Reasons for Divorce

Dr. Mark in the article about "Divorce in China" at psychologytoday.com states a reason for Chinese couples calling it quits is "A New Mindset: Younger people feel less committed to traditional marriage than their parents." He goes on to cite particularly those born in the 80's who usually are an only child, have a tendency to be more "me" oriented. A case could certainly be made for these rather self-centered children lacking the humility, patience, and restraint needed to make a marriage work. In talking with Tianjin parents, a number will admit they have "spoiled" their child. In many cases it appears they lacked the proper education on "how" exactly to raise a responsible child. For example, it isn't unheard of for an unmarried adult age child to have their mom washing their clothes. One mother even confessed to hand washing her son's socks!

The trouble doesn't stop there. Tianjin has a tradition whereby the son's parents "should" buy him a house. If not, it is said they risk becoming so undesirable that they can't find a wife. The marriages of today seem more like a financial transaction than a tale of two people falling in love. In situations where parents have failed in educating children on what marriage is really all about, an overemphasis is placed on material assets rather than determining true "capability" for marriage. The problem is compounded with each child having being pampered for over two decades. It would be next to impossible for the new mate to live up to the previous pampering power of up to six adults in some cases! This is based on two parents plus both sets of grandparents, a total of six, who may have catered to every little whim of one child. With such an upbringing it would be hard for either mate to have a realistic expectation of what it means to "not get their way" every second.

Another major reason for marriage related complexities in China is the emphasis on having children. Due to the absolute obsession with having offspring in Chinese culture, not only must a child get married but they in turn must have a child of their own. This is considered a basic responsibility. It goes a bit like this. Grow up, go to college, get a job, get married, have a kid. Pretty much in that order too. Only after each of these "tasks" are completed will a Chinese child have been seen to "honor" and "respect" their parents. With each child feeling this intense pressure to get married and then reproduce, it leaves little time to "get to know each other" and "make sure he or she is the one." No doubt, this sets the stage for a number of challenging marriages. After the two newlyweds have finished their job and had a kid, it might just be the perfect time to sit back, relax, and realize they can't stand each other. It doesn't take a rocket scientist to guess what the result of that situation will be.

Marital Education

Anyone wanting to get an idea of what

this all looks like in real life can watch a few episodes of Tianjin's very own show: "The Battle for Love"(爱情保卫战 aiging bǎowèi zhàn). It won't take long to figure out that many Chinese relationships are quite complex, which in turn breeds complex marriages. If there is a point to this whole discussion it is as follows: Now more than ever there is a huge need for solid marital education. This must begin with the parents. They in turn can instill these proper concepts of marriage in their children instead of overemphasizing money or the economic elements of matrimony. Marriage isn't about what one "gets" from the other person. Instead it is about two great givers coming together in an effort to make the other mate happy versus simply seeking self-gratification.

Relatively speaking the availability and access to professional marriage counselors in China is limited when compared to the rather mature market overseas. There are countless gurus claiming the ability to resolve marital conflict and a plethora of books written on the subject. In China, though, this form of education is still rather new and has huge room for further expansion. An American expat for example is involved in the translation and publishing of textbooks related to marital success into Chinese. He is also providing relationship counseling here in China. Now more than ever, staying married is far more difficult than getting married. In years past many never even considered getting a divorce. Was this because it was considered socially unacceptable and nearly impossible

to do so legally? Or due in part to marriages in the West previously being based on a mutually accepted moral code such as contained in the Bible? Or is it linked to couples long ago in the East having loyally subscribed to the tenants of Confucius? Times have changed though and the holy institution of marriage is under attack.

婚姻危机

成功的婚姻不是偶然,它是共同努力、耐心经营的结果。美国心理协会曾在网站上声明,"在西方文化里,有超过 90%的人选择在 50岁之前结婚",数据中,我们不难看出婚姻的普及,但另一方面,我们也不能忽视后半句声明所带来的问题和隐患, "超过 40-50%的美国夫妇会选择离婚"。在中国,婚姻危机也如实存在,究竟是什么原因导致了人们的婚姻屡屡受到挫败?

从法律的角度来看,离婚并不总是那么简单。 有数据表明,中国的离婚合法化是在 1950 年才有了 转机,但前提也只有在满足离婚条件下方才被允许。 但随着政策的不断演化,如今的家庭,离婚似乎变 得越来越简单。

离婚的法律和社会壁垒的消除让我们看到了真 正的人心。人们有权利决定自己的婚姻状况,无论 是结婚亦或是离婚。当然这样的"自由"也带来了 一定的后果,除复杂的社会问题外,还有诸如儿童 监护、资产配置等一系列问题。

有人总结了关于中国人离婚的大致要素。首先, 现在的年轻人要比父母一辈的人缺乏使命感,由于 独生子女政策的实施,使得现在的年轻人大多都以 自我为中心,因此在面对婚姻瓶颈的时候,个体往 往会表现出不负责任的态度。其次,中国的结婚传 统历来有男方买房的说法,这样的做法导致了今天 的婚姻更像是一种金融交易而不是两情相悦。最后, 让婚姻变得更为复杂的我们不得不归功于孩子的出 生。中国人向来循规蹈矩一路沿着"长大,上学, 找工作,结婚,生孩子"的路线行走。中国人通常 说人只有在自己成为父母的时候才能体会家长的不 容易。其实这样的思想早就为婚姻埋下了层层隐患。 最终当他们完成这些任务的时候,婚姻的漏洞早就 大到不可弥补。

相对来说,中国的婚姻咨询市场要比其它海外 市场显得不那么成熟。中国人关于婚姻的教育仍然 相当新颖,因此在未来它还有很大的发展空间以及 扩张空间。有一本美国人涉及翻译和出版的关于婚 姻成功的书籍可以提供给有需要的朋友。当今的社 会,维持一段感情的确要比结婚付出更多心血。时 代在改变,人的思想也在改变,不知道你的婚姻是 否也在经受着严峻考验?

KEEPING KIDS HEALTHY IN WINTER

ids attract cold germs easily, and it's pretty obvious as to why. They aren't the best at washing their hands before eating, even though parents remind them to do this multiple times a day; they are prone to putting toys in and near their mouths and, for those who are in school, they're exposed to dozens of other kids who are the same, or worse, about personal hygiene.

In China one of the most common treatments for illness is an IV. While this does help the child recover faster, antibiotics are harmful to the body's natural healing mechanisms, so over time the body becomes more resistant to the healing effects of antibiotics. While I've kept my kids from having IV's when ill, they have had several courses of oral antibiotics. I admit that they're helpful, I'd rather the kids not need, so here's what we do to keep illness to a minimum.

I've been giving my kids a high-quality 500 milligram vitamin C tablet each day, in addition to the fruits and vegetables they eat. Sometimes I give them two tablets if they're showing signs of a cold.

We bought a dishwasher this year and

I realized that only one child has had a minor runny nose since then. It's nearly Christmas, as I write this, and usually by now we've had at least one fever and a constant stream of runny noses. I've always washed dishes with hot water, but this extra long washing with very hot water is clearly better. For cleaning the table and surface areas in the house, I've started using a homemade cleaner that's a mixture of vinegar, water and essential oils. It's non-toxic, the oils kill germs and it smells areat.

While pollution is a concern year-round, it's more noticeable in Tianjin's winters when there's hardly any precipitation to take the tiny PM 2.5 particles out of the air. To combat pollution, we keep our house very green with nearly two dozen plants in our home. Each room, except the kitchen, has a Golden Pothos plant which is great at cleaning the air, as are bamboo and ivy. We also use air purifiers in each room when necessary.

My kids are out of the stage where they put toys in their mouths, but when they were younger, I'd wash down their toys each week. I just used hot soapy water, but now I'd add a drop or two of essential oil to better kill the germs. I love that most of our previous homes had lines on which we could hang the blankets and air dry the sheets and duvet covers, even when it meant carrying them up and down 105 steps from our sixth floor house. Since our current community doesn't have clothes lines, I take advantage of our porch and just hang them to air inside. I leave them up for at least a day, in full sunlight.

Finally, eating well and drinking lots of water is essential in staying well. When the kids are feeling a bit under the weather, I give them warm water with lemon juice, sliced ginger and a bit of honey. This really helps if they're not feeling well and refuse plain water; at least they're being hydrated and getting some vitamins from the lemon and ginger. We're also drinking a lot of bone broth this winter, made in a crockpot from bones and vegetables, which warms the body on cold days and is rich in minerals.

