The Orchestra Del Maggio Musicale Fiorentino, founded in 1928 in Italy, will perform at the Shanghai Grand Theatre. The orchestra has a strong reputation. In 1998, led by maestro Zubin Meta, the orchestra played for the opera Turandot, directed by Zhang Yimou, at the Imperial Ancestral Temple in Beijing.

The current artistic director, Domenico Pierini, will conduct the concert in Shanghai. The concert program will include Concerto in B minor for 4 Violins, Cello, Strings and Harpsichord by Antonio Vivaldi, Concerto for Strings by Nino Rota and String Sextet Souvenir de Florence by Tchaikovsky.

JULY 11 **Poland Pavilion** 

Twenty-five movies posters are on exhibition until July 19, showcasing the past 70 years of Polish cinema. Since 1955, the works of directors of the Polish Film School, an informal group of Polish directors and screenplay writers, influenced contemporary trends, such as French New Wave, Italian Neorealism and even late classical Hollywood cinema. After World War II, despite censorship, filmmakers like Roman Polanski, Krzysztof Kieslowski, Agnieszka Holland and Andrzej Wajda had a large impact on the development of cinematography. In recent years, without censorship and with a large number of independent filmmakers of all genres, Polish productions tend to be more inspired by American films.





JULY 12 Shanghai Art Museum

A memorial exhibition will open today at the Shanghai Art Museum for Tang Yun, a modern master of Chinese paintings. More than 200 paintings and calligraphy works will be on exhibition. Tang specialized in painting traditional Chinese subjects, such as mountains, rivers, flowers and birds. His paintings, depicting flowers and birds, are famous for their elaborate beauty and grace.

Besides Tang's works, the exhibition will also feature photographs and video documents about Tang. Many of the documents will be shown to the public for the first time.

JULY 13 **Pudong Library** 

Calligraphy sculptures by Li Wenbao and his students are on exhibit at the Pudong Library. Li started to carve sentences from Chinese classics in wood 10 years ago. Now more than 100 people have joined the group. They have made large sculptures in the shape of ancient bells with classic inscriptions.

Li has won many national awards for calligraphy. By combining traditional seal cutting art with new artistic expressions of sculpture and installation, Li and his students have shown refreshing illustrations of traditional Chinese culture.

JULY 15 **Australia Pavilion** 

Sydney's brightest young musical talent will be jazzing it up until July 16 in Shanghai, with performances by three outstanding ensembles from the Sydney Conservatorium of Music at the University of Sydney. The conservatorium's flagship Jazz Big Band, directed by prominent arranger, conductor and producer, William Motzing, is drawn from the crème de la crème of jazz studies students. The band performs regularly at international music festivals and concerts in Australia.

The Percussion Ensemble is drawn from the best percussion studies students at the conservatorium. They toured in Hong Kong, Macao and Taiwan in 2009. The Percussion Ensemble is directed by outstanding composer, performer and recording artist, Daryl Pratt, chair of the percussion unit at the conservatorium.
