The posters of the smiling UU mascot are the lone giveaways at the 23 cultural performances, held daily at Longgang.

Ten traditional Chinese cultural performances are on tap at an auditorium in the village, including symphony concerts, martial arts performances, acrobatics and traditional Chinese operas, and 13 outdoor performances have been scheduled for the lakeside square in the village, according to Chen Xinliang, deputy head of the city's culture, sports and tourism bureau.

"The performance is very modern and relaxing, exactly what the university students fancy. The shows help ease the exhaustion after a day's competition."

"We aim to enrich the athletes" cultural experience while displaying the city's image as a young and vigorous city," said Zhang Jinwen, sports services deputy minister of the Universiade Village

"It's my first time to China and I have been greatly impressed with the cultures of modern China, even before the Games kicked off," said Abdnlmalik Alsalamah, a member of the Saudi Arabia medical staff, as he recorded the

performance on his camera. "I think I'll come every night if I have time."

Seven local bands will perform pop concerts in an attempt to combine traditional Chinese culture with the vigor of a young city.

Ou Xin, a member of a local street dance club named Green Max, will also stage a jazz dance during the night gala.

"We love dancing so we get together," said Ou, who goes by Lulu. "It's exciting that we could get on the stage in the village and illustrate the new image of China to the world."

"I came to the pop concert here last night and it was awesome," said Kamilla Gafurzianova, a female fencer from Moscow State University of Railway Engineering. "A lot of athletes gathered there to have fun. We all like it and will come again. We love singing karaoke in Russia, but the nightclubs are more popular now. It's a great experience to (be) with young guys here."