While I still expect a runny nose here and there, I believe that doing all these things will keep the whole family healthy all winter long.

冬日健康小妙招

冬天是孩子们易患感冒的季节,他们被细菌侵 害的途径往往都很简单,比如饭前不洗手、玩具放 进嘴里,又或者和其他小朋友间接传染。

在中国,生病最常见的治疗方法就是静脉注 射。尽管这样的治疗手段可以让孩子恢复的更快, 但频繁使用抗生素对人体没有任何好处。一直以 来,我都坚决反对孩子们注射抗生素,但当他们生 病的时候我还是会忍不住让他们口服抗生素类药 物。究竟怎样做才能使孩子远离疾病并减少伤害 呢?

我的做法是,第一,坚持每天给孩子们吃维生 素片,如果有要生病的迹象,那就增加两片;第 二,坚持用洗碗机为碗具消毒;第三,坚持用醋、 水、精油的混合物为房间表面消毒。

污染是一个全年性问题,但在天津的冬天它尤 为明显,因此我们会在家里摆放绿植以达到空气净 化的作用。对于孩子们的玩具消毒,我会在热肥皂 水里再加上一两滴精油来让它更好地杀菌消毒。

很多时候我都会怀念我们过去的小区,因为楼 下会有晾被子的绳子可以让我们在阳光充足的时候 为寝具消毒。尽管现在已经没有可以晾衣服的地 方,但我还是会在晴朗的日子里将衣物挂到阳台, 进行消毒。

除此之外,我们还应时刻保持孩子们的饮食健 康,如果孩子们感觉不舒服,不妨给他们喝柠檬水 或姜丝水。当然冬天的话,我们还可以熬制一些骨 头汤来保证寒冷天气下的温暖。

感冒不可避免,但提高全家免疫力的功课我们 还是得该做就做。

HELPING HAND

his month, Jin Magazine's "The Helping Hand" is identifying a volunteer service in Tianjin that is giving back to our community. We hope to help shed light on their efforts, let people know what they are providing and why and how you can participate and also lend a helping hand. If you would like to let us know of other volunteer organizations, please contact us.

The Community Service Center of Hui Ling Persons with Intellectual Disabilities in Nankai District of Tianjin was established in 2005, mainly serving 14 year and older clients. There are currently 23 students in the Hui Ling Center. Hui Ling mainly uses social work methods and uses the wealth of community resources to provide real learning environment. The Center tries to improve the self-care ability and social adaptability of clients to improve, while helping them to establish and develop good relations between the community.

In this manner, clients can really integrate into the community life. Through these community integration services, clients have different levels of life skills, not only to reduce the burden of family and society but can also make their own way to return to their families and society. Hui Ling's vision: to promote community-based service model, improve the quality of life of people with intellectual disabilities Hui Ling mission: people with intellectual disabilities to participate in community building, sharing the fruits of social civilization.

Tianjin Hui Ling won the Ministry of Civil Affairs in 2013 and was awarded the first recognition of a national social work standardization demonstration unit and the Tianjin Federation of Volunteers as "public role model" Organization Award.

Since 2015, the Hui Ling Center services has benefited 918 people and targeted beneficiaries of 1407 people for their continued second phase of operations.

There are approximately 20 volunteers and 9 people are required to carry out services. The biggest problem for the Center is the challenges of meeting the tight financial requirements. Hui Ling's services are required to be paid services. Some families with

special needs are exempted from paying. Service charges accounted for 33.5% of the total operating funds, most of the other funds from social donations; the Center's service sites are leased, so the financial pressure is challenging.

All clients go to Center and are not called patients but called trainees, or clients because they are not sick, but have obstacles. "All of our students come to the Center to accept the service".

The Hui Ling organization was started in February 1990 originated in Guangzhou, by the founder of Meng Weina孟维娜. By the spring of 2000, Hui Ling institutions entered Beijing. Hui Ling is a unique non-profit, non-government community for people with intellectual disabilities services. As one of the earliest social welfare organizations in China, after more than 20 years of development, it has carried out branches in Beijing, Guangdong, Shaanxi, Qinghai, Tianjin, Chongging, Hunan, Gansu and Hong Kong, municipalities and special administrative regions, A total of more than 1,000 affected students have benefited in Hui Ling and accepted the services.

JinMag asked if expat foreigners can volunteer and what can they do to help?"You

can participate in our daily volunteer service, keeping in mind that there may be differences in Chinese and foreign culture and other aspects of communication but otherwise are welcome".

S logans have been part of the Chinese Culture from many centuries. It was a way of disseminating information to the public and conveying government policy to the masses. In Chinese it is called "Xuan Chuan" 宣传 also referred to as propaganda. Nothing new to the western world with our "Spin Doctors", government Public Affairs Bureaus and public programs. However, in China, the government control of media makes it much stronger.

History

The history of Chinese slogans and banners can be traced back to the Three Kingdom Dynasty during 220-280 AD. Although it was after Chairman Mao and the Communist Party ascent in 1949 that the use of slogans in the form of banners became prominent and used extensively to support Chairman Mao and the government policies.

You have probably seen the red banners that hang in neighborhoods and wonder what they mean. The most prominent slogans are found in many public venues such as in Tiananmen Square under the portrait of Mao.

Throughout the development of China during this era, there have been significant slogans that have become historical statements of China's history.

实事求是 Shishi qiu shi : "Seek truth from facts"

This was the credo of the reformers who from 1977 onwards began to set the political agenda for China after the death of Mao. It meant that facts rather than ideology should be the criterion of the 'correctness' of a policy; the policy had to work in practice. Deng Xiao Ping himself had said, 'It doesn't matter whether a cat is black or white, as long as it catches the mouse.' Mouse-catching (expertise) was now at a much higher premium than political coloring

只生—孩好 Zhi sheng yi hai hao :"It is good to just have one child" marked the beginning of the "One Child Policy" to curb China's over population trend.

为人民服务Wei renmin fu wu:"To serve

the People" is a timeless slogan that can still be seen today.

Modern Slogans

It is amazing that in this modern day of smartphones, Internet and world of information overload, you can still see the traditional slogans displayed in public areas, although not so much emphasis on political thought but more on public policy. The slogans tend to be more appealing as can be seen by some recent postings in a local Tianjin neighborhood, which are brightly framed and quite artistic.

The local Tianjin slogans were: 创建全国 文明城市 树立南开文化自信 国是大家 Chuangjian quanguo wenming chengshi shuli nankai wenhua zixin guo shi dajia

"Create National civilized city Establish Nankai cultural self – confidence that the Country is for everyone". The slogans are an effort to encourage cooperation for everyone to work together and improve the community. They are also displayed in an artistic format that appears more pleasing to the eye than the traditional cold red banners.

So who puts up these banners? Probably each community has its own public relations office and tries to promote its local policies but likely they all come under the jurisdiction of the CCPPD the Publicity department of the Communist Party of China.

More recently, slogans are promoting policies that relate to environmental sustainability, health and food safety. Things that are becoming more important to the public as they have more disposable income and priorities of lifestyle rise above subsistence. One recent campaign launched by the present government was not to waste food. In many restaurants now, you will see posters suggesting that customers order less and promote taking leftovers home.

"Leave an Empty Plate – No Leftovers – Be responsible, you can do it."This policy seems to have caught on very quickly, restaurants are now advising customers not to over order, patrons are taking leftovers home when in the past this was regarded as not appropriate and a "loss of face" but now is an accepted practice because even the slogans promote it.

What about public opinion?

I asked two expats what they felt about the use of slogans. Nathan who is a journalist and living in China for the past three years and travels extensively thru China felt it is a common propaganda tool. He sees banners and slogans all over China and remarked at some that are obviously quite old are still displayed. He also indicated that this might have the power of suggestion as it is seen repeatedly.

Jordi who has lived in China over 30 years also has seen the transition over the years from political slogans to more present life style slogans. He also thought that this was also a display of power of the government and shows their presence in the community.

Edward is a middle aged Chinese native from Wuhan and felt that present day slogans are toned down from the ones in the past and not dictating to the people what must be done. However, he also believes that all slogans are in line with what are government policy and a reminder to people of what is acceptable.

For the majority of expats, they probably cannot read sufficiently to decipher the slogans only that they are government edicts and propaganda as mentioned previously. They are so common place that most residents and long time expats do not pay as much attention as newcomers to China. For most, it is almost a way of life and even the government has become accustomed to using slogans on banners as a form of communication.

Conclusion

In this modern age of instant communication, it seems that a physical banner expressing a slogan is probably more powerful than instant message that is sent to millions and can be forgotten or erased also instantly. The advantage of some slogans are in a few words that meaning can be transferred effectively and can be easily remembered.

Some of the slogans get lost in translation and foreigners do not understand the meaning. This just reminds you that it is difficult to understand all cultural aspects if you have a different cultural background. Taking a Chinese word or sentence and running it through a google translates app won't always give you the true meaning of the phrase.

A study of Chinese slogans will give you a broader understanding of Chinese history and help supplement your vocabulary. It also shows the power of the written word and how it can infer stronger meanings to thoughts. For example, you see that the words "Wan Sui"万岁 is used for "Long Live" the literal translation is 10,000 years.

So the presence of banners and slogans may be a drawback of the old but in a way it is comforting that some things don't change, at least in China.

中国标语,你看得懂吗?

标语口号是中国的一个独特文化现象,政府通 过广泛派发和悬挂标语向公众宣传国家政策。虽然 在西方国家也有类似的做法,但在中国这样的标语 会给人们留下更深的印象。

从 1949 年新中国成立开始,政治标语就成为主 要的宣传手段之一。"实事求是"、"只生一个好"和"为 人民服务"也曾经是写满街头巷尾的标语。

几十年过去了,标语口号的内容和形式也发生 了很大变化,政治类的口号在减少,公益类和政策 类标识在增多。这些宣传材料在设计上也更注重艺 术性,更接地气,比如"创建全国文明城市"、"树 立南开文化自信"等,号召人们与人为善,一起改 善社会环境。

公益类的标语广告也日新增多,比如在很多饭 店的桌子上都能看到"光盘行动"的公益广告,倡 导人们杜绝浪费。这样的宣传起到了很好的效果, 从餐厅服务员开始就会规劝客人不要过度点菜,用 餐客人也会自觉把剩饭打包带走。

外国人如何看待这些标语口号呢? Nathan 是一 名记者,在中国生活三年了。Nathan 经常在不同的 城市出差,也看过很多的标语,他说,在有些地方, 许多很有年代感的标语还依然保留着。他认为这些 标语会有一定的影响力,因为人们每天都会重复看 到很多次。在中国生活超过 30 年的 Jordi 见证了标 语口号的风格变迁,他认为这显示出政府的强大能 力。Edward 是武汉人,他说现在的标语不像以前那 样语气强硬了,而是代表了政府政策,同时引导大众。

对外国人来说,他们可能看不懂这些口号标语 是什么意思,时间长了也习以为常了,但对刚来中 国的外国人来说,这也算一个中国特色。

在互联网时代,挂在墙上的宣传标语似乎已经 过时了,但那些即时发送的信息也很快会被遗忘, 其影响力反而不如长期悬挂的宣传条幅。有些标语 如果翻译成英文很难保存原文的全部含义,所以除 了字面意思,你还应该多了解一些历史和文化背景。

ALCOHOL AND CARS —A DEADLY MIX

he death of a loved one is a traumatic time whatever the circumstances. We understand if someone has been diagnosed with a terminal illness, there is nothing anyone can do. If somebody dies in a plane crash that was nobody's fault, and by that I mean maybe freak weather conditions and not pilot error, or a plane that because of its condition should not have even been up in the air, we understand. Deaths are tragic and mostly unavoidable so we find a way to cope. However senseless deaths that could have been avoided surely increase the pain they bring.

Take a recent case in England. A family of four were killed in a car smash by a lorry driver who was busy changing the music on his phone, and had not noticed that the traffic had come to a stop. As he was driving a huge vehicle capable of causing devastating damage he should have been more

responsible. Four lives were lost needlessly and he has ruined his own life, as apart from the fact that he was given a ten year prison sentence and lost his livelihood, his first child was born 5 months ago and so he will miss those precious important early childhood years, and his wife has become a single parent. And not to be overlooked is another heavy consequence of his actions - the guilt he will have to face for the rest of his life is by far the biggest punishment. Meanwhile, the bereaved father, his wife was also killed, said that he thought the worst day of his life was when he got the news that his children had died, but these feelings were totally eclipsed by the grief he felt when he actually saw them in their coffins.

We all know that vehicles can be deadly weapons if not handled correctly, or are driven by the wrong person. In these cases a car can be likened to a loaded gun. Youngsters that drive too fast in order to impress their friends, people driving cars that are too powerful for them to handle, drivers not paying attention on the roads like the driver mentioned earlier, are all recipes for disaster.

SHOCK TACTICS

If we stick with the illustration of a car in the wrong hands being likened to a loaded gun, then a car being driven by somebody who has drunk too much, or is under the influence of some other substance is the same as a loaded gun that is pointed and ready to have the trigger pulled. It is a totally wicked act to drink too much and then take the wheel of a car.

Drink driving is a menace that every society has to face and China is no different. Coming up to Christmas here there are numerous campaigns by the Police urging people not to drink and drive. In the past few years the adverts have been getting more and more graphic, showing pictures of bloodied bodies smashed up as a result of being killed by drunk drivers. But these are just pictures, their shock value quickly wears off and no doubt for some people the resolve not to drink and drive quickly fades.

What would be good would be to have a method of horrifying people so much about the consequences of drink driving, that they would never think of doing so again. Well

guess what, the Police in Tianjin have come up with a genius solution to stop drink drivers before they cause a fatal accident. Just recently the Police have been putting up roadblocks, stopping drivers and testing them for excess alcohol. In the Honggiao district five drivers were found to be over the limit. In an effort to educate them about the possible tragic consequences of their actions, and in an attempt to appeal to their consciences, they were all taken to the Morgue, where, along with dead bodies, were also the smashed up cars of the victims of the lethal combination of alcohol and driving. This kind of education is priceless. Unless somebody is an alcoholic, which is a sickness, any person with a scrap of conscience would be shocked to their core to see the horrifying consequences of selfishness, which possibly could be their fault in the future. It would also have a twofold effect, next time they drink and drive, they could be one of the bodies lying in the morgue, or one of the bodies lying in the morgue could be someone that they had murdered.

Personally I think it will stop some people from committing murder, and I use this word instead of manslaughter because we can choose not to drink and drive, so therefore anybody that deliberately drinks to excess and then gets into their car is lining themselves up to commit murder. Although nobody that drinks and then drives will think "today I am going to get drunk, drive and then run over and kill someone", they potentially could do exactly that. If, as a result of going to the Morgue at least one person resolves never to drink and drive again, then this campaign can be viewed as successful.

For those of you that think "I will never drink and drive, if I drink I will get a taxi", let me tell you something scary. Amongst the drivers found to be over the limit by the Police, one was a taxi driver and he was actually working driving his taxi when he was pulled over. So even though we can be determined that we will never drink and drive, we are still at the mercy of others that do.

SHOCKING STATISTICS

The Police campaigns in England start in the run-up to Christmas, as on Christmas day there is no public transport, so although someone may not have originally intended to drive whilst over the limit, the problem of getting home may influence his decision to take the risk. In a short while China will be celebrating Spring Festival so the Police are starting early in order to get their message across. Unfortunately the legendary Chinese hospitality means that people will urge their friends to drink, as not to do so means to not be a good host. Imagine someone going home to their family and telling them that they had had a bad day, because not only had they been stopped by the Police, but they had also been taken to the Morgue. Maybe next time they would be made to look at the corpses.

On average in the UK 940 people are killed by drink drivers every year, 3,681 people are seriously injured, and, terrifyingly, 85,000 people are convicted of drink driving offences every year, and these are only the ones that get caught, so you can see the potential for more fatal accidents is huge.

I sincerely hope that this campaign by the Police is successful and I believe it definitely needs to be given publicity, although I doubt very much that the Police in England would be able to adopt this practice, as the perpetrators of drink driving crimes would no doubt complain about being traumatised after seeing forcibly being taken against their will to look at the consequences of their recklessness.

最近,英国的一家四口所乘坐的小轿车与一辆 大卡车相撞,四人全部遇难。两车相撞时,卡车司 机正在用手机换音乐。只是一眨眼的工夫,一个无 辜家庭从世间消失,而司机自己也搭上了十年牢狱 之灾和家人的幸福。

汽车如果不能正确驾驶或由不合格的司机驾驶, 可能会变成致命的武器。为了和朋友炫耀而开快车 的小青年、车技不熟就上路的新手和开车不看路的 司机都可能成为马路杀手。而最为恶劣的酒驾司机 则让他驾驶的车辆成为时刻会叩响扳机的致命武器。

圣诞和新年临近的时候,伦敦警方频繁发布请 勿酒后驾驶的警示。在过去几年,警方的警示广告 在设计上越来越多地使用酒驾车祸中的惨烈画面, 希望起到更大的震慑作用。

但是有什么更好的方法,能比图片对司机产生 更长久的震慑力,让他们永远都不会再酒驾呢?天 津的交警可能提供了一个很好的示例。不久前,天 津警方进行了一次针对酒驾行为的夜检行动,这次 行动中,天津警方出了"大招",把酒精含量超标的 司机带到了太平间门口!在酒驾车祸中面目全非的 汽车摆放在太平间门口,对驾驶员是一次心灵的触动, 如果再次酒驾,有可能就要踏进那扇写着"太平间" 的大门了。

无论是中国还是英国,这两个月都会有重大节 日发生,酒驾的发生率也会上升。在中国,饭桌上 的劝酒文化会让很多人因为面子而勉为其难多喝几 杯,当司机回到家沮丧地告诉家人,我今天不但酒 驾被警察扣下了,还被带到太平间走了一圈,其效 果应该会相当震撼。希望天津交警这样的宣传方式 能够成功让司机们彻底放弃喝酒开车的侥幸心理。

MORE "LAO WAI" LEARNING CHINESE TRADITIONAL MEDICINE

t the Rio Olympic Games, Phelps' "cupping tattoo" successfully drew people's attention and created curiosity in many viewers to find out more about traditional Chinese Medicine. According to figures from the appropriate authorities, the number of foreign students studying Chinese medicine in China is increasing annually and it is the number one selection among the natural science subjects. At the Tianjin University of Traditional Chinese Medicine, there are more than 1,100 overseas students who are studying it or related subjects. If we add those in short-term training courses, there are nearly 3,000 students each year studying traditional Chinese medicine on campus.

Tianjin University of Traditional Chinese Medicine is China's first medicine school to accept overseas students and offer qualifications in the field. All the overseas students are treated in the same way as Chinese students and have to follow the strict management system. This means, that for Overseas students, studying Chinese medicine is not that easy. Of all the Chinese Medicine Schools, Tianjin University of Traditional Chinese Medicine ranks in the top ten and offers many international exchange projects. Many students elect to study in Tianjin because of the popularity of the two academician who oversee the course - Zhang Boli and Shi Xuemin.

In addition to mastering Chinese medicine theory and devising corresponding treatment plans according to the individual patient's situation and needs, overseas students also need to study the classical works of Chinese traditional medicine. For foreign students, many find the most difficult part is to understand the concept of traditional Chinese medicine. At present, Chinese traditional medicine has been accepted in many countries and more than 160 countries and regions have formally recognized the role of traditional Chinese medicine and acupuncture treatment. After graduation, overseas students will work hard to bring Chinese medicine knowledge to their motherland, acting as envoys, and in doing so help to continue to spread Chinese culture to the world.

FOOD DELIVERY EXPERIENCE

s we're entrenched in what has been described as the coldest winter since 2012, many of us may be attempting to either stave off the cold or avoid the chill temperatures at all cost. While our December issue offered a helpful article regarding clothing to wear during the winter as well as interesting means to keep warm, the chances you will be forced out into the world at some point through the day are nearly inevitable. Unless you work or study in your apartment building, you may feel overcome with hunger. Hunger that will drive you to the point of wrapping up in a scarf, knocking back a shot of baijiu for warmth, and covering half your body in adhesive warm patches.

Store you head out into the miserable cold. Tianjin and most Chinese cities are wonderful though, while the US has a terrible suburban sprawl that can make finding food turn into a 20-30 minute journey, most of us live within a minutes walk from some sort of food. Depending on where you live, you're probably within the proximity of 20 restaurants that are within a reasonable walk. If you're either stuck at work or too lazy to walk downstairs, starving to death is no longer an option. Over the years we have seen an explosion in the scale of food delivery in China with several companies competing to jam up traffic and see how many near accidents they can cause wth their armies of scooter bound delivery people.

If you plan on staying here for a prolonged amount of time, it's recommended that you download at least a couple of the biggest food delivery applications for China. Even if you don't want to download a million different food delivery applications, the Chinese various of Yelp! (DianPing) allows users to place orders online through the 外卖 (waimai) option. Placing deliveries via and application or by calling the restaurant directly is usually painless if you know at least a bit of Chinese to convey to the delivery driver where you're located or what you would like to order. Some places that cater more towards foreigners like the local, DönerKebab have WeChat groups available to assist English speakers with ordering food. If you'd like to use a delivery service, you'll need at least a few things. First, it helps to have already established online payment via Alipay 支付宝 or WeChat Wallet to allow for online transactions with food delivery apps. Then comes the application and there's a great deal many to choose from. 饿了么 and 美团外卖 (E Le Me and Mei Tuan Wai Mai) are two of the most significant apps for delivery. Some fast food joints like

McDonalds have their own applications which are helpfully available in English if you want to eat subpar hamburgers everyday. Third, you'll need to know your address in Chinese to add to the address book on the app. You'll have to ability to link your AliPay to most of the food delivery services to allow for a cashless transaction.

You will need to know some basic Chinese for navigating to applications and for having your food delivered. Some of the applications will allow you to place notes for delivery, this is a good time to translate a message to Chinese telling the delivery person something along the lines of "I'm a foreigner, my spoken Chinese is not good. I'll meet you at the front gate of my building." If you know Chinese, then the situation is favorable and you won't come across any problems when the food delivery person has an issue finding your apartment. Upon establishing an account via a food delivery app, you can search for food in your vicinity. Order up some delicious food and check it out using the address of your apartment. Keep your phone at the ready as the delivery person will call you to ask guestions about your building location or may need to be called up your elevator if you live in a complex that requires a card for using the elevator. Sometimes the delivery people will get horribly lost and take a long time to find your apartment so just bear with them. It may be easier to simply await the delivery person at the ground floor of your building or at the entrance of your community to save the both

of you trouble.

Some of the biggest issues that foreigners have with food delivery is how exclusively in Chinese the process is, which is to be expected. While food delivery is a great way to save time, brush up on your Chinese to allow for an easy experience for the delivery person. Some applications will allow you to pay cash up front once the food is delivered and while this may be preferable for those who can't establish an AliPav or WeChat Wallet for whatever reason, be aware the the delivery person may require exact change. Some restaurants will send their driver with no currency to give back change which is a massive oversight but it's one to keep in mind. Every business is different so like most days in China, you have to learn through experience.

Another issue that will require speaking Chinese is to resolve wrong orders or missing items from a delivery. Often times the restaurant may forget to bring a part of your order and are typically happy to correct the mistake but you will obviously need to convey that to the delivery person. While there are many apps crowding the market, find one that works the best for you. Whether you like the deals they offer, enjoy the layout of the application, or just enjoy the color palate of the app; use the service that feels natural for you. It's hard to say whether one company is better than the other but with all the competition, they do offer money off your first orders or occasionally have a special deal. Play around with a few of the delivery



apps to get all the best deals.

Food delivery can sometimes be the most frustrating situation that seems like more trouble than it's worth for foreigners. Keep working on your Chinese and learn to laugh off mistakes in orders. It's all part of the experience but with enough time anyone can learn to order food straight to their home. We're a society that's just one step closer to never having to go outdoors and deal with that overrated "sun". With these changes comes some growing pains, especially for those who do not wish to learn Chinese. If vou must, stick to restaurant that cater to foreigners and allow you to place orders via WeChat which will allow for an easy translation between the customer and the business.

了不起的外卖服务

如果你是长期居住在中国的朋友,建议你不妨下 载一两个最大的外卖平台。比如大众点评外送业务可 以在你哪怕中文只懂那么一点点的情况下,将你所需 要的食物送货上门。还有一些针对于外国人社区的餐 厅,一般这类餐厅都会有自己的微信群。当然在你准 备享受外卖业务之前,你需要完成几件事:第一,确 保你的手机具备支付功能,如支付宝或微信钱包等; 第二,手机已经安装外卖应用软件,如饿了么、美团 外卖等;第三,你需要知道送货地方的正确中文地址 以便送餐人员准确送达。

为了使快递小哥能准确无误地将食物送到你手中,你至少需要会一些简单的中文。很多外卖选项里都会有备注功能,这个时候你就可以将你的需求罗列 其中,比如告知你的中文不是很好等。当一切准备妥当,剩下的只需静候手机来电。一般情况下有电梯的 住宅,外来人员是没办法上楼的,因此当快递小哥即 将到来的时候,不妨在楼下等候,这样会更加便捷一些。在送餐过程中很多餐厅还会支持货到付款的服务, 这对于尚不能使用支付宝或微信支付的用户来说简直 不能再方便。

除此之外,选择外卖服务我们还可能会遇到订单 错误的情况。此时,我们就需要用中文将问题反馈给 快递员。外卖的应用程序不断涌现,我们也很难分辨 究竟谁比谁更好,用户不妨多下载几个选择,从中筛 选出最适合自己的那一款。

外卖服务一方面丰富了我们的生活,另一方面它 也在不断督促我们要更好地学习中文。改变也许会带 来烦恼,但改变更多是带来美好。希望外卖服务的出 现为你体验更加丰富的中国味道带来全新的感受。



A LAND OF NOODLES by Bryce Cristiano

hina is renowned for many wonderful culinary creations which entice those from abroad. Perhaps the greatest aspect of travel outside of meeting new people and exploring new locations is the opportunity to experience the wealth of a country's cuisine. You can learn a great deal about the history and culture of China just by partaking in the vastness of Chinese food. With flavors ranging from incredibly spicy in the Sichuan region, to salty in Tianjin, and sweet in the south; the flavor profiles are all over the place in this massive country. One theme that ties all these wonderful local flavors and culinary histories together is a fondness for noodles. Noodles in China come in varieties which those in the

West may not be used to. From the regular flour noodles which can be shaped and cut to serve many different purposes in a dish to the transparent glass noodles made from rice powder, the real difference is in the preparation and flavors.

Walking down the streets of Tianjin, you've probably see the glowing green signs of the Lanzhou restaurants which remain open well into the evening for those looking to end a night of drunken shenanigans with a cheap meal. The signs usually prominently display "拉面" (la mian) as their main attraction. While Lanzhou restaurants do serve up many dishes from cheap 盖饭 (Gai fan meals with a side of rice) to giant meals for a party to enjoy, the noodles at a Lanzhou restaurant are

usually the go-to for new expats. The simplicity of the noodles offered in a Lanzhou joint make it particularly compelling for new comers as you're most likely to expect beef and lamb noodles. While it's not always the case, many of these locations will make their noodles by hand and it's always a blast to see the chefs slapping the giant globs of noodle dough onto the preparation table as they weave a glob of dough into beautiful pulled-noodles. At these locations the beef noodles are the cheapest and worth every jiao spent. You're able to add chili sauce to your own liking to kick up the flavors a bit but even without, the noodles are still amazing. While not as much as a noodle dish, perhaps my own favorite at Lanzhou locations is a bowl of 羊肉泡馍 (Lamb soup with chopped up baked pita bread). The dish itself is served with hearty chunks of lamb, glass noodles, and either chopped up pita bread on the side or thrown right into the bowl. It's a wonderful meal for the price and worth a try at a Lanzhou restaurant.

Chongqing is the massive city surrounded by the spicy Sichuan province and

it should be no surprise that the food from Chongging hot pot to Chongging noodles are anything but spicy. Chongging noodles stand out for being guite affordable and packing amazing flavors. While some of the small Chongging noodle locations might seem like holes-in-the-wall, they cease to amaze. Common serving at a Chongging noodle shop range from 担担面 Dan Dan Mian, 麻辣 小面 Ma La Xiao Mian, to 酸辣粉 Suan La Fen. There's a wealth of different noodles that are either served in soups or just in sauces that create for an exciting chance to try new things each day. Usually with prices starting around 10rmb and never really going over 20rmb per dish, it makes for an affordable meal. These locations will usually serve egg and breads on the side for those who need a little more food in their stomach.

Another benefit of noodles is the ability to use them in any kind of dish as a substitute for rice. If you're feeling particularly riced-out, you can usually change your rice orders into some kind of substitute noodle dish. A great example of this would be with 沙县小吃 (Shaxian delicacies), where most of the orders have their own noodley companion. Not feeling fried rice? Get some classic friend noodles. Tired of the typical 鸭腿饭 (duck leg with rice)? Dig into a bowl of noodles topped with a succulent duck leg. Even most 盖饭 (with rice) dishes can substitute noodles. Nothing beats a plate of tomato eggs over warm noodles for lunch.

Another delicious addition to the variety of noodles is 牛杂面 (Beef with bean noodles). Made from a variety of beans, some of these locations have fresh made noodles with a slight green hue. While they initially seem



similar most noodles, the broth at a Niu Za Mian location is to die for. The noodles come in two varieties, either as thick noodles or skinny noodles which are usually freshly made to order. The noodles are topped with bits of cow meat from the intestines and stomach which cook for hours in a massive pot. With some veggies thrown into the mix and the option to add various tofu, even a large bowl of noodles at a Niu Za Mian location will only set you back about 15RMB. It's hard to place the exact flavor but the seasoned meats which cook for hours make a particularly sayory broth that's hard not to enjoy. Being so cheap, you have to play around these locations in order to find the quality that suits your tastes. Some locations will unfortunately use chemicals in their noodles which stand out. The all time best Niu Za Mian that I could recommend is a small joint next to Jingong Market on the corner of 增产道 (Zeng Chan Dao) and 江都路 (Jiangdu Lu) at a place called "老大板面" Lao Da Ban Mian. Besides this, you shouldn't have difficultly finding a great noodle place near you.

This is only the start though. Noodles are an absolute staple of Chinese cuisine and while we may seem to only enjoy noodles as a lunch or dinner meal, noodles are available in almost everything. Cold meal appetizers, main dishes, and sides all have their own noodles and variety of noodles. Some of the textures of glass noodles may weird out the tastes of foreigners but it's impressive the amount of textures that can be made with such a simple staple item.

面条之国

中国的各色美食吸引着全世界的人来此大快朵 颐。除了发现美食本身,你还能通过食物了解很多 背后的历史和文化。虽然中国各地偏爱的口味各不 相同,但每个地区都有面条的一席之地。中国面条 的形状和口味各有不同,有面粉做的也有米粉做的, 有粗、有细、有扁平。

走在天津的大街小巷,你对"兰州拉面"的招 牌可能并不陌生。兰州拉面是最有名的面条种类之 一,也是外国人一定要尝试的。兰州拉面最特别的 是抻面的方法,厨师把一个面团不停摔打、抻拉, 最后变成戏如发丝的面条。手工制成的面条放进牛 肉汤里煮熟,口味重的还可以加些辣子提味。我还 喜欢的一种西北美食就是羊肉泡馍,虽然馍是主角, 但里面也会有粉丝,我喜欢叫它"水晶面条"。

位于西南的重庆偏爱麻辣口味,担担面、麻辣 小面、酸辣粉也是全国人民都喜欢的午餐选择。重 庆小面价格在 10 到 20 元之间,口味以麻辣为主, 根据个人口味还可以加料。

面条还是很好的伴侣,可以作为米饭的替代品 搭配各种食材。你熟悉的盖饭可以摇身一变成为盖 面,吃腻了炒饭可以换成炒面,鸭腿饭也可以改成 鸭腿面,西红柿鸡蛋面更是谁都不能抵抗的美味。

最后一种对老外来说有点挑战的面就是牛杂面 了。牛杂取自牛的肠子和胃,通常是外国人不会吃 的部位,但是牛杂在老汤里煮上几个小时,十分入味。 我最爱的一家牛杂面馆用蔬菜汁和面做面条,所以 外表呈绿色。牛杂面的味道非常浓郁,价格也便宜, 所以要找到正宗的店铺都要费一番周折。

RESTARTING EXERCISE

xercise is an important part in keeping healthy, few people would deny that. Moving the body, sweating, challenging your physical limits, are all part of a fitness routine. Interestingly enough, the first month he focused solely on eating healthy and doing some stretching exercises. He did not just jump right back into heavy lifting. So, what we learn from his experience is that it is very important to prepare the body for exercise and to avoid injury by slowly getting back into our exercise routine. That way we won't finally feel we are getting back on track only to once again have to sit on the sidelines waiting for an injury to

heal. Slow and steady wins the race.

When it comes to truly restarting our exercise routine, start with light cardio and lighter weights. CLOTHES DRYING RACK

hen first arriving in China many moons ago, pretty much all shopping was done at the store. A bus was taken to the store since it was cheaper and travelers were empty handed. After shopping, it meant being loaded down with goods. Thus it was necessary to wait around outside for a cab that was willing to haul the mass of merchandise home. It was no fun. One of the things bought upon arrival was a clothes drying rack because it was quickly realized a dryer is not an appliance typically found in a Chinese apartment. Not to mention usually there isn't even a suitable location to put it, thus ruling out even buying one yourself. It is safe to say, a dryer is completely off the radar in a traditional Chinese home. So, the clothes drying rack becomes a fast necessity.

Fast forward to today. Now there exist a number of apps with which you can do online shopping. Shoppers can never leave the house, never walk through the store aisles and never wait outside to load up goods in a taxi again. These apps really are a lifesaver. A caveat though is the need for some skills in reading and understanding Chinese characters. The clothes drying racks bought years ago had seen their last clothes drying days. They were falling apart. So, instead of buying them the old fashioned way the goal was to buy online. How do you say "clothes drying rack" in Chinese? Using the Jingdong app, the initial search was done using two characters 衣架 (yījià). They literally mean "clothes" 衣and "rack" 架. The results proved this is actually the Chinese word for "hanger" though. Not really the intended product. After intensive research this three character combination 晾衣架 (liàngyījià) which means "dry in the air", "clothes", "rack" was the jack pot!

There are a variety of different types of racks. A pretty useful model has two side flaps that flip up, providing a large area in which to hang clothes. Based on the use of previous clothes racks a structural weakness exists in some. The low center rack which folds when being put away, has a joint that easily breaks. Ideally then, the new one would be sturdier, especially in

that area.

There is also a wide range of prices. Depending on the type of rack you buy, it could be anywhere from 80 to over 1,000 RMB! Obviously the really expensive ones are pretty high tech and may even involve some type of installation work. That said, for about 100 to 150 RMB you can easily find a decent quality and very workable clothes drying rack. Interestingly enough, if you are into a faster drying solution you can also look up 干衣机 (gānyījī). This is a dryer that actually uses warm air to dry your clothes, but, obviously it will be a bit more expensive than the basic drying rack. While none of these compare to a good old electric dryer, they can get the job done. Happy drying!

The Ctrip app provides three core functions when opened. They are: "Hotels", "Flights", and "Trains". Today we are going to focus on the "hotel" part. Be aware that depending on which app store you download Ctrip from, the UI language will vary.

Tap on "Hotels" and then in the search bar input "Tianjin" but don't hit the "Done" button in the lower right corner. Instead, simply entering in this key word will automatically provide results. Below the search bar, search results based on area will be displayed. Such as the area of "Tianjin", as in the entire city, "Tianjin Binhai International Airport", "Tianjin West Railway Station", etc. Select one of these and it will show all the hotels in that area. Another option is to search specifically by hotel name, such as "Holiday Inn".

If only the brand name is entered, it will display all locations for that chain throughout China. This is useful if you prefer a particular hotel such as the "Holiday Inn" and want to stay at a Holiday Inn no matter which city you visit. For understanding intra-Tianjin offerings though, be sure to add the city to the hotel name, as in "Holiday Inn Tianjin" or "Tianjin Holiday Inn". While searching with English seems fairly easy, the caveat is when a certain Hotel's name in English is totally unrelated to the Chinese name. This can create challenges when you know the name of the hotel only in Chinese but want to search it in the English based Ctrip app.

Tracking down the English name for some Chinese brand hotels can be challenging. Before giving up as though the hotel is unavailable though, be aware that Ctrip does offer assistant by phone. It can be a life saver when trying to reserve a

room at a hotel that isn't coming up in the app. To call in, select the menu in the top left hand corner of the app's home screen. Then pick "Contact Us" to see the customer service numbers. When calling in, there is an option for "English" service. Based on experience, Ctrip's English customer service reps are fair. This means, be prepared to speak slowly and even repeat details. If you have decent Chinese, by all means provide as much information in Chinese as possible, engaging in a bi-lingual call.

A way of doing this is to pick "English" service, whereby you will get a rep that has

some English skills. However, periodically as they get stuck or don't understand what you are saying, offer up a few pieces of key information in Chinese, such as the street name or in this case the name of the hotel. This combination of English with some Chinese actually does wonders in comparison to simply trying to talk in pure English. Worst case scenario, if the rep is really linguistically challenged try calling back so as to get another agent. Generally speaking, Ctrip is a solid choice for travel related bookings. They are well known even within China, going by the Chinese name: 携程 xiéchéng.

用英文搜索一些中国品牌的酒店可以说相当具有 挑战。但好在携程网提供电话求助服务,用户只需拨 打服务热线然后选择英文服务即可获得相应帮助。

英文客服的英文水平可圈可点,当他们不明白 你在说什么的时候,不妨多提供一些关键性信息, 如街道名称等。在某些情况下,当你用英文夹杂着 中文的方式向他们寻求帮助会比你直接用英文来得 方便很多。如果你是长期商旅出行者,那么该软件 就是你坚实的选择。

ANHUI

ot a particularly well known area for tourism, with the exception of Huangshan 黄山 or "Yellow Mountain" which is a UNESCO World Heritage site in this landlocked province of a population of over 60 million. However Anhui has a lot to offer for those looking for a cultural experience in China.

Anhui is one of China's poorest provinces with a GDP per capita ranked 26th within China's 31 regions. In the eastern part of China bordered by Jiangxi, Jiangsu, Zhejiang, Hubei, Henan and Shandong and sometimes referred to as the "Appalachia" of China. The Appalachia region in Eastern United States is a mountainous area although blessed with resources is relatively poor because of its remoteness. In a similar manner, Anhui also has many resources but is not fully developed due to the geographic constraints of the province being divided by the Yangtze River and only four bridges and surrounded by two mountain ranges.

The climate of Anhui is considered between subtropical and the warm temperate zone and has four distinct seasons. Anhui is rich in history and culture and almost every city will have some historical significance dating back to the Qin Dynasty.

Tourist Spots

This region is also referred to as the Jianghuai area, Jiang representing the Yangtze River, which the Chinese call Changjiang 长江 literally "Long River" and Huai He 淮河. The Huai River lies between the two longest rivers in China, the Yangtze and the Yellow River. The significance of the Huai River is it is considered the dividing line for North and South China.

As mentioned, Huangshan is it's most famous tourist site and is located in the southern part of the province. An airport was recently opened near Huangshan and makes accessibility easier. The mountain is extensive and you should plan to stay overnight in one of the several hotels located on the summit. This will give you an opportunity to catch the sunrise at the picturesque peaks. However, you will need some luck as the mountain is usually covered with a morning mist and the clear sunrise only can be seen 20% of the time. top and for those who want a challenge, stone-carved steps will wind your way to the top. The former name of the city of Huangshan was HuiZhou which is makes up the name of the province AnHui, "An" is from AnQing安庆. Huizhou city 徽州 changed its name to Huangshan in 1987.

In the western part of the province is Anqing 安庆 which is also home to the Tianzhu Mountain天柱山, literal meaning is "Heavenly Pillar Mountain", it is also referred to as Wan Shan 皖山 and the character 皖 is the abbreviation of Anhui which you will see on all Anhui license plates. Anqing was the previous provincial capital of Anhui before 1949. Also in Anqing you should visit the Yingjiang Temple and the Zhenfeng Tower, both in the same location and called the "Ten Thousand Buddahs Monastery in ancient times. The area is known for Hui snacks and don't miss the delicious Jiang Wan Chun wontons (dumplings).

In the northern part of the province is Bengbu 蚌埠 historically known for freshwater pearls, it is now famous as a food city of Anhui, which now makes up for over 40% of its economy. The Huaiyuan Pomegranates are considered the best in China as well as its Mitten Crabs from Tuo Lake. The Bengbu Convention and Exhibition Center is a masterpiece of architecture.

In the center of Anhui is Hefei , the capital of Anhui. In ancient times, it was always regarded as being militarily important and was known as the former location of the Three Kingdoms period. In Hefei, the Three Kingdoms Park is considered the best restored sites for this period. The provincial museum is excellent and has over 230,000 relics. Most exhibits are in Chinese and English and if you want an English guide, you need to book in advance.

Baohe Park is a tribute to a former official during the Northern Song Dynasty (960-1126) and became a symbol of justice in China. The temple and grounds are quite extensive built in 1539. If you are interested in the history of wars between ancient Chinese dynasties, This area has many historic battle sites due to it's central geographic location in China.

While in Hefei, make sure you try Luzhou Roast Duck泸州烤鸭Lúzhōu kǎoyā – Beijing has its Peking Duck, although not as famous, Anhui has it's Luzhou Roast Duck, Luzhou was the ancient name of the present capital of Anhui province, Hefei so this dish is also referred to as Hefei Roast Duck which has a stronger flavor that its capital cousin.

There are eight culinary cuisines in China listed as: Shandong, Anhui, Guangdong (or

Cantonese), Sichuan, Hunan, Fujian, Jiangsu and Zhejiang. In the November Jin Magazine issue, we described in detail the less known cuisine from Anhui province.

Since much of Anhui is remote and mountainous, many of Anhui dishes use natural wild ingredients. Their style of cooking also emphasizes stewing and braising rather than more typical deep-frying and stir-frying that is common to other Chinese cuisines. This region is also close to Jiangsu and Zhejiang so dishes have some of those region's characteristics.

Anhui cooking pays a lot of attention to Yin and Yang 阴阳 which literally means "dark and bright". This concept is expressed in many Chinese philosophies and describes how seemingly opposite or contrary forces may actually be complementary, interconnected, and interdependent in the natural world, and how they may give rise to each other as they interrelate to one another. This is seen in Chinese Taoism, TCM Traditional Chinese medicines and even in foods, in this case Anhui cuisine will seek to balance the dishes with the use of ingredients and method of cooking.

Getting There

There is a high-speed train from Tianjin to Hefei, which is about 4 hours.

There are several direct flights from Tianjin to Hefei, or you can depart from Beijing or fly to Shanghai or Nanjing and transfer from there. Check out the Ctrip app.

在安徽省的西南地区有一座被称为"千年古城" 的国家森林城市,它就是安庆,古称舒州。它是安 徽最早的省会所在之地,也是中国较早接受近代文 明的城市之一。在安庆,你不可错过的旅游景点有 天柱山、迎江寺、振风塔。值得注意的是,该地区 也是著名的回族小吃区,特别推荐老字号吃食 -- 江 万春饺子,它皮如薄纸,馅如珍珠,形如猫耳,肉 嫩汤鲜,有机会的话不要错过。

说到安徽省的美味我们就不得不提起它赫赫有 名的徽州风味 — 徽菜。徽菜的形成与其独特的地理 环境、人文环境、饮食习俗密切相关。绿树丛荫、 沟壑纵横、气候宜人的自然环境,为徽菜提供了取 之不尽、用之不竭的徽菜原料。徽菜在烹调方法上 擅长烧、炖、蒸,而爆、炒菜少,重油、重色,重火功, 与临近的江苏和浙江等地区或多或少有相似之处。 除此之外,徽菜还格外注重阴阳平衡之概念,将自 然和人文合二为一,以此达到互补互通的作用。

天津到合肥交通便利,乘坐动车前往也不过四 个小时的车程。"一生痴绝处,无梦到徽州",如果你 短期内有出行计划,不妨来这里看上一番,说不定 哪个时刻就爱上了这个人杰地灵,星转斗移的古老 城市。

DISCOVERING TIANJIN

SALT OF THE EARTH by Robert Watt



Sorted salt are piled up high

ve been out this way before, out from the city towards the sea. Driving out over the flat, low lands beyond Binhai and it still strikes me how featureless, how barren, how unforgivingly hostile this area feels. Last time it was towards an isolated village and its old fishing fleet moored at the water's edge, this time it's to the ancient salterns.

Like the fishing industry, Tianjin was once famous for its salt production. It exported, what Chinese proverbs call 'one of the seven necessities of life; throughout China and beyond. It has been credited with being the driving force behind China's social development because the huge tax revenue it created necessitated the organisation and administration to enforce, protect and collect

it. Like the fishing industry, collecting salt from the sea is hard physical work, the environment is often tough and is a tradition in decline.

Culture and history

The flooding by the Bohai Sea and nearby rivers have made the soil in this region too salty for many plants. It explains the lack of trees and shrubs, the shortage of wildlife. It's a harsh environment; fiercely hot in summer and bitterly cold in winter, unsuitable for farming or rearing animals. However, there is evidence of Neolithic man and it is likely they fed on and traded the abundant fish and the natural salt reserves of the coast. The salt marshes would have protected them from invaders too. Under the dry summer sun, pools would dry out and the salt deposits

would form naturally. As time went on the natural process of collecting salt was enhanced by the creation and management of the water into ponds. By the time of the Tang dynasty, salt was the biggest source of tax revenue and remained important well into the 20th century.

I arrive by car with Mr Liu, one of the product managers at Changlu; the largest sea salt producer in China. The company traces its roots back to 935AD. His family also has a long history of working in the industry. His sister, helping me with travel and translation, remembers growing up with thousands of other families in single story housing provided by the salt companies. She tells me the old village was pulled down during the 1980s and 90s, everyone was moved into modern



facilities and the local schools closed. The Liu family story is typical of the families I met in the shrinking fishing village last year. The younger generations, now working in other careers. drifting away leaving the parents and grandparents behind.

The Salterns today

If you look at aerial pictures of land around the Bohai bay, from as recent as the early 1980's, the coastline is rimed with plumes of white like the head of a cauliflower. Today there are only 1 or 2 companies, but there are ponds as far as can be seen. From the edge of the city, marked by the sudden halt of high rise apartments, to the sea and left and right to the horizon lies dried white deposits, or the mirrored waters of the brine ponds. Each is ringed by rows of red bricks that reinforce the banks. The ponds are in different stages of production, those drained and dried of moisture a foot deep with the large crystals the area is famous for. Others are filled with the brine that will either evaporate naturally, or be pumped to drying machines to produce finer grains.

We climb down into one of the dried ponds and find the salt is surprisingly solid beneath our feet. Large patches have been scraped away to reveal the dark clay beneath. The extraction is being done by diggers and dumped into low trucks that speed continuously up and down the network of roads. The mechanisation has removed the back breaking work that was once done by men with shovels. Although it's warm today the drivers are well wrapped in scarves and

thick coats, only patches of their skin showing. In the open trucks there is no protection from the Siberian winter winds whipping across the landscape and no shade in the sweltering summer. It's unsurprising the workers are dark skinned.

In the trail of trucks we follow the freshly dug salt to where it's dumped into a machine. The contraption is a web of belts, cascading water and whirling motors which shake and sort out the soil and stones. It's a primitive piece of mechanics, but surprisingly efficient in producing a constant supply of brilliant salt creeping along a series of conveyors onto an already massive white mountain.

The effects of modernization

The principles haven't changed. The sun, the sea and the flat land uses the same natural processes. The waste produced, no more than a stream of salty water which returns into Bohai bay and a small pile of stones and clumps of dirty salt that didn't separate. A man is collecting some in a bag and I worry that this might be destined for some black market. But I'm told it's used in traditional medicine as a type of poultice.

It's hard to imagine though, how this area would have looked during the old dynasties when windmills pumped the sea water into the ponds. As well as the machines and the city standing ominously on one side, strings of thick electric cables stretch between long lines of posts. There are tufts of coarse dry grass along the rails that support the sorting machine, but mostly the ground is barren, poisoned by the salt spilled and churned into the road sides by the wheels of trucks. Before the mechanisation, the work would have required a mass of laborers rather than the few dozen visible today. The area produces over a million tons of salt a year but the tax revenue it generates is tiny compared with the factories and shopping malls steadily encroaching from the distance.

In the same way that fish farms increased the efficiency of fishing and helped in the decline of traditional fleets, so the mechanisation of the salterns has reduced the value of the salt industry. But just as Tianjin remains famous for its sea food, its cuisine has been left with a legacy of salt preserved vegetables and the generous use of salt in its traditional dishes.

盐地探访

很多人都知道,天津出产海鲜,而紧靠渤海湾 的天津也是著名的盐产地。"柴米油盐酱醋茶",盐 是中国人生活中最重要的七件事之一,也是政府主 要的税收来源,受到严格的管理和掌控,而海盐的 开采也是一项非常艰苦的体力劳动。

渤海湾的海水和附近河水的冲刷让这片土地的 盐分奇高,已经不适宜植物的生长,所以这里罕见 树林、灌木以及野生动物。这里的环境很艰苦,夏 天酷热,冬天极冷,同样不适合农作物和动物生存。 但是这里最早的居民就是靠打渔和采盐为生,同时 这些盐碱滩也曾经帮他们抵御外敌入侵。在夏日骄 阳的暴晒下,水塘里的水蒸发,形成了天然的盐池。 后来人们掌握了更先进的来盐技术后,盐的产量大 幅增长,到唐代,盐已经成为国家最主要的税收来源。

我跟随长芦盐业的刘经理来到他们的采盐场。 长芦盐业是中国最大的海盐生产企业,其历史可以 追溯到公元 935 年。刘经理的家族几代人也在盐场 工作,他的妹妹能说英文,成为我的随行向导和翻译。 她还记得小时候,盐场的几千户职工家庭都住在盐 业公司提供的平房宿舍里,这些宿舍在上世纪八九 十年代陆续被拆除了,职工都搬到现代化的公寓楼 里。年轻一代不愿意再从事海盐开采,纷纷走出村 子谋求其他的发展,只有父母和老人还留在这里。

从渤海湾的俯瞰图上,我们可以看到海岸线镶 着一圈白边。目前只有一两家盐业公司还在运营, 曾经用来储盐的水池依稀可见。从城郊边界到海岸 线,有很多白色的盐池,每个池子的晾晒程度都不同, 有些已经干涸,呈现晶莹的白色,有些还汪着盐水。

我们爬到一个干涸的盐池里,发现脚下的盐非 常坚固。大块的盐层已经脱落,露出池底黑色的泥土。 大型挖掘机不停工作,把池里晾好的盐装到大卡车 里,机械化的流程取代了辛苦的人工挖掘。虽然天 气很暖和,卡车司机还是穿着棉袄和围巾,把自己 包得很严实,因为露天作业的司机要经受西北风的 掺打,夏天还要忍受骄阳的暴晒,每个人的皮肤都 是黝黑的。

卡车把盐池里刮下的盐倒入一个机器里,在机器中盐能从砂石中分离出来。虽然机器装置看起来 简陋,但工作效率很高,分离效果也不错。不管用 哪种方法开采,盐的采集原理是不变的。采盐过程 中只会产生高盐度的废水,这些废水还会流回渤海 或无法分离的盐堆里。

眼前的盐场已经被各种开采机械占据,鲜少能 看见采盐工人的身影。很难想象古代盐场的采盐场 景,那时候人们还在用风车把海水灌倒采盐池。这 里每年能生产一百万吨盐,但纳税已经无法和现代 化工厂和零售商业相比了。

he masters of moving people, DiDi Chuxing (滴滴出行 dīdī chūxíng) are changing what it means to "hitchhike". Didi's version of an on-demand "hitchhiking" service is called "shunfengche" (顺风车 shùnfēngchē). The service can be used by opening the Chinese version of the Didi app and tapping on the third option which is "顺风车". Users have the option to send out either an intra-city (市内 shìnèi) or inter-city request (跨城 kuàchéng).

Intra-city requests are handy when trying to get from one part of Tianjin to another. It allows riders to catch a ride with drivers headed in the same direction. This lowers the fare when compared with taking a cab or "private car" (快车 kuàichē). Like with a "private car", the "shunfengche" option allows for pooling which further reduces the ride rate. However, it should be noted that if a "shunfengche" request with pooling fails to locate other riders, the addition discount will be forfeited. Depending on where and when the "shunfengche" request is sent, the probability for successful pooling is greatly affected.

When pooling, it is good to confirm that all seat belts are available before the driver arrives. A rider could end up sitting in any of the available seats, e.g. rear or even the middle seat. Didi has been conducting awareness campaigns stressing the need for every passenger to "buckle up" so as to reduce risk of injury. A great effort, but sadly some drivers don't provide belts for all passengers, especially those in the rear. Like with cabs, the top culprit is aftermarket seat covers which cover over the seatbelt and/or buckle. Didi needs to do a better job at ensuring drivers are abiding by the rules and actually providing belts.

HITCHHIKING WITH "SHUNFENGCHE"

When it comes to inter-city travel ideally the request will be sent out the day before or even earlier. Specific travel date and time, such as "tomorrow at 2:00 pm" can be set in the app. That said, be aware that sometimes drivers will accept the ride request only to call after asking if it's ok to leave earlier or later than the time requested. Other drivers will text the rider before accepting to discuss matters. Outside of departure time, there is the issue of space. When making the request, it can be specified how many "passengers" there will be, e.g. 1-4. This is handy when traveling with luggage or goods. Instead of using the space for a person, stuff could be placed there. Of course, it is best to clarify this with the driver before pickup. This includes use of the trunk, as in some cases the driver already has it packed full.

Finally, in terms of identity, hitchhiking in the traditional sense is quite risky because neither party can confirm the identity of the other. Didi though is requesting identity verification from both drivers and passengers. Namely, legal identification information and linking a bank card. A note on payment, "shunfengche" rides get paid for upon getting in the car. The app will prompt the rider to confirm they have "boarded" thereby the fare will be deducted. The driver will not get the money though until the rider taps another button indicating they have "safely arrived". The next time you need to go from Tianjin city-center to the airport, or even further like Beijing, consider a slightly less risky and technologically more advanced form of hitchhiking, a.k.a. Didi's "shunfengche".

hat's big, red, and lights up your life more than anything else in the world? No, not those fireworks outside your window... Hongbaos! Those pretty little red envelopes (with maybe one yuan in them on a good day) that show up in your various Wechat groups every once in a while which make you smile wide and feel all warm and tingly inside. You know what we're talking about.

Where did these come from and what's the big deal? How did receiving minuscule amounts of money, sometimes as low as ¥0.01, on a social media messaging platform become the cool and somewhat normal thing to do in this country? I don't know about you, but if I sent 5 cents to a group of friends on Facebook, it would definitely not have the same effect. The only possible comparison might be an online gift card to Amazon or something.

The year was 2014 and the occasion was Chinese New Year. Wechat was about to release their sleek new mobile payment system to their already huge user base, but the majority of those users were already using another trusted,

convenient-at-the-time payment app.

They needed to come up with a big idea to get those envied early adopters. The powerful marketing minds at Tencent, Wechat's parent company, decided to look back at traditional Chinese culture and nostalgically remembered the childhood feelings of receiving physical red envelopes with actual cash inside from Grandma Wang. Or they recalled their wedding celebration where they were coerced into drinking obscene amounts of liquor with Uncle Liu, the only upside being the fat hongbaos with lots and lots of sweet rambos.

That winter, during the famed Spring Festival Gala on television, they unrolled their plan. The masses were called upon throughout the evening to open Wechat and "shake their phones for hongbaos" and millions of RMB were automatically sent around the country for free. All night long, Chinese people and expats alike were shaking frantically, trying to receive something, anything really. Most of the time, all we got were coupons to different restaurants or movies that were obviously just paid advertisements. But I saw a friend post on my Moments feed that they had gotten ¥50! That was all the viral motivation I needed. Didn't stop shaking till the early morn.

Of course, the only catch for actually using that lucky money was linking your bank card to the new wallet feature and start using their payment platform. It worked flawlessly.

It was an instant hit, to say the least! A new localized cultural meme was born and the rest is tech history. Within three years, Wechat Pay QR codes have swept the country from Starbucks coffeeshops to WITHIN THREE YEARS, WECHAT PAY QR CODES HAVE SWEPT THE COUNTRY FROM STARBUCKS COFFEESHOPS TO EVEN SMALL FRUIT & VEGGIE VENDORS ON THE STREET CORNER.

even small fruit & veggie vendors on the street corner.

We can go weeks without using cash at all these days and if you don't use or accept Wechat to pay for things, you've become the minority. Most taxi drivers accept Wechat now, we can pay for food delivery right within Wechat, and yes, we can send hongbaos to any one we want, including strangers in the groups.

Keep an eye on Line 6 as once the extensions are completed, it'll open up access to the beautiful BeiNing Park just near BeiZhan.
